### **Pastor Reep Receives National Award**

Pastor Stanley Reep earned a national award for stewardship ministry by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. The Good Steward Award is given annually to the church leader who exemplifies outstanding stewardship through preaching, teaching and example. The Good Steward award is in honor of Dr. Richard Lee Peterman and was established in 1984 (the year Pastor Reep began seminary) by the Lutheran Laity Movement for Stewardship. It honors the pastor that has shown the importance of stewardship by using innovative programs, new resources or made significant gains in stewardship during the last year or over a longer period of time. One recipient is present the award along with a check for \$500 for the use in the congregation he or she serves. This year Pastor Reep donated the \$500 toward the *Building in Faith for Future Generations* campaign at St. Paul's Church. We rejoice with him and with his family

#### SYNOD ASSEMBLY REPORTS

Our unity is in Jesus Christ! This would be an excellent description of the worship service and agenda for the recent Synod Assembly held at Messiah College. The gathering included the Holy Eucharist with Necrology of 10 pastors, Affirmation of Vocation for all the baptized and the Rites of Consecration (Deacon April Trout) and Ordination (Pastors Matthew Best, Kelsey Fitting-Snyder, Amy Wagner, Linda Shank).

The altar was gracefully decorated with orange and red flowing fabric in observance of Pentecost. Blue and green flowing fabric adorned the Baptismal font and lectern respectfully. The cross standing behind the altar was extremely unique and beautiful. Entrancing would best describe the appearance on stage.

A magnificent organ provided the accompaniment for most of the hymns that were carefully selected for the weekend. (Open Your Ears, O Faithful People; We Come to the Hungry Feast; Wade in the Water; A Mighty Fortress is our God). The hymns with the uplifted and unified voices of the present congregation inspired hope for a problematic and dwindling faith community.

The Rev. Bishop Dunlop provided a moving message about how Christians are at times like small children who are attempting to tell others, wo do not seem to understand what they desire or need. Frustration, anger, or tears can develop. Someone else, like an older sibling, may have to intervene to decipher what is being said. In order for congregations to reform, renew, and revision we need to make special attempts in listening to what others are saying or suggesting. We need to ask questions, if necessary have others decipher, respect all opinions, and above all, pray for guidance. With the Holy Spirit present, we all must reach out, take chances, grow in faith and keep trying till we are heard, supported, and understood. Only then can we begin to take baby steps to create gradual changes that are necessary for Christian growth.

The communion feast was touching. The entire assembly came to various communion stations hungry and begging for the love of God that will not be denied.

After such a joyous service, it was with lightened heart that we could head to our dorm rooms or home and look forward with hope to the next day filled with the business meetings.

Several weeks ago I was honored with the request to be a Voting member for our congregation at the Synod Assembly taking place June 2nd to June 3rd 2017. During this Assembly there were several educational seminars being offered which we could choose to attend and I felt that you would like a report from me on what I saw, learned, and experienced.

The first seminar that I attended was presented by Pastor Reep himself. "The Art of Living Graciously". He provided a uniquely folded piece of paper which, as you unfolded it, provided what I would call thought points on the topic. I think in some ways I learned more about Pastor Reep than the subject but, with his stories and examples, he got me to think about how I can start to live Graciously.

The next seminar I attended was about Tanzania. The presenter, Pastor Cliff Eshbach, with the help of a video, guided us from flying to Africa to show what life was like in that country and what it would cost if we would like to go on a mission trip there. It was interesting to see what life is like in that country. So vastly different from what we experience here.

The last presentation I will document was "Renewing Congregations" with Pastor David Daubert. This was a two part presentation as Pr. Daubert was the keynote speaker for this year's assembly. According to him, a large portion of our churches are dying, due mainly to the overall age of the congregations. In another ten to twenty years if nothing is done the churches will be dead. Yes you read that correctly. The synod, along with Pastor Daubert have devised a new Synod Initiative, "Reform, Renew, Revision (R3)", to prevent this. I think it would be best if people went out to the Synod website and read up on this since there are many components.

Thank you again for giving me the opportunity to attend this meeting.

#### Deacon Ellen Doughty

My part of the report will focus mainly on the second day of the Assembly and I will include my thoughts on the 2 seminars I attended on Friday since Andrew, Denise and I decided to split up for those.

The first seminar I attended was entitled, "It's Time to Stand Up!; There were three presenters, although only one was named on the listing. Sr Dottie Almoney; Pr. Kevin Stout and another pastor whose name I can't recall (sorry) spoke about human trafficking, Refugee and Immigration and LWR.

The second seminar I attended was "Tanzania Travel 2018" with Pr. Cliff Eshbach. I loved the presentation as it laid out most of what can be expected for those who choose to go on a trip to Tanzania. The costs were actually lower than I expected. Andrew and Angie Hammer were present and shared about how living in Tanzania for 8 months was a life changing experience for them and their three children.

During the afternoon session on Friday, On June 2<sup>nd</sup>, the ELCA program director for stewardship in the Domestic Mission Unit, Keith Mundy, presented Pr. Reep the Dr. Richard Lee Peterman Good Steward Award. This award is given annually to one ELCA leader who exemplifies outstanding stewardship through preaching, teaching and example.

Saturday was set aside for the business of the synod. First was Morning devotion with the Order of the Opening of the Assembly and the installation of conference deans and secretaries and the installation of the Lutheran Youth Organization board members. Next followed the Bishop's opening remarks, a chance to practice with the voting machines, certification of voting members; presentation of the 2016 Synod Assembly minutes and the report of the Synod Planning Committee. This last one was very important as the assembly voted on the agenda presented and amendments to the agenda and also voted to adopt the rules of procedure.

Reports from committees happened at their scheduled times throughout the day. Additional actions that occurred included adoption of the proposed 2018 budget (followed by a report on the Always Made New Campaign); adoption of minimum salary guidelines and adoption of Constitutional Amendments. It is always interesting to see the dynamics at play when it comes to budgets.

The afternoon session is where we were able to make use of the voting machines as we had some decisions regarding various committees as to who the assembly felt called to vote for. Any committee reports that were not presented in the morning were presented during this session. No conferences presented any memorials for the assembly to discuss. New business involved the presentation of two proposals, both of which were voted down.

After the order of closing of the assembly, the new treasurer of the synod and newly elected Synod Council Members were installed.

I enjoy the Synod Assemblies because they give me time to reconnect with friends and colleagues from all over the synod in learning, sharing and worship.



#### Council Highlights

The Council met Monday June 12 for its regular meeting. Pr. Reep had been excused which meant that the Council was limited to acting on the agenda that he had approved at the May Executive Committee meeting.

Jeff Riese joined the Council. He will complete the term of Ray Gordon who has taken a position out of State.



Treasurer, Tony Culp, reported that St. Paul's finances remain strong. He pointed out that envelope giving is slightly down, but not enough to be worrisome. He noted that the church budget is not weighted by month which usually means that at year end small shortfalls are typically made up by heavier giving than at the first part of the year.

The Council received an update on the progress of the building renewal. The start date on actual work is still not firm. The general and sub-contractors are working with the architects to get full detailed drawings completed so that permits can be obtained from the city. This also means there is no firm schedule of when portions of the job will be scheduled. Sub committees of the church are making decisions on suggested changes in lighting and flooring. There will be a report to the congregation by a Council member at the conclusion of each service on June 25, at which time it is hoped more firm information will be available. It is planned that there will be such a report on a Sunday following each Council meeting as the project moves forward.

The Council named the chair of the nominating committee. This committee will be seeking candidates for the Congregation Council, Benevolence Committee, Mutual Ministry Committee and Voting Members at the 2018 Synod Assembly. Elections will be held at the Annual meeting in November. Please prayerfully consider serving in any of these positions. I hope you will answer "yes" if contacted by a committee member. Your hands can be doing God's work. Newer persons in these positions bring new fresh ideas that can help improve our ministry to God's people in this congregation and in York.

#### **Building in Faith for Future Generations**

- A word from the architects, Marotta/Main The building permits have been submitted to the city of York. The Final drawings are almost complete.
  - Implications for our congregation When permits are issued, construction can begin. The Phasing schedule will then be solidified. That means we will finally know when they will work on which spaces...,nave (worship space) classrooms, preschool rooms...
- A word from the builders, Arthur Funk and Sons We signed the letter of intent with Arthur Funk and Sons. We have now received the contract from them and it is awaiting council approval and signatures.

Implications for our congregation - When it is signed, work can commence.

- A word from the Finance Team We have chosen York Traditions for the building loan. We have moved our daily operations money to York Traditions. The finalization of the loan will be completed as soon as the 2016 audit from RKL is complete.
  - Implications for our congregation Currently we have 120 family units who have made commitments totaling \$838.500. Just under \$200,000 cash has been received. Please continue to send in your commitments and contributions.
- A word from the Organ Company On Monday June 26 the organ console will be removed. All organ chambers will be sealed to protect them from debris and dust during the construction.

a. What does this mean for the congregation? We will be using the piano and harpsicord for worship during construction.
