Consecration Sunday October 22

When Jesus says "if any want to become my followers let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me" he is inviting us into a committed way of life. On Consecration Sunday in the presence of God and of one another we make our commitment known in very real and tangible ways.

First there is the matter of our time and ability. All of us are given the same amount of time. We each have 24 hours in a day. As people of God a portion of our time is to be utilized in service to God and our neighbor. Things like, daily prayer, weekly worship, sharing in some aspect of our life and mission at St. Paul's, are all part of using time for God and neighbor. Then there is the matter of our ability. All of us are given ability too! This is where the beauty of God's diverse gift set is made known. Here again as people of God some aspect of our varied abilities are to be utilized in service to God and our neighbor. One way to help figure out how to faithfully use our time and ability is through the simple form published annually to assist with the ministry of the congregation. There are a wide variety of things that require time and ability of our members in order to carry out our mission "To teach the world that God is love." So please, look over the form, and decide how you would like to use some of your time and ability for the up-building of the kingdom of God. (A copy of the form is included with this mailing) Check off a few boxes and complete the form bringing it with you to worship at one of three service times; 8:00, 9:15, or 10:30 a.m., on Consecration Sunday.

Second there is the matter of our financial gifts. Our financial situations are all different. They vary about as much as our talents. But one thing is consistent, God is, has been, and will continue to provide for our earthly needs. Consecration Sunday serves as a day when we spend some time in thoughtful reflection about what God has done, is doing, and promises yet to do in our lives. During the month of October make time in your daily devotions and prayer to consider anew what God can do through your financial gifts to St. Paul's. But mostly reflect on God's gracious goodness to you, to your family, and to the community. Living generous lives really does have something to do with our generosity to others. Then, after prayerful consideration and thoughtful reflection, complete a 2018 Commitment Card and bring it with you to worship on October 22 and place it at the altar as a sign of your consecrating your life; time, talents and possessions, to the Lord.

The Stewardship Committee is at work throughout the year preparing for the annual Consecration Sunday Celebration. This year it will be a bit different due to the renewing of our building for ministry. But do plan to come. Do prepare. Do pray. Because following Jesus demands that we take up cross and follow him. Consecrating our life to him draws each of us closer to Our Savior and Lord and closer together as a faith community.

Always Being Made New—Theological Education

St. Paul in his letter to the Romans writes But how are they to call on one in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in one of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone to proclaim him? And how are they to proclaim him unless they are sent? As it is written "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!" (Romans 10:14 &15) Theological education has been our commitment during this calendar year. We have been collecting special gifts through the use of the yellow col-



ored monthly envelopes in our envelope boxes, and by placing gifts in the "Special Envelopes" that are available on the table prior to entering into the Chapel space for worship. Our gifts for theological education are critical. In order to prepare men and women for Gospel Ministry we need to have the financial resources to support and sustain anyone entering into a call in ministry. The theological landscape is changing. Seminaries in all church bodies are seeking quality candidates for ministry. Lutherans are no different. We need to raise up pastors and deacons who will bring good news. One of the hurdles for most seminarians is the escalating costs of theological education. By supporting the leaders fund we will help ease that burden. With ample financial resources available we have lessened one burden thus making it more accessible for those who sense a call to Gospel ministry. On Reformation Sunday, October 29, we will receive a special offering for theological education. This has been our practice for many years and seems to be especially fitting on this the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation. Please give generously. Come to worship prepared to make your gift. Keep the seminaries, the candidacy committees, and all candidates for ministry in your prayers during this month of October. Renewal calls for beautiful feet, people who will bring the message of hope and salvation made known through Christ Jesus our Lord.

Renovation Up-date 9-11-17

Keeping Church members, Preschool families, and Fellowship Groups apprised of the work schedule

Things Accomplished

Church pews removed and stored off site

Demolition begun on the church nave and chancel and on the upper level (south wing) future preschool classrooms

Piano and harpsichord removed and stored in climate controlled storage off site

Parking plan for Diakon adoption and foster care, construction workers, and church staff so as to provide the majority of spaces for preschool families which are closest to the preschool entrance

Phase II permits completed

Fire and security monitoring transferred to the new firm who will up-date the new system need for the renovated spaces and monitor it going forward

Secured a spider web of electrical wires some of which were live under the scout room

Things Beginning Subject to change without notice

Asbestos abatement scheduled to begin in the church nave 9-12-17. Remember that these are professional people who are licensed and meet all state and federal regulations. The areas of the building affected by the abatement process will be completely secured.

Jack hammering out stone and placing in dumpster (This will be noisy this week). It is imperative that this stage gets completed as quickly as possible so that the infill needed to level the floor has 30 days of curing time plus an additional 10 days to allow the new maple wood flooring to acclimate prior to installation.

Submitting for structural steel, aluminum, glass, door frames and hardware

Removing the carpet in the Fellowship Hall 9-13-17, removal of basketball boards, frames and hoops in preparation for new heating and cooling systems to be installed

Framers will begin on the upper level (south wing) future preschool classrooms

Pack, label and prepare to move the preschool storage and office materials



Treasurer, Tony Culp, reported that there are a few items needed before the first draft of the budget can be presented to the Council for its consideration. The proposed budget to be presented to the congregation will be approved at the November meeting of the Council.

The Council/Committee Chairs Retreat was discussed. The Executive Committee will set the date at its next meeting. The Council Liaisons were reminded to invite Committee chairs to the retreat. This led to some discussion of topics that might be on the agenda for the retreat.

As committee reports were heard, there was a lively discussion about the question of how might St. Paul's operate after the renovation is completed. Questions such as maintenance of the building were raised.

I would like to commend the congregation for how we have accommodated the changes that have occurred in the two weeks since we stopped using the nave for worship. We have unexpectedly moved from the gym upstairs to the chapel which then has been arranged in two different seating patterns. All of this has been accomplished with good humor and in fact with a number of positive comments about the worship space.

When Tim Yakim reported on the renovation update the last Sunday we used the nave, he warned us that change was coming. It has come sooner than we expected and we have handled it well. We know more change is coming. Let us all pray for the patience and good humor to take it in stride and continue to do God's work.

and gifts to be put to God's good use. And please remember, as renovation construction progresses, some of these events may need to change. Thanks in advance for your flexibility.


