

182nd Anniversary Service February 18, 9:15 a.m.

On the First Sunday in Lent we mark the anniversary of our 182 years of Gospel Ministry in York. In those early days we were a newly forming faith community alive with a mission. The mission then was to welcome the local community to a traditional Lutheran service. The unique feature in 1836 was that the liturgy would be in English rather than German. Guests could fully participate without having the barrier of language to hold them back. This year we find ourselves in a similar situation, alive with a mission to teach the world that God is love. And while we don't have beautifully finished spaces in which to gather, we have been removing barriers making it possible and easier for guests and members to fully participate in all aspects of our ministry. On this anniversary our future is bright and hopeful. On February 18th please invite friends, neighbors, and former members to join with us in worship.



Ash Wednesday February 14

Every year we begin our Lenten journey with an Ash Wednesday observance. It is hard to imagine that in the early days of Christendom this season once emphasized the joy and triumph of Easter. Over many years it switched its tone from joy to the more somber contemplation of Christ's sufferings and death and our personal penitence. Lutheran's have tried in our observance to allow the season to rightly commemorate those events in the life of Christ that will be



highlighted during Holy Week, and the need for our personal self-examination, repentance and growth in faith and grace. During these 40 days of Lent (remember that Sundays were never fast days, being in Lent but not of Lent) opportunities for personal growth in faith and grace abound: Sunday worship, adult Sunday education with Pastor Snyder, New Member's Class with Pastor Reep, Daily devotional books, Lutheran Tutoring program, Tuesday Food Pantry Volunteer, Wednesday Bible study, Handbell and Chancel Choir, increased financial giving through stewardship awareness. These are beginning places. Committed engagement with one or more of them during this Lenten season will indeed draw you closer to God and closer to members of our faith community. With the ever changing schedule of work associated with construction we will have one Ash Wednesday liturgy at 7:00 p.m. February 14 in the church nave.

A Word about Our Renovation

In the journey to renewal there are often times you feel bogged down, like you aren't making progress. This is true with renewal of diet, trying to eat healthier; true with exercise, trying to be more active and fit; true with education, as you work toward completion of a class; true with playing an instrument, as you prac-



tice; true with prayer, as you seek to be more devout. These I have experienced. You may say that they have prepared me for the renewal of our church building. Somedays it seems like we are at a standstill. However, day after day the workers continue installing duct work, running wiring, framing walls, roughing in plumbing, and laying sub-flooring. There has been a bit of fresh paint and a new floor added to what was the former scout room. The church nave is having the heating system installed; the glaziers have measured for the glass narthex wall, the emergency lighting and fire alarm system is being strategically installed, asbestos continues to be removed, and those of us who work in the building continue our jobs figuring out how to maneuver around the next obstacle. I have physically held one of the new light fixtures for the nave. It is compact; an LED unit that we are informed will reduce consumption and provide better illumination. It will alleviate the need to lower fixtures or reach them by lift. No longer will the glass globes need to be washed, dried, and repositioned, nor will people be able to point out which light bulbs in the chandelier have burned out and the cumulative total needing to be replaced. The six inch gas line that once fueled the old furnace has been removed and replaced with a smaller line about the diameter of my thumb. The new heating and cooling system is zoned so that we have control over which rooms and spaces we heat and cool. Exterior stainless steel vents have sprung up around the brick exterior of the church. Imagine vents leading from restrooms directly out of doors! While none of this seems all that religious or even interesting, I am aware that these are the things that will greatly assist the next generation of worshipers at St. Paul's. Consumption of electricity and natural gas will be greatly reduced. This will be better for the environment and better for the annual budget. The ease and use of the building, reducing trip hazards, smoothing out floors, and creating spaces that reflect 21st century life will strengthen the ministry that is carried out from the building. While it seems that we are at a plateau, I am sure that we are heading in the right direction, progress indeed is being made, and that patience continues to be a "Fruit of the Spirit" (Galatians 5:22). Soon we will embark on our annual Lenten journey. There are many things that are beyond our control. Be faithful in worship, prayer, offerings, and acts of kindness. These four are within reach for each of us. Together we can do all things through Christ who strengthens us. Building in faith for future generations, let us continue to proclaim the mighty deeds of God!



Reorganization for Usher Teams –One Month In

In this new year anticipating finished worship space, gathering space and narthex we have reorganized Usher Teams. For many years, we operated with three teams serving for a month at a time. The Worship and Arts Committee discussed the need for a total overhaul of our current system. They are in the process of drafting a new Usher manual/handbook to help us all work together in renewed spaces. We began in January trying a 5 team system with each team taking one Sunday each month, the first week,

second week, third week, and fourth week leaving the fifth Sunday of each month team to also provide ushering service on mid—week Holy Day liturgies like Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. With one combined liturgy on Sunday morning at 9:15 a.m. this allows for more people to be involved while at the same time reducing the work load of serving for an entire month. We are blessed to have Ushers who also serve as Assisting Ministers, Deacons, and Communion Assistants. With this in mind the February Serving Schedule identifies 2 ushers needed for the balcony and 4 ushers needed on the main floor. On large Feast Days we may need to go back to the days of needing 8 ushers on the main floor and 2 ushers in the balcony (we can utilize members from team 5 to augment the usher corps). It was intentional that the teams comprise worshipers from both of the previous worship times and ushers have met new friends with whom they serve! Working together we are getting to know one another and strengthening the community of faith at St. Paul's Church. Thank you for your willingness to try this new approach to ushering.

Children's Sunday Morning Classes

February - March

The lessons for the season of Epiphany focus on the life and teachings of Jesus. The Children will be presented with stories and activities to engage them in their faith formation and learning.
