Holy Week Schedule

Sunday of the Passion/Palm Sunday

April 14, Combined Liturgy 9:15 AM

In this liturgy our collective attention is drawn to the Passion of our Lord Jesus and the powerful drama of Holy Week. The Cherub Choir singing *Shout Hosanna* will begin the liturgy. The procession Hymn will gather all of our voices in joy and gladness as we remember the day when Jesus entered Jerusalem and the crowds shouted hosanna, waved branches of palm, and laid clothing on the road to carpet his path. They proclaimed him king. Quickly the liturgy takes a solemn tone as we read together the passion narrative from the gospel of Luke. We are made aware that we not only shout "Hosanna," but we shout "Crucify him" too. A Festival Choir comprised of members from both the 8:00 AM & 10:30 AM service times will provide stirring music amplifying the solemnity of the day.

Maundy Thursday/Holy Thursday

April 18, 7:00 PM

Maundy Thursday is the beginning of the Triduum. This is one large liturgy spread across three days. Historically it has been called The Great Three Days. The first part of the three part liturgy is begun on Maundy Thursday. The service begins with the sermon and then is followed by confession with individual absolution. Foot washing and Holy Communion are historic components as we reflect on the new commandment that we "love one another."

Good Friday/ The Way of the Cross Organ and Art

April 19, Noon

Our organist Victor Fields will present a music and art depiction on the Way of the Cross. This will feature organ music about - "The Way of the Cross" by the 20th French virtuoso organist and composer Marcel Dupré. Artwork shown on a projection screen will accompany the dramatic music. This presentation will allow you to reflect on the drama and passion that our Lord Jesus endured on the way to the Cross. This music it will be a way to guide you through Good Friday during Holy Week.

Good Friday April 19, 7:00 PM

Good Friday focuses our attention on the crucifixion and death of the Lord Jesus. The liturgy is the second portion of the Triduum and is the most solemn service in our Christian faith. The church appointments reflect the day. A large wooden cross is placed before us. The Passion according to St. John is read, the litany prayed, and then concludes with the reproaches from the cross. We depart the church in silence, reverencing the cross, and preparing for the Vigil of Easter.

Holy Saturday/Vigil of Easter

April 20, 7:00 PM

The Vigil of Easter begins with a new fire. We gather at the Garden of Memory. Here from this place associated with death we begin the third portion of the Triduum. The Vigil of Easter is the first celebration of our Lord's Resurrection. We move from the Garden of Memory into the darkened church where we hear salvation history recounted through a series of readings from Holy Scripture. The sacrament of Holy Baptism is celebrated. Prayers are offered. We make the transition from darkness to light, from death to resurrection as the first hymn of Easter is sung. The Easter gospel is read, Holy Communion celebrated and we joyfully take our leave anticipating the full glorious celebration of Easter on Sunday morning.

The Resurrection of Our Lord/ Easter Sunday

April 21, Combined Liturgy 9:15 AM

This liturgy is the Queen of feasts. We will gather as one assembly to bear witness to the joyous news from the tomb that "Christ is Risen!" This proclamation will be shouted from our lips on the day of resurrection as we begin the liturgy. Then, like powerful ocean waves, the message of hope and salvation will be proclaimed by the children in the Cantabile Choir, and then by the adults in the Handbell Choir, and by the combined voices of the Festival Choir, and by the sermon, and through the Holy Communion. With brass, organ, and timpani we will raise our song of gladness and sing our alleluias. With joy and gladness we bear witness to what God has done, is doing, and promises yet to do leading us forth to proclaim resurrection and hope through our words and deeds. A time of refreshment will follow in the narthex and Good Shepherd Gathering space.



This past December I was chatting with some fellow parishioners in the gathering space about what our renovation project enables St. Paul's to accomplish in terms of its mission and ministry. That's when it hit me. We'll never know for sure, but this effort to *Build in Faith for Future Generations* could make the difference for our congregation surviving the next fifty years. Am I exaggerating? I don't think so. The general state of main-

line protestant churches is that you fall into one of two bins: either you're changing and adapting, or your numbers are dwindling.

I spoke at three services in December and January about an opportunity for everyone to update your Capital Campaign pledge cards. There are many reasons you may want to consider this: you see the impact the project is having, your own finances are clearer, we took an additional \$600k loan, or (my favorite) you're a new member! We highlighted opportunities that you could (1) make a first-time pledge, (2) update your pledge amount, or (3) extend your pledge beyond the 3-year campaign. If you haven't already considered a pledge update, now is the time!

I want everyone to have a clear picture of the current state of the campaign and our most important financial goal. (I will use very round numbers.) We currently have a bridge loan for construction that carries us through August 2020. At that time, we will need to consolidate our debt in a conventional mortgage. The overall cost of the project is around \$4M. **Our goal is to reduce renovation debt to \$2M by August 2020.** Why? We have trust income that can sustain a loan of that magnitude (interest and principal), freeing our annual budget from responsibilities of a mortgage. Our Capital Campaign goal is to pay for everything *above* that \$2M by August 2020. You may point to our sizable investment portfolio. Why not use that resource to pay our debts down to the \$2M goal? Everyone must understand that we currently use revenue from the investment portfolio to fund ministry in our operating budget. Using our investments to fund the Capital Campaign would subsequently lessen our yearly budget; we would lose the opportunity to continue ministry in our current capacity. Our hope then is to not use the investment portfolio nor diminish our capacity for future ministry.

How are we progressing towards our Capital Campaign goal? We have currently received about \$1M in Capital Campaign pledges, and \$500k of that has been fulfilled. To ensure that we reduce our debts to the \$2M goal by August 2020, we will need to receive another \$1.5M in cash by that date (\$1M above the current pledge amount.) That is daunting when I look at it, but we are not the first generation of St. Paul's to build in faith. From striking out as the first English-speaking Lutheran church west of the Susquehanna, to building on our current grounds at the southern gateway of the city, we have always stretched our bounds for the advancement of our mission to teach the world that God is Love.



Children - Sunday morning classes for children 9:15-10:15AM, infants through grade 6




Monitor screens for electronic bulletin boards. 3 are needed at \$2,500 each.

GARDEN OF MEMORY- It is now nearly eleven years since we celebrated the completion of the columbarium on the corner of our property at S. George Street and Springettysbury Avenue, making an improvement to both the neighborhood and our beautiful grounds. Responsible stewardship of the creation God gave us grows, making cremation a popular choice for the "end of life" decisions. It is not or ever will be our intent to make a profit from this service. The intent is to offer an affordable and dignified alternative to current members, former members, and faithful friends. As the pricing was fourteen years ago it remains the same today, ranging from \$250 to \$1500. If you have spiritual concerns regarding cremation Pastor Reep (717-843-8155) will personally meet with you to answer your questions. Should you want to pursue the details of this service, we have a packet of information that will be provided to you by calling the church office to pick up or have it sent (717-843-8155). The current membership of the Columbarium committee is Tom Ruth, chairman, Pastor Reep, Bob Little, Ron Sturges and Larry Gross , all of whom will be glad to answer your questions and/or help you with the documentation should your choice be cremation and internment in our Garden of Memory .


Our Church in the mail and email too!
