Ash Wednesday, February 26 Noon at Luther Memorial & 7:00 PM at St. Paul's

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent. It has historically been a day of great solemnity in the church. It is a day for us to recommit ourselves to the disciplines of Christian life. Fasting, prayer, devotion, self-denial, and worship all help to focus our attention on the One who loves us so much that he comes among us, lives with us, dies for us and is raised up so that we have life now and for eternity. Both services will include a Len-

ten Confession, imposition of ashes, and Holy Communion.

Pastor Laura Haupt (Luther Memorial) and Pastor Reep (St. Paul's) have teamed up for this year's Ash Wednesday Services. Luther Memorial will host a noontime liturgy with lunch to follow. St. Paul's will host a 7:00 PM liturgy with a super preceding it at 6:00 PM in Christ Hall. Both Pastors will take part at both locations with Pastor Haupt presiding and Pastor Reep preaching.

The Worship and Arts Committee provides meaningful opportunities for worship and prayer throughout the Lenten season. With the addition of meals provided at noon (Luther Memorial) and 6:00 PM (St. Paul's) on Ash Wednesday they hope that you will observe this Holy Day and begin the season of Lent with confession, prayer, worship and Christian fellowship.

Garden of Memory- On November 1, 2009 we celebrated the completion of the columbarium on the corner of our property at S. George Street and Springettsbury Avenue, making an improvement to both the neighborhood and our beautiful grounds. Responsible stewardship of the creation God gave us grows, making cremation a popular choice for the "end of life" decisions. It is not or ever will be our intent to make a profit from this service. The intent is to offer an affordable and dignified alternative to current members, former members, and faithful friends. As the pricing was in 2009, it remains the same today, ranging from \$250 to \$1500. If you have spiritual concerns regarding cremation Pastor Reep (717-843-8155) will personally meet with you to answer your questions. Should you want to pursue the details of this service, we have a packet of information that will be provided to you by calling the church office to pick up or have it sent (717-843-8155). The current membership of the Columbarium committee is Tom Ruth, Pastor Reep, Bob Little, Ron Sturges and Larry Gross, all of whom will be glad to answer your questions and/or help you with the documentation should your choice be cremation and internment in our Garden of Memory.

10 Years of Cookie Walks Lives and Communities Transformed

The pattern of ministry leads us from one thing to the next. We share ideas, pray, plan, work, and bring many things to fruition. That is our way. Rarely do we reflect on what has been accomplished, because we are on to the next thing. For a people who weekly remember all that God has done for us in Christ Jesus, and recall those mighty acts specifically in the Eucharistic Prayer, you would think that such a pattern would influence the whole of our lives in ministry. At this ten year interval of holding "Cookie Walks" at St. Paul's it is fitting that we spend some time remembering what God



has accomplished through us and the ingredients needed for baked goods, and the vast volunteer hours!

Ten years ago when we prepared for our first cookie walk the Mpuguso Committee members were so worried. Would people sign up to bake cookies? Would people volunteer to help the day of the walk? Would people bring enough cookies to fill the display trays and would there be a wide variety? Would people show up to make a purchase and support the mission projects? Yes, congregation members did sign up and they did volunteer to work and they did bake a wide variety of cookies to fill the trays! But even so, the first year we sold out too soon! Each subsequent year the committee learned new things, and implemented them in planning for the next season. Ten years have come and gone. The cookie walk brought about the transformation of lives and communities.

In Tanzania the revenue from the cookie walk provided sewing machines so that women could sew school uniforms for the children of the community. Affordable uniforms mean that local families can utilize their limited finances for basic essentials. The walk provided a kitchen for their preschool so that daily meals could be prepared and served to the children. This insured that children were receiving at least one nutritious meal each day. The kitchen would also service young women boarding at the hostel during the week while they are taking classes at the local school. The walk provided tuition, books and supplies so that medical officers could be properly trained and credentialed. The medical offers will work off their educational expenses by serving at the local hospital for a specified number of years; a service repayable loan. This year's walk raised \$2,272.00 to provide for expenses associated with a medical officer.

In York the walk provided a catalyst for our congregation to come together working for a unified purpose. With such broad based participation new friendships were formed, congregants were able to contribute in a meaningful way to a project of global proportion. A short term commitment yielded a long term transformation through enhancing the education of others. The greater York community responded favorably to the walk, grateful for the delicious baked goods at holiday time, but also providing an opportunity for us to tell our story, the story of God's love, generosity, compassion, and hope for all people.

In a spirit of gratitude and appreciation we applaud; planners, bakers, workers, walkers, and the tireless efforts of the Mpuguso Committee for allowing us to participated in ministry that has truly transformed lives and communities. Thank you for this 10 year ministry placing us in relationship with sisters and brothers in Tanzania. While our official relationship is much longer, the work accomplished through the 10 years of "Cookie Walks" held at St. Paul's gives us opportunity to pause, celebrate, and give thanks to God for calling us together in mission.

Preschool

The children and staff at St. Paul's Lutheran Preschool had a busy month in December celebrating Christmas. As part of Christmas preparations, the school collected many winter hats, mittens, gloves, and scarves for food pantry families who were so grateful for these donations. Following Christmas break, the students have returned and the church is alive again with the sounds of children at work and play. Early in January, the preschool arranged to have The Whitaker Center come to the preschool

as part of the center's Whitaker on Wheels (W.O.W.) program. The W.O.W. program presented a STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) activity to all of our preschool students and the children enjoyed learning about the chemistry of color. The teachers also spent January talking about Community Helpers and will continue to discuss how the children can be helpers too. The preschool will begin registration for the 2020/2021 calendar year with an Open House scheduled for February 8th.

Preschool Open House Saturday, February 8

On Saturday February 8th from 9:30-11:30 AM members of our Preschool staff will be available to answer questions regarding St. Paul's Preschool and enrolling children for the fall program. We offer classes for two year olds, three year olds, and four year olds. Children must be the appropriate age by August 31st. Opportunities range from two days per week for 2 year olds, to five days per week



for 4 year olds. Additionally a student can have an extended day by signing up for PM Pals. Members of St. Paul's receive a discount as do families who have two or more children enrolled. The Open House provides another opportunity for us to reach out to our neighborhood. Please share this information with others to whom it may be interest. Council Highlights

The Congregational Council met for its monthly meeting on Monday, January 13th. The meeting was opened with prayer by Harold Sargeant. Treasurer O'Connor continues to work on the mortgage loan with Fulton Bank. The paperwork has been started, and council approved a motion that allows Peter O'Connor to sign the mortgage documents when they are ready within the next few weeks.

We then discussed a few items of Old Business. As we continue the transition to utilize all the newly renovated spaces, we are looking forward to implementing more procedures and policies to ensure the best experience for staff, parish, and community groups at St. Paul's. This includes the new Building Use Policy which was updated based on feedback from Patee and approved by council. We also discussed the potential to budget for capital expenditures unrelated to the renovation (e.g. the Sound System). New Business included setting a date in late Winter for the council retreat, and how to make the Nursery Facilities more welcoming for young families.

The Pastor's Report reflected on Advent and Christmas worship. Having the services at 7pm and 9pm worked well in that people were coming as people from the first service were leaving. It was wonderful that both handbell and vocal choirs did both services. We had 300 at first service, 150 at second and about 50 on Christmas Day.

The meeting was closed with prayer by Denise Rider.
