Sabbaticals: Periodic Sabbath Rest

A sabbatical is a period of rest with a purpose. Rooted in the Old Testament is a command for rest in a pattern of sevens: work six days, rest on the seventh; work the land six years, allow it to rest in the seventh, etc. During the Middle Ages, schools of higher education began to grant their instructors leave of absence every seven years to help them renew their passion for their subject. The pattern of work-rest is as important now as it was then and it is within this context that the pastor sabbatical was created.

It has been found that a sabbatical strengthens and further develops a pastor's ability to serve the

church. Pastors typically gain new perspectives, deepening their own insight and positively affecting their preaching and service. Pastors become renewed spiritually through rest and education and typically come away from sabbaticals with renewed passion and vision. At the Annual Meeting in November, the Congregational Council reported that, in accordance with the Guidelines for Sabbatical Leave of the Lower Susquehanna Synod (every seven years) and in recognition of the toll that our renovation project has taken on him, Pastor Reep has been granted his second sabbatical at St. Paul's. Some of you may not remember Pastor Reep's first Sabbatical 6 years ago, granted well past the first seven years of his ministry with us! He enjoyed time painting in Italy, visiting family across the U.S., learning at Chautauqua Institute in N.Y., and relaxing with friends at the lake. He returned with a passion and vision for St. Paul's that brought our building into the 21st century, opening up ministry potential for us to live into our mission, "To teach the world that God is love".

A subcommittee has been appointed to work with the Bishop and Pastor Reep in this process. It is the plan for Pastor Reep to enjoy a sabbatical in the summer of 2021 (yes, that would be 8 years but he's been rather busy!). The subcommittee will update the congregation with every step of the planning process and share more information about sabbaticals over the next year. Look for the special "Sabbatical Box" in the upcoming newsletters, bulletins, and easel boards. Questions can be addressed to the subcommittee members: Harold Sargeant, Rhada Hartmann, and Joe Kinkella. Please pray for the subcommittee as it works towards a plan for a much needed and deserved Sabbath rest for Pastor Reep and the church.

Annual Meeting Summary

The Annual Meeting of the congregation was held on November 17, 2019. This year the Fellowship Committee provided a wide variety of pasta dishes, salad, and deserts. The delicious meal and joyful table fellowship helped to set the tone for the meeting. The Fellowship hall lighting allowed for the main section to be darkened for viewing the power point presentations while allowing for light on the buffet tables and play area for the children. The meeting was opened with prayer by Pastor Reep. Trisan Ericson, Council President, presented the agenda, presided over the elections and shared examples of the scope of ministry carried out by St. Paul's. Peter O'Conor, Treasurer, presented the proposed 2020 ministry budget, responded to questions, and presented a power point graphing income and expense. He also led the discussion on moving from the construction interest only loan toward securing a 20 year mortgage. The 2020 budget was approved as presented. Also approved was the decision to move forward with a mortgage utilizing monies from the Wilmington Trust Investment portfolio to get us to a \$2,250,000 mortgage amount. Written reports were submitted by all of the staff and committee chairs. Copies of the 2019 Bulletin of Reports are available in the Good Shepherd Gathering Space.



Building Use Policy

With the renovation complete we find ourselves receiving many and varied requests for the use of our facilities. This precipitated the need for a new policy for utilization of the building. The Congregation Council appointed a sub-committee to draft a Building Use Policy. The group utilized a model provided by the ELCA. Sections were added to reflect particulars of St. Paul's and that it was in compliance with our insurance carrier. The Property Committee then reviewed it and sent it back to Council for final approval. Soon it will be the document that will be utilized for all requests for use of the building. This will be something new for us as

in the past members wanting to utilize the building would simply ask the Pastor or Secretary. Please know that the form is not overly complex and that it is an important step in our living into a new facility.



The Chancel Choir has Thursday night rehearsals beginning at 7:30 p.m. in the Music Room. Anyone is invited to sing in the choir. Most of the choir members do read music but that is not mandatory. A love of singing and making music for the Lord is the heart and soul of the choir.

Council Highlights

The regular meeting of the Congregation Council was held at the home of Tristan Ericson, President, on December 9, 2019. The meeting was preceded by a dinner at 6:00 PM. The meeting commenced following the meal.

Those in attendance were: Tony Culp, Tristan Ericson, Dan Garber, Peter O'Conor, Pastor Stan Reep, Denise Rider, Harold Sargeant, Kem Vaught, newly elected Ellen Doughty, and special guest, Bishop James Dunlop.

Excused from the meeting were: Nancy Bennett, Richard Griffin, Kathleen Lemke, Jeff Riese, Patty Snyder, Kathryn Wicker, and Tim Yakim.

President Ericson called the meeting to order and provided the opening prayer and devotional reflection. He utilized St. Paul's understanding of the church as the body of Christ as he gave thought to the way the St. Paul's congregation functions. He shared his own observation as to how each member of the body is important; each committee and group within the congregation supporting the whole. He asked the council to complete the blank in the following statement. "It is a ______ time at St. Paul's right now. Council members provided a variety of response: exciting, joyous, new, refreshing, challenging, tricky, and good. Conversation ensued.

The agenda was approved as presented.

The minutes from the November meeting were reviewed and approved.

Old Business included the building use policy. Harold provided up-dates on some minor changes to the use form in order to provide the office and staff with clearer information and expectation. It was added that we need to plan and budget for extra staff hours when called for based on the organization utilizing the facility. Harold also provided from the Sabbatical Committee a time line of key events and information needing to be completed and communicated as we move toward the summer of 2021 when plans for Pastor Reep to be away from the parish on sabbatical.

The president reported on the three priorities from the half year retreat: financial outlook, engaging new members and families to St. Paul's, and committee structure. He also gathered feedback from the annual meeting held in November. The overall consensus was that it was a very positive experience for the participants. The power point, the energy regarding ministry and the tone were all beneficial. We would like to try and attract more of our newer members and their families to participate. The suggestion to send out a follow up card about the action taken, tone of the meeting and the importance of taking part in our mission was offered.

New business began with the election of officers. Tristan Ericson, President and Kathryn Wicker, Secretary were nominated and approved. Ellen Doughty was nominated and approved as Vice-President. The Treasurer position will continue with Peter O'Conor until we have more time to consider a workable plan in January. This was moved and approved.

Bishop Dunlop brought greetings from our Synod and announced his desire to be with us was to say thank you for our faithful and ongoing Mission Support. He then shared the importance of our work and mission together; raising up new leaders, providing resources and assistance to congregations, working to redevelop congregations, establishing new worshiping communities, support of our church camps, and the sustaining work of our companion synod and global partners.

The Pastor's written report was provided.

Adjournment followed with closing prayer given by Tony Culp.






God's Global Barnyard 2019-20

These goats, pigs, chickens, and honeybees will help provide a sustainable living for families eager to support themselves. All we have to do is find the *quarter tube* in Good Shepherd Hall where our 3rd and 4th grade Sunday schoolers have set up the God's Global Barnyard center, and deposit your quarters. You also may make contributions in other forms clearly designated. In addition, your generous Advent offerings will be given to this meaningful ministry. A big thank you to our 3rd and 4th graders for spearheading this project.

Garden of Memory- On November 1, 2009 we celebrated the completion of the columbarium on the corner of our property at S. George Street and Springettsbury Avenue, making an improvement to both the neighborhood and our beautiful grounds. Responsible stewardship of the creation God gave us grows, making cremation a popular choice for the "end of life" decisions. It is not or ever will be our intent to make a profit from this service. The intent is to offer an affordable and dignified alternative to current members, former members, and faithful friends. As the pricing was in 2009, it remains the same today, ranging from \$250 to \$1500. If you have spiritual concerns regarding cremation Pastor Reep (717-843-8155) will personally meet with you to answer your questions. Should you want to pursue the details of this service, we have a packet of information that will be provided to you by calling the church office to pick up or have it sent (717-843-8155). The current membership of the Columbarium committee is Tom Ruth, Pastor Reep, Bob Little, Ron Sturges and Larry Gross, all of whom will be glad to answer your questions and/or help you with the documentation should your choice be cremation and internment in our Garden of Memory.


