



¹As he walked along, he saw a man blind from birth. ²His disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" ³Jesus answered, "Neither this man nor his parents sinned; he was born blind so that God's works might be revealed in him. ⁴We must work the works of him who sent me while it is day; night is coming when no one can work. ⁵As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world." ⁶When he had said this, he spat on the ground and made mud with the saliva and spread the mud on the man's eyes, ⁷saying to him, "Go, wash in the pool of Silo-am" (which means Sent). Then he went and washed and came back able to see. ⁸The neighbors and those who had seen him before as a beggar began to ask, "Is this not the man who used to sit and beg?" ⁹Some were saying, "It is he." Others were saying, "No, but it is someone like him." He kept saying, "I am the man." ¹⁰But they kept asking him, "Then how were your eyes opened?" ¹¹He answered, "The man called Jesus made mud, spread it on my eyes, and said to me, 'Go to Siloam and wash.' Then I went and washed and received my sight." ¹²They said to him, "Where is he?" He said, "I do not know."

¹³They brought to the Pharisees the man who had formerly been blind. ¹⁴Now it was a sabbath day when Jesus made the mud and opened his eyes. ¹⁵Then the Pharisees also began to ask him how he had received his sight. He said to them, "He put mud on my eyes. Then I washed, and now I see." ¹⁶Some of the Pharisees said, "This man is not from God, for he does not observe the sabbath." But others said, "How can a man who is a sinner perform such signs?" And they were divided. ¹⁷So they said again to the blind man, "What do you say about him? It was your eyes he opened." He said, "He is a prophet."

¹⁸The Jews did not believe that he had been blind and had received his sight until they called the parents of the man who had received his sight ¹⁹and asked them, "Is this your son, who you say was born blind? How then does he now see?" ²⁰His parents answered, "We know that this is our son, and that he was born blind; ²¹but we do not know how it is that now he sees, nor do we know who opened his eyes. Ask him; he is of age. He will speak for himself." ²²His parents said this because they were afraid of the Jews; for the Jews had already agreed that anyone who confessed Jesus to be the Messiah would be put out of the synagogue. ²³Therefore his parents said, "He is of age; ask him."

²⁴So for the second time they called the man who had been blind, and they said to him, "Give glory to God! We know that this man is a sinner." ²⁵He answered, "I do not know whether he is a sinner. One thing I do know, that though I was blind, now I see." ²⁶They said to him, "What did he do to you? How did he open your eyes?" ²⁷He answered them, "I have told you already, and you would not listen. Why do you want to hear it again? Do you also want to become his disciples?" ²⁸Then they reviled him, saying, "You are his disciple, but we are disciples of Moses.²⁹We know that God has spoken to Moses, but as for this man, we do not know where he comes from." ³⁰The man answered, "Here is an astonishing thing! You do not know where he comes from, and yet he opened my eyes. ³¹We know that God does not listen to sinners, but he does listen to one who worships him and obeys his will. ³²Never since the world began has it been heard that anyone opened the eves of a person born blind. ³³If this man were not from God, he could do nothing." ³⁴They answered him, "You were born entirely in sins, and are you trying to teach us?" And they drove him out. ³⁵Jesus heard that they had driven him out, and when he found him, he said, "Do you believe in the Son of Man?" ³⁶He answered, "And who is he, sir? Tell me, so that I may believe in him." ³⁷Jesus said to him, "You have seen him, and the one speaking with you is he." ³⁸He said, "Lord, I believe." And he worshiped him. ³⁹Jesus said, "I came into this world for judgment so that those who do not see may see, and those who do see may become blind." ⁴⁰Some of the Pharisees near him heard this and said to him, "Surely we are not blind, are we?" ⁴¹Jesus said to them, "If you were blind, you would not have sin. But now that you say, 'We see,' your sin remains."

POSTLUDE /

Healer of Our Every Ill

It has been a bit like the blind leading the blind these last few days. Things that once seemed to be easy, comfortable, second nature, have in the wake of COVID 19 made me feel like a blind man; uncertain of the terrain, the direction I am heading, a complete lack of vision.

Vision was to be a major part of our Council and Committee Chairperson retreat last weekend. The conversation surrounding the insights gained through our Stewardship emphasis last fall. Those conversations were diminished in the wake of the ever changing Coronavirus situation. That however does not reduce the importance of vision; for the congregation, for the neighborhood, for global mission. Vision is new birth. We heard a lot about new birth in the third chapter of John, that night that Nicodemus came to Jesus. Today it is the new birth brought on by Jesus restoring vision to a blind man.

The man born blind who sat and begged; he was given vision and new birth. That's what these first seven verses are all about; new birth, restoration, healing, life. This is a miracle story. Jesus is doing something that bears witness to God's divine purpose. In this case, Jesus is opening up eyes that were closed from birth. Spit, dirt, mud, "Go" wash; the man is given vision. Jesus does something to point out what God is up to. But it doesn't seem to matter what God is up to, we human creatures tend to focus on ourselves. We are always concerned about things changing, and with the beggar being restored, well that seems to threaten the rest of the community. It is often interpreted as "there must be less health and wellness for me."

The remaining section of the gospel reading from John unfolds in six units. Each unit is in response to the original miracle story which we have just heard.

Vision is new birth. Well not exactly for the neighbors. Verses 8-12 bear out that the neighbors prefer to see things the way they always have. Jesus does something that exceeds hope, and the neighbors argue among themselves. Why they aren't even certain that this is the man who has been begging from them for years and even when he assures them that he is the man, they argue!

Vision is new birth. Well not exactly for the Pharisees either. Verses 13-17 make it pretty clear that they prefer to see what the law says. It can't be of God or from God because it took place on the Sabbath. From the Pharisees point of view it would be impossible for a sinner, someone who performed something such as this on the Sabbath, to perform such a sign. They prefer to spend time justifying their position and their status.

Vision is new birth. Well not exactly for the parents of the man. Verses 18-23 clearly lets us know that they prefer to pass the buck, "we don't know how it is that now he sees." "Ask him, he is of age." They don't want to jeopardize their standing in the community and among the religious leaders. So they prefer not to comment. And they point the finger back to their very own son.

Vision is new birth. Well not exactly as the Pharisees question the man who was given vision. They prefer to ask more questions, gather data to discredit the man. Verses 24-34 tries to paint Jesus, the man who gave vision, they paint him as a sinner. The man who now sees is not willing to call anyone a sinner, he simply tells again the story of God's divine action. Spit, dirt, mud, "Go" wash; I was blind but now I see. And the Pharisees drove him out. They do their best to put him back to the same place that he was before he encountered Jesus.

Jesus does what God seems to always be doing, he seeks the man out. Verses 35-38 drives home the desire of God to seek out the lost, here it is Jesus seeking out the lost. The man given vison and new birth believes that it is the Son of Man who has come to him.

Vision is new birth. Well not exactly for the Pharisees who encounter Jesus. Verses 39-41 highlight the importance of judgement. Judgement had been the jurisdiction of the religious leaders. Jesus has removed it from them and has given it a new twist. The twist in the story is that the Pharisees conclude "surely we are not blind?" They are more concerned with self, more concerned with position, more concerned with the way things have been, than opening blind eyes, seeing future, moving from begging to living.

I can't tell you how much of my life has been caught up in things that in the end don't really seem to matter. There have been untold hours spent in arguments; everything from what shoes one of the children should wear to what color to paint the dining room. Another chunk of life has been spent in attempts to justify my particular view point utilizing resources that reflect the most acclaimed positions, mainly the scriptures and the Lutheran confessional writings in my adult life. You can then add to the list all of the time I have tried to pin things on someone else; "whose fault was it" or attempts to identify the most logical, believable scape goat. If you are tallying it up the hours have stretched into years. Add to the equation all the times that I found things to be unbelievable because I wasn't an eye witness. You can throw in a couple of hours of "doubt" to this section too because I don't want to be thought a fool, so I am not just going to believe any old thing. No I am too smart for that. Add to this all the time that God keeps coming to me, seeking me out, and looking for "Stan" who keeps straying off.

Vision is new birth. The writer of the 4th Gospel and the early Christian community understood their work to be enlightening a darkened world by their belief in Jesus. They believed that by living their daily life enlightening a darkened world that others would come to believe in God's love made known in Christ Jesus. But then as now people would rather argue, people would rather justify their position, people would rather pass the buck, people would rather question, and people would rather remain lost, rather than be given vision, new life, restoration, healing, hope in Christ Jesus. In these days when we find ourselves at more than arm's length from one another those whom we encounter are most likely craving light, seeking a way forward, frustrated by the lack of vision, and the blindness that seems to be permeating so many things. God's desire in Christ Jesus is that you see clearly the love that God has for you. That you see from the selfless love lifted up on the cross that God is at work providing you vision and new birth.

The miracle story is told in a very straightforward fashion; spit, dirt, mud, "Go" wash. Then according to the gospel reading what follows is; arguing, justifying, passing the buck, finding it unbelievable, and preferring to live visionless. I take comfort knowing that at the heart of our life together is the desire to communicate and articulate the vision we have in Christ Jesus and how our new life in baptism shapes our community to reach out in love. Imagine, reaching out in love; even while we are practicing keeping our distance. The vision we receive from Jesus is new birth. Amen.
