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Guidelines for Worship during the time of COVID-19

Entering and Leaving the Church:

Face masks are required both inside and outside. If you do not have a mask you may use one of the pre-packaged masks located at the entrances or at the usher stations. (If a face mask was provided upon arrival, kindly deposit it in the specially marked basket at the exterior doors or at the usher stations as you leave so that it can be properly washed and prepared for use again.)

Kindly sign in at the door through which you entered. This will help if we need to be in contact.

Please take your service bulletin with you or dispose of it properly. Please don't place it back into a basket.

Offerings:

Monetary offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances to the nave or at the usher stations outdoors prior to the service or immediately following the service. You may also donate via our website at www.stpaulsyork.org

While in the Nave or on the lawn:

You may sit together as a family. Outside worshippers should place their lawn chairs using social distancing. Inside worshippers should sit in designated pews only (green card 10:30 AM. We ask that you practice social distancing from one family to the next within the pew.

Communion Procedure:

For the outside service: Communion positions are designated with a chalk cross marked on the sidewalks on Springettsbury Ave. and surrounding the lawn. Wearing your face mask., proceed to the closest sidewalk and take your place at a Communion position.

For inside services: Ushers will direct you. The pulpit side of the nave communes first followed by the font side.

Wearing your face mask, come to the chancel step taking your place at one of the five positions marked on the chancel floor with a green cross.

Your entire household may gather at one of the five positions marked by the green cross.

For all to receive the sacrament:

- Extend your arms and cup your hands together to receive the host.
- Please do not reach out to take it from the minister.
- Once the minister has moved to the next group, remove your mask, receive the host, replace your mask and return to your pew/seat by the closest side aisle. There is no need to hurry.
- We will be receiving communion in one kind only.



Thanks so much. Choice. We hear a lot about it lately. We see it posted on placards. Most of the time choice is preceded with another word we hear a lot about and see posted, freedom. This morning the biblical witness presents us with texts dealing with choice. In the Bible we hear about choice but the word which precedes it is not freedom but faithful. Faithful choice that is what we are on about in Christian community.

We are presented with another set of parables, kingdom parables. These are parables about the importance of recognizing the priorities of God's kingdom and acting on them. The kingdom of heaven is like...a mustard seed, yeast being mixed into flour, treasure hidden in a field, a merchant in search of fine pearls, a net thrown into the sea. Recognizing the priorities of God's kingdom and acting on them; sowing, mixing, selling, fishing brings the listener to a point where she or he needs to make a faithful choice.

In the reading form First Kings this is what we find Solomon doing (Solomon is David's son he is next in succession for the kingship). He is making a faithful choice. He is a prime example of faithful choice in harmony with God's will. He is at Gibeon, the nation's most important high place. High places in the Bible are associated with closeness to God. In such settings we can anticipate a theophany, an appearance of God. In this case it comes in the form of a dream. Solomon is presented with a choice. The choice is about how the kingdom will operate, function under his leadership, his kingship.

There are, historically speaking, two kinds of kingdoms: a kingship of glory or a kingship of the spirit of Deuteronomy. Solomon makes a faithful choice; he chooses the second type of kingship, the Deuteronomy style based on God's law.

Solomon doesn't ask for the trappings of worldly possessions, that's kingship of glory.

He doesn't ask for success, that's kingship of glory.

He doesn't ask for long life, that's kingship of glory.

He doesn't ask for the death of his enemies, that's the kingship of glory.

He doesn't ask for the death of the opposition, that's kingship of glory.

Instead, Solomon chooses the pattern of kingship under the law (Deuteronomy). Later in the biblical story it will be kings like Hezekiah and Josiah that make such a faithful choice in their successive reigns.

In a kingship of the law, the king, in our case this morning Solomon is **God's servant**. The goal of such kingship is **the welfare of God's people**, not the glory of the king! In order to do this, to lead in this way, to provide for the welfare of the inhabitants, you need talent. This is what Solomon asks for in the dream sequence that we heard read this morning.

Solomon wants talent. And talent has to do with an understanding mind (ancient world, hearing heart). He wants this hearing heart so that he can discern between good and

evil. This will provide understanding to discern what is right so that he can hear and judge. So Solomon needs a wise and discerning mind (heart). This of course has been modeled by God's *hessed*, God's steadfast love. The heart is an organ with skill to listen; thought and will are moved by it. Solomon makes a faithful choice about kingship and by so doing all these other things, all these good things, things for which he did not ask, are added to his life.

This sounds a little bit like when Jesus is teaching on the Sermon on the Mount in chapter 6. He too is at a high place. And we hear his admonition to "Seek first the kingdom of God (righteousness) and all these things shall be yours as well (Matthew 6:33). We know that Bible verse better when set to the tune, "Seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness, and all these things will be added unto you, al-le-lu-allelu-ia." Jesus prescribes this same pattern for his disciples. And through baptism he prescribes this same pattern for you and for me.

Making the faithful choice is not easy. It is all rather challenging work. It takes both thought and will. What starts us along the right path is the ability to recognize the priorities of kingdom life. We can't act on them if we can't identify them. It will be easy to be pulled off, sidelined, ambushed on our journey of faith if we aren't looking for signs of the kingdom, and recognizing kingdom life when it is presenting its self before us. The take away from Solomon is to be; listening, looking, discerning, hearing, the welfare of God's people. The welfare of God's people is sure to set us on a right path.

Jesus wants us to recognize the priorities of God's kingdom and to act on them. That is why we sing "Seek Ye First the Kingdom of God." Notice, however that the examples that Jesus sets forth in the parables that day when he is teaching the crowds and his disciples, the examples are not about some sort of distant heavenly angelic harped gold clad streets and halos! The kingdom of heaven is like...a mustard seed sown and providing housing in harmony with the environment, yeast being mixed into flour creating food, treasure hidden in a field and the discernment of risking everything for the sake of what has been found, a merchant in search of fine pearls stumbling across the pearl of incalculable worth, a net thrown into the sea bringing forth a diverse catch. Jesus' examples move us like King Solomon desiring the talent needed to recognize the priorities of God's kingdom and acting on them; sowing, mixing, selling, fishing all bring the listener to a point where she or he needs to make a faithful choice seeking the welfare of God's people above all else.

Jesus of course seeks above all else our welfare. He provides righteousness for us through his suffering and death and opens the kingdom of heaven to all believers. His faithful choice, choosing the likes of us, did not lead to his glorification or to selfish desires. His choice led to death on a cross. He made a way when it seemed that there was not a way to right all of the wrongs. He looks upon us with *hessed* the steadfast love of God.

Choice. Solomon made a faithful choice that day, choosing the welfare of God's people. Jesus made a faithful choice that fateful day when the crowds shouted "crucify" by choosing us. He admonishes us to "Seek the kingdom of God" seek the welfare of God's people. And all these things shall be yours as well. Amen.

FIRST READING: 1 Kings 3:5-12

At Gibeon the LORD appeared to Solomon in a dream by night; and God said, "Ask what I should give you." ⁶And Solomon said, "You have shown great and steadfast love to your servant my father David, because he walked before you in faithfulness, in righteousness, and in uprightness of heart toward you; and you have kept for him this great and steadfast love, and have given him a son to sit on his throne today. 7And now, O LORD my God, you have made your servant king in place of my father David, although I am only a little child; I do not know how to go out or come in. ⁸And your servant is in the midst of the people whom you have chosen, a great people, so numerous they cannot be numbered or counted. 9Give your servant therefore an understanding mind to govern your people, able to discern between good and evil; for who can govern this your great people?"

¹⁰It pleased the Lord that Solomon had asked this. ¹¹God said to him, "Because you have asked this, and have not asked for yourself long life or riches, or for the life of your enemies, but have asked for yourself understanding to discern what is right, ¹²I now do according to your word. Indeed I give you a wise and discerning mind; no one like you has been before you and no one like you shall arise after you."

Psalm 119:129-136

SECOND READING: Romans 8:26-39

The Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words. ²⁷And God, who searches the heart, knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God.

²⁸We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose. ²⁹For those whom he foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son, in order that he might be the firstborn within a large family. ³⁰And those whom he predestined he also called; and those whom he called he also justified; and those whom he justified he also glorified.

³¹What then are we to say about these things? If God is for us, who is against us? ³²He who did not withhold his own Son, but gave him up for all of us, will he not with him also give us everything else? ³³Who will bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. ³⁴Who is to condemn? It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. ³⁵Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? ³⁶As it is written,

"For your sake we are being killed all day long; we are accounted as sheep to be slaughtered."

³⁷No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. ³⁸For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, ³⁹nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

GOSPEL: Matthew 13:31-33, 44-52

[Jesus] put before [the crowds] another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed that someone took and sowed in his field; ³² it is the smallest of all the seeds, but when it has grown it is the greatest of shrubs and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches."

³³He told them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like yeast that a woman took and mixed in with three measures of flour until all of it was leavened."

⁴⁴"The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field, which someone found and hid; then in his joy he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field.

⁴⁵"Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant in search of fine pearls; ⁴⁶on finding one pearl of great value, he went and sold all that he had and bought it.

⁴⁷"Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a net that was thrown into the sea and caught fish of every kind; ⁴⁸when it was full, they drew it ashore, sat down, and put the good into baskets but threw out the bad. ⁴⁹So it will be at the end of the age. The angels will come out and separate the evil from the righteous ⁵⁰and throw them into the furnace of fire, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.

⁵¹"Have you understood all this?" They answered, "Yes." ⁵²And he said to them, "Therefore every scribe who has been trained for the kingdom of heaven is like the master of a household who brings out of his treasure what is new and what is old."
