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WELCOME Thank you for being with us.

We are a Christian church within the Lutheran tradition (Evangelical Lutheran Church of America) and we welcome people of all Christian traditions as well as people of other faiths and people of little or no faith. Christian worship has been offered to God in this congregation for 184 years. By worshipping with us today, you become part of that living tradition.

Restrooms are available in the Good Shepherd Room (Springettsbury lobby) and the narthex. Baby changing stations are provided in these restrooms.

Guidelines for Worship during the time of COVID-19

Entering and Leaving the Church:

Face masks are required both inside and outside. If you do not have a mask you may use one of the pre-packaged masks located at the entrances or at the usher stations.

If a face mask was provided upon arrival, kindly deposit it in the specially marked basket at the exterior doors or at the usher stations as you leave so that it can be properly washed and prepared for use again.

Please take your service bulletin with you or dispose of it properly. We will no longer be reusing bulletins. Please don't place it back into a basket.

Offerings:

Monetary offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances to the nave or at the usher stations outdoors prior to the service or immediately following the service. You may also donate via our website at www.stpaulsyork.org

While in the Nave or on the lawn:

You may sit together as a family. Outside worshippers should place their lawn chairs using social distancing. Inside worshippers should sit in designated pews only. We ask that you practice social distancing from one family to the next within the pew.

Communion Procedure:

For the outside service: Communion positions are designated with a chalk cross marked on the sidewalks on Springettsbury Ave. and surrounding the lawn. Wearing your face mask., proceed to the closest sidewalk and take your place at a Communion position.

For inside services: Ushers will direct you. The pulpit side of the nave communes first followed by the font side.

Wearing your face mask, come to the chancel step taking your place at one of the five positions marked on the chancel floor with a green cross.

Your entire household may gather at one of the five positions marked by the green cross.

For all to receive the sacrament: Please extend your arms and cup your hands together to receive the host. Please do not reach out to take it from the minister. Once the minister has moved to the next group, remove your mask, receive the host, replace your mask and return to your pew/seat by the closest side aisle. There is no need to hurry. We will be receiving communion in one kind only.

Rejoice greatly? Shout aloud? I don't think so, not these days. Rejoicing and shouting are not responses advised by the CDC, medical experts, or the Governor. The Prophet Zechariah is in a different time and place. What he is up against is different from what we are up against. In the Prophet's day rejoicing greatly and shouting aloud were appropriate responses to the coming king, the promised one, the one with whom there is a covenant. This is the one declaring restoration, not just restoration as things were, but rather a double portion of making things right! Imagine a double portion of things being made right for a people who consistently responded to God's love:

By grumbling against God Disobeying God's Laws Worshiping idols? These folks get a double portion!

And after centuries of warning, punishment had come. Jerusalem flattened. God's people had been overtaken by a foreign ruler. They were annexed, valuables plundered, educated members of the community hauled off and their intelligence and insight used to assist one who cared only about what he needed and wanted to secure his own future. What the people had lost was more than a battle; they lost their place in God's heart and their future as called out people; prized possession, precious treasure. Today we hear the Prophet Zechariah announcing a new day. "See" says the Prophet, "Lo, your king comes to you; triumphant and victorious and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey."

That phrase sounds familiar to us "your king comes to you; triumphant and victorious and riding on a donkey, because we hear it in our life together in Christian community as we embark on Holy Week. It is quoted in the processional gospel on Palm Sunday leading us into the liturgical drama where we who grumble against God, who disobey God's laws, and who worship idols, are restored to right relationship through Christ's suffering, death and resurrection. We are given a new start. We are restored, you might, say double. And that is what the Prophet Zechariah announced for God's people. They were given a new start, they receive restoration, double. So says the prophet rejoice and shout!

This new start from exile allows people to return to rebuild, but more importantly to restore the proper place of God within their community, The proper place of God in decision making, The proper place of God in resetting their moral ethical compass, and the proper place of God in establishing justice and peace.

I have been giving some thought to what the restoration of God's place in our life, in our community, would like. If we aren't grumbling about God what words would be on our lips? What things would we say? If our speech was motivated by love how might we interact with neighbor, coworker, and family?

And what if we were indeed upholding the laws of God, living faithfully within the construct of our Baptismal Covenant? What things would we be undertaking to support one another in Christian faith, community engagement, and in missionary activity? How would others perceive us in work that was undertaken on behalf of others for the good of all?

And what if we stopped worshipping idols? Oh, you know the idols the things that take precedence over God and his message of hope and salvation? The things we have to have, the way we spend our money on things that don't draw us closer to God, or neighbor. Luther said everybody has a God, it just might not be the one revealed to us in Christ Jesus!

Are you able to envision such restoration? Imagine the lush conversations we would be having about what God is up to in your life and mine. Why we couldn't exhaust telling what God has done for us, is doing for us, and promises yet to do. Or think on our baptismal relationship calling us to order our days and deeds based on God's narrative for life and living. And how the chains that hold us fast to the many idols in our life would willingly be cut loose, abandon, for a generosity toward God that we have never quite experienced.

Now if you are able to catch a glimpse of just such a life, now, double it. That overwhelming abundant life is what God has instore for those who love him. It was that kind of life that the Prophet Zechariah was proclaiming for a people who had grown weary from living apart from God and under a dominant foreign rule. In the gospel narrative it is Jesus who knows how burdensome all of these things are as they are weighing us down. He tells the disciples and us "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens and I will give you rest. Take my joke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light."

These days we may not be returning from exile. We may still feel that we are in a foreign land apart from one another with physical distance during this global pandemic. It is difficult these days to want to rejoice or shout aloud about the state of things. Except as children of God, beloved by Christ Jesus we know that the gentle one, the humble one, comes to us; first as the child of Bethlehem, then as the one condemned to death on a cross, and the one God raised from death to life on Easter and who pours forth his Spirit gathering us in gracious forgiveness and sending us in humble service to the world. He comes in the Word proclaimed and the Meal celebrated. Such rejoicing takes on new forms. Such shouting takes on quieter tones. Such service is carried out from sea to sea because of the covenant God made with us in baptism. Today we return to the Lord, our strong hold, who comes to us with an easy yoke and who lightens the heaviest of burdens. Christ Jesus is releasing us from our sinful past through his forgiveness. "Lo, your king comes to you; triumphant and victorious," he comes setting you right. Amen.
