Welcoming Worshipers

We are joyfully welcoming worshipers back to St. Paul's Church. At 8:00 AM we have taken a more relaxed approach by gathering for worship on the south lawn. People sit in the comfort of their own lawn chairs. They select their own place and have been cognizant of physical distancing. We have erected the large wooden lawn cross, usually reserved for the season of lent, to mark the space and to remind us and all who pass by of God's great love. At 10:30 AM we gather in the church nave. Pews are marked with green tags indicating seating to be used and to account for physical distancing. All door handles and restrooms are regularly sanitized. Hand sanitizer is availa-




ble as you enter and leave the church nave. At both services efforts are made to keep the liturgy to 45 minutes. The time together in worship is truly life giving during these months of sheltering at home. Our COVDI-19 task force continues to monitor our services. They identify things that need attention and remind us not to put down our guard as it relates to the virus. In their recent meeting minutes they remind us to wear masks, sanitize hands both coming and going from the building, respect physical distance, and to refrain from shaking hands or bumping elbows at the sign of peace. If you have not yet made your way back to worship, we invite you to do so. We acknowledge that for some of our members the use of our digital service will be needed so as to keep them safe and well. We are trying to make the videos more interesting by moving from a stationary position to a more fluid video. This of course takes volunteers with skill, commitment, and creativity! Worship is central to our life of faith and to that we are striving to balance safety during this time of pandemic while safely gathering for prayer, praise and thanksgiving.

Autumn Planning

Victor Fields, Kelly Moore-Spencer, and Pastor Reep are working on plans for the fall of the year. This season has always been one of our favorite times as we resume the rhythm of schedules for school and work and sports and for our faith community. This year presents as many unusual challenges for them as it does for you! But they are at work. The first challenge is working around the vacant staff position for Handbells and Children's Choirs. With the current understanding from CDC to limit singing our music making is taking on new challenges. Victor has agreed to work with smaller Handbell ensembles and will team up with Kelly and Pastor Reep to take part in the Tuesday evening children's ministry. Kelly is creating activities that can be done in person at church, or at home with families. Kelly and Pastor Reep are laying the groundwork for confirmation ministry with the first unit of the program focusing on *The Lord's Prayer*. Pastor Reep is planning worship that will limit singing, keep to a shorter time frame, involve lay members, and that will be true to our Lutheran tradition and witness. Victor will be relying heavily on cantors and instrumentalists from the congregation to enrich the Sunday Holy Communion liturgy. Our staff is working on ways to safely welcome us back. Please be watching for ways to be involved in prayer, praise and thanksgiving!

Viewing the Sunday Liturgy Digitally

The Sunday services have been posted on the church website for six months. They can be accessed through the church website stpaulsyork.org and are on the lower right portion of your screen. You do not need to be a Facebook user to view the Sunday service. We know that these are not high quality video recordings. Pastor Reep simply sets his phone on the tripod and presses the record button! We anticipate a day when we might have proper equipment, a technician to operate a camera



zooming in on musicians, the lector, and the preacher, perhaps even panning the congregation so that others can see how the church is configured during this time of physical distancing! But for now, it is all rather low budget, low tech. What we can do is share the video with others to increase viewership and to increase our witness. If you are moved by something in the service please share it with a friend or friends. More than ever people are in need of hearing good news and are in need of hearing how through Christ Jesus they are loved! Thanks to everyone who has been viewing, sending comments and emails, and who through technology are staying connected to the body of Christ at St. Paul's Lutheran Church.



Summer Devotional Activity

Cottage Meeting Discussion Guide

Summer 2020

- 1. Last year we rededicated our building and shared a wide range of ideas regarding future ministry through our stewardship emphasis. At this time in our congregation's life, please identify which areas of ministry are: life-giving? Enriching? Helping? Which areas of our ministry need attention or perhaps need to be discontinued?
- 2. In February this year we celebrated the 184th anniversary of St. Paul's Lutheran Church. In 1836 our ancestors recognized the need for an English Lutheran service in order to meet a growing need in York. In our fall Stewardship emphasis the congregation offered visions for the congregation (shared in the February newsletter). What needs are recognized now short term, three years, and long term, five to ten years?
- 3. Eager to secure their own house of worship, the Charter members of St. Paul's congregation celebrated their first Christmas in the basement of the previous site at the corner of S. Beaver and W. King Streets. St. Paul's members wasted no time completing the main level of the church building and appointing it for the services of God. Having completed a huge renovation project last year, what projects do we need to begin or complete in order to equip us for ministry in 2020 and beyond?
- 4. Over the past 184 years, facilities and grounds, education and mission, pastoral ministry and service were provided through regular financial giving and generous benefactors. What stewardship and financial education needs to be provided to equip, provide and lead us into our third century of ministry?

Council Highlights

The Congregation Council gathered for their regular meeting on Monday July 13 in Christ Hall and was accessed through Zoom for several members for whom meeting in person was not feasible. The meeting was begun with prayer centering on the theme of seeds that are planted for the sake of the Gospel of Christ Jesus.

Church Council

President Ericson reflected on the return to in person Sunday services. His observations included the care and attention to details needed for the safety of all who gather. He stressed the importance of wearing face coverings as a sign of our

Christian love for one another and sited the Apostle Paul who for the sake of the weak refrained from eating meat offered to idols. Wearing a mask during worship is a way we care for one another during this time of pandemic. While the number of participants is about what he expected in these early days of reopening, he is hopeful that others will find their way back to Sunday worship. He once again reiterated the precautions we have taken to insure a safe environment, the new HVAC system, and the attention to the length of the service.

At this time we will continue to worship outside at 8:00 AM as long as the weather is cooperative. Victor Fields and Pastor Reep are working on the liturgical plan for fall services. Christmas services are being planned from the perspective that the need for social distancing and face coverings will still be with us. At 4:00 PM Christmas Eve a brass quintet with Christmas Carol sing on the George Street steps is being planned along with a reworking the Christmas services. Most likely reservations for indoor services will be needed in order to keep the number of worshipers within the guidelines suggested by the CDC.

The congregation's COVID-19 task force surveyed what other congregations are doing to keep worshipers safe. For those who have reopened we are in line with most others within the greater York community. It was stressed by the task force that all of our members/worshipers need to wear a face covering. They stressed this out of Christian love for one another. The task force will continue to review procedures as more of our congregation committees, classes, and activities resume.

The preschool reopening and enrollment are of concern. The council discussed the many concerns associated with reopening. They identified the need to increase tuition up to 20% to offset decreased enrollment if necessary. In the event that we would not open the staff should be apprised that they would be furloughed. The Preschool Committee is meeting regularly to address these concerns.

Conversations with the St. Mark's Lutheran Congregation on E. Market Street concerning a potential partner with whom to merge have concluded. Their desire to continue ministry from their campus on the east side of York was not a shared vision.

The meeting concluded with Harold Sargeant offering a closing prayer.

Music Notes

In this time of uncertainty, the COVID-19 pandemic has forced many changes upon us all. The many fears associated with the Coronavirus has virtually halted singing to a very minimal level. Because of the safety concerns regarding group vocal singing, choirs of every type have had to silence their songs temporarily.

My job responsibility as Choir Director has now forced me to seek and develop different approaches to sharing congregational and choral songs. Also, with Emily Reep's resignation as Director of Children, Youth and Handbells, their songs and music would now have ceased.



Pastor Stan approached me about leading and working with the Handbell Choir during this time of vacancy and pandemic. I agreed and offered to help with the children's choirs. My approach will now be to incorporate all of these, whether it be vocalists or instrumentalists in smaller sized groups and ensembles.

Plans are underway to have a variety of musical offerings to replace what was our normal mode of singing hymnody, psalm singing, choral anthems and solos and instrumental music whether it be with the handbell choir or the children singing and playing instruments.

In addition, I will be working with Pastor and Miss Kelly for Tuesday evening's children's ministries where we will coordinate artwork, crafts, music making, bible stories and worship.

This Fall, our worship and music ministry will evolve out of this need to make music in a safe environment while maintaining physical distancing and all the necessary precautions to allow us to worship safely.

I expect to be in contact with many of those children and adults who were and wish to stay active and involved in music ministry at St. Paul's. Together, we will grow and learn as children of our loving Father.

As an added bonus, I expect that there may be various options for musicians to rehearse either on Sunday morning, Thursday evenings and possibly online.

I look forward to working to continue the outstanding music ministry at St. Paul's and with the many talented people who help to keep music alive.

Italian Harvest Wine Dinner

The planning for the October 17 Italian Harvest Wine Dinner is still moving forward. To that end, the planning committee has put into place a contingency plan in the event that it is not feasible to gather in person in our fellowship hall. The meal, from appetizers through dessert and including select wines, will be packaged and available for drive through pick up. The committee has been working out details for both scenarios. We are still working out the most feasible way to hold the live auction of the original Italian paintings if we cannot gather in the Fellowship Hall. That may well have to be done via Zoom! Planning for the entire event has kept physical distancing in mind with things like: staggered entrance times, appetizers individually plated and possibly served out of doors, silent auction items on display in the narthex with limited numbers viewing and bidding, and from inception a reduced number of tickets so that tables in the Fellowship Hall can be spaced at greater distance and if need be can be set for smaller groups. We do hope that with this knowledge you will support the event by purchasing a ticket and or supplying an item for the silent auction. Ann Anstadt is in charge of tickets and Nicki Herdson is in charge of the silent auction. Pastor Reep has had the Italian water color paintings matted and framed in anticipation of the October auction. Please direct all questions to ann@anstadt.com and thank you for supporting the improvements to our food pantry and preschool and the ministry that is carried out though them at St. Paul's Church.

Ushers needed during Covid-19

The role of the Usher at St. Paul's Church during the days of COVID-19 is radically different. What follows is a list of duties needing to be performed by the usher. If you are willing to serve as an usher during this time of COVID-19 please notify the church office so that you will be included in the scheduled rotation. We need experienced ushers, especially those who have the combination for the safe.

Before Worship

Please arrive 20 minutes before the service at which you are scheduled to serve.

Please wear a mask. Worshipers who do not have a mask may utilize a mask provided by the congregation. They are at each entrance/usher station (lower shelf of the credence table holding the offering basin). Remind those who use them to return them to the baskets marked "used" masks following the service so that they may be washed and prepared for use again.

Indoor worship requires a minimum of three ushers: George Street exterior red door, Playground/elevator exterior door, Springettsbury Avenue door. Open the door for all worshipers so that they do not need to touch the door pull. You will need to remain at the door through the "Order of Confession and Forgiveness" to insure late comers have easy access to the building.

Exterior worship requires a minimum of three ushers: one at each side of the lawn and one at the back. Simply think of the lawn as being the same configuration as the church nave. The orientation and altar will mimic what is indoors.

Assist worships with information regarding seating (which pews or keeping distance with lawn chairs) the use of the worship bulletin, and that offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances indoors and by the usher stations outdoors.

During Worship

Be attentive to the worshipers and what they may need.

Guests may be provided a bag containing a guest card.

Be seated near the door where you are scheduled to serve or at the usher station for the outside service.

Mind the offering basin. Worshipers may place a gift upon arrival or when they take their leave.

Once the liturgy has begun please stow the bulletin baskets so that used bulletins are not discarded into them when the service concludes.

At the distribution of Holy Communion inside the usher serving at the elevator entrance and the usher serving at the Good Shepherd entrance each take their places at the "communion position" closest to the door where they are serving. They will be among the first people to receive communion. The George Street Usher will work the center aisle directing worshipers to move forward to the chancel. The Pulpit side communes first, then the Baptismal Font side. This is important so that social distancing is maintained and no long line forms in the center aisle. There are 5 "communion positions" marked with a cross on the chancel floor. An entire household gathers at a communion position. After all who desire to receive communion have come to the chancel, then the George Street Usher takes her/his place at a "communion position." This will indicate to the Pastor that all who desire the sacrament have received.

At the distribution of Holy Communion outside the people will move to the "communion positions" marked with chalk on the side walk surrounding the lawn. While the minister moves around the perimeter of the lawn giving communion the ushers make sure that the offering basins are secure. The ushers may wish to place the three basins together and take turns communing and keeping watch over the financial gifts.

Following Worship

Offering basins must be collected. Inside start with the usher at the playground/elevator entrance using the side aisle carry the basin to meet the George Street usher and then with the two basins proceed down the south side aisle to the Springettsbury Ave. entrance at which time the three basins in the privacy of the Good Shepherd Gathering Room may be placed in a canvas bag and be taken to the safe. Two ushers proceed with the offering to secure it in the safe. One usher returns the basins to the credence tables. Then all wash their hands/sanitize.

Secure plastic gloves from the Sexton. Collect all items, service bulletins, lost and found items from the pews. Dispose of the bulletins and debris. Place lost and found items on the server to the right of the Good Shepherd stained glass window.

Thank you for your willingness to serve during these challenging times. Your assistance is of great importance and is most appreciated. Please contact the Church Office if you can serve as usher.
