On June 14 we resumed in person worship at St. Paul's Church. It was our first public assembly since March 15. The staff members worked setting up for the service. Then the first worshipers arrived. Some served as ushers. A lector was selected from the group. People sat on their folding chairs, others on blankets, and still others stood. Everyone was respectful of maintaining physical distance. Challenging as it was for a group of Lutherans to gather without singing, we managed to get through the spoken liturgy. We are thinking of some innovative ways to liven up the liturgy so if it wasn't as lively as you expected, know that we are working on it. It was a powerful witness to see everyone gathered on the south lawn. Cars and trucks slowed as they passed by as did pedestrians traversing the sidewalk. Our very public witness of gathering together around God's Word will only increase our opportunities to share with others God's love! Please join us for our outdoor service at 8:00 AM. Bring a chair or blanket and join with your sisters and brothers as we hear God's Word and receive Holy Communion strengthening us for all our days. Summer 2020

1. Last year we rededicated our building and shared a wide range of ideas regarding future ministry through our stewardship emphasis. At this time in our congregation's life, please identify which areas of ministry are: life-giving? Enriching? Helping? Which areas of our ministry need attention or perhaps need to be discontinued?

2. In February this year we celebrated the 184th anniversary of St. Paul's Lutheran Church. In 1836 our ancestors recognized the need for an English Lutheran service in order to meet a growing need in York. In our fall Stewardship emphasis the congregation offered visions for the congregation (shared in the February newsletter). What needs are recognized now short term, three years, and long term, five to ten years?

3. Eager to secure their own house of worship, the Charter members of St. Paul's congregation celebrated their first Christmas in the basement of the previous site at the corner of S. Beaver and W. King Streets. St. Paul's members wasted no time completing the main level of the church building and appointing it for the services of God. Having completed a huge renovation project last year, what projects do we need to begin or complete in order to equip us for ministry in 2020 and beyond?

4. Over the past 184 years, facilities and grounds, education and mission, pastoral ministry and service were provided through regular financial giving and generous benefactors. What stewardship and financial education needs to be provided to equip, provide and lead us into our third century of ministry?

5. As we approach our 200th anniversary what congregational strengths do you identify? What weaknesses do you identify? How can we build on the strengths and strengthen our weaknesses?

Council Highlights

The Congregation Council gathered for their regular monthly meeting at 7:00 PM June 8 in Christ Hall. The meeting was opened with prayer, the agenda adopted, and the May 11 meeting minutes approved.

President Tristan shared with the council Emily Reep's resignation from her position as Children, Youth and Handbell Choir Director at St. Paul's Church. Her resignation was accepted with regret and gratitude.



Graduation cards were completed by council members and sent to our High School Seniors.

The Council moved to resume in person worship on Sunday June 14 with an outdoor service at 8:00 AM and an indoor service at 10:30 AM. The need for adhering to CDC guidelines was stressed. The council members and their families participated in two weeks of trial services in anticipation of reopening so that they were better able to make decisions.

The Council approved a COVID-19 Task force to provide ongoing information and procedural updates for our faith community. Members of the Committee are: Deacon Ellen Doughty, Dr. Jessica Ericson, Sheridan Palmer, Deacon Harold Sargeant, and Tim Yakim.

The Council will provided direction as to when committees and groups can resume meeting at St. Paul's. The first priority is to prepare and safely provide for the faith community to gather for worship.

Council identified the importance of our digital presence and will incorporate this in some way into the upcoming cottage meetings.

The council approved the request from Christian Education to purchase the professional version of Zoom to permit meetings, education, and edification through this digital platform.

The complete list of host families for the summer cottage meetings was presented. The council extended their appreciation to the host families as they assist us in preparing for our short and longer term vision for the congregation.

All committee reports were submitted in writing to keep the time of the meeting within the suggested allotment of CDC.

The meeting was adjourned and the closing prayer was given by Kathleen Lemke.

Deadline for the August newsletter is July 15th From March 15th through June 7th – thirteen Sundays – the nave at St. Paul's Lutheran Church was silent on Sunday mornings. That is a quarter of a year! COVID-19 has changed our lives in many ways, but disruption of weekly worship strikes at the core of our Christian lives together. You could say that Sunday morning services are



"essential business" (to borrow a trendy term these days) for Christians. Many wider church leaders fear the broader impacts of the pandemic on the church. St. Paul's Lutheran Church of York, however, has demonstrated resilience and dedication though this time. Can I be so bold as to point to growth and opportunity for us? Our online worship services have received excellent viewership; we are reaching new people! Our food pantry has met increased demand. Giving remains steady and acquisition of a Paycheck Protection Program loan has buffered us somewhat from market volatility. Executive leadership has met weekly and Council remains open-minded about the landscape of church and ministry in the foreseeable future. So despite our new coronavirus cares and concerns, it is still an exciting time at St. Paul's church.

I greatly appreciate our Council, which made a thoughtful and quick decision to suspend worship in mid-March. We were not at the tail end of that movement. Since that time, our leadership has continued to weigh government guidelines, medical professional recommendations, and advice from our synod. Deliberation on this information plus trial services with leadership the first two weeks of June prepared us to confidently hold in-person worship on June 14th, just after York County went green. Some churches across the nation perhaps started worship too early. Some are still reticent.

We believe that green status in our county was the right time for us and our level of preparation. We acknowledge that medical professionals have labeled worship services as "high risk," so we have taken many precautionary steps: some services outside, no singing at first (synod recommendation), shorter services, social distance, and masks. Data shows that these sorts of *redundant* measures are highly effective. This is a new disease with many unknowns. We are compelled to move forward cautiously because we clearly do not want disease spread in our faith community. We will continue to post worship online for those who feel it is better for them to stay home, and we certainly support that decision.

There are many reasons to *still* be excited about the way God is moving though the church. I hope you will participate in our upcoming Cottage Meetings to help form the next long-range plan for St. Paul's. There are many other exciting activities in the works too; we have not been idle! I hope that you are all safe and well in the love of Christ.

Ushers needed during Covid-19

The role of the Usher at St. Paul's Church during the days of COVID-19 is radically different. What follows is a list of duties needing to be performed by the usher. If you are willing to serve as an usher during this time of COVID-19 please notify the church office so that you will be included in the scheduled rotation. We need experienced ushers, especially those who have the combination for the safe.

Before Worship

Please arrive 20 minutes before the service at which you are scheduled to serve.

- Please wear a mask. Worshipers who do not have a mask may utilize a mask provided by the congregation. They are at each entrance/usher station (lower shelf of the credence table holding the offering basin). Remind those who use them to return them to the baskets marked "used" masks following the service so that they may be washed and prepared for use again.
- Indoor worship requires a minimum of three ushers: George Street exterior red door, Playground/elevator exterior door, Springettsbury Avenue door. Open the door for all worshipers so that they do not need to touch the door pull. You will need to remain at the door through the "Order of Confession and Forgiveness" to insure late comers have easy access to the building.
- Exterior worship requires a minimum of three ushers: one at each side of the lawn and one at the back. Simply think of the lawn as being the same configuration as the church nave. The orientation and altar will mimic what is indoors.
- Assist worships with information regarding seating (which pews or keeping distance with lawn chairs) the use of the worship bulletin, and that offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances indoors and by the usher stations outdoors.

During Worship

Be attentive to the worshipers and what they may need.

Guests may be provided a bag containing a guest card.

Be seated near the door where you are scheduled to serve or at the usher station for the outside service.

Mind the offering basin. Worshipers may place a gift upon arrival or when they take their leave.

- Once the liturgy has begun please stow the bulletin baskets so that used bulletins are not discarded into them when the service concludes.
- At the distribution of Holy Communion inside the usher serving at the elevator entrance and the usher serving at the Good Shepherd entrance each take their places at the "communion position" closest to the door where they are serving. They will be among the first people to receive communion. The George Street Usher will work the center aisle directing worshipers to move forward to the chancel. The Pulpit side communes first, then the Baptismal Font side. This is important so that social distancing is maintained and no long line forms in the center aisle. There are 5 "communion positions" marked with a cross on the chancel floor. An entire household gathers at a communion position. After all who desire to receive communion have come to the chancel, then the George Street Usher takes her/his place at a "communion position." This will indicate to the Pastor that all who desire the sacrament have received.
- At the distribution of Holy Communion outside the people will move to the "communion positions" marked with chalk on the side walk surrounding the lawn. While the minister moves around the perimeter of the lawn giving communion the ushers make sure that the offering basins are secure. The ushers may wish to place the three basins together and take turns communing and keeping watch over the financial gifts.

Following Worship

- Offering basins must be collected. Inside start with the usher at the playground/elevator entrance using the side aisle carry the basin to meet the George Street usher and then with the two basins proceed down the south side aisle to the Springettsbury Ave. entrance at which time the three basins in the privacy of the Good Shepherd Gathering Room may be placed in a canvas bag and be taken to the safe. Two ushers proceed with the offering to secure it in the safe. One usher returns the basins to the credence tables. Then all wash their hands/sanitize.
- Secure plastic gloves from the Sexton. Collect all items, service bulletins, lost and found items from the pews. Dispose of the bulletins and debris. Place lost and found items on the server to the right of the Good Shepherd stained glass window.

Thank you for your willingness to serve during these challenging times. Your assistance is of great importance and is most appreciated. Please contact the Church Office if you can serve as usher.
