Guidelines for Worship during the time of COVID-19

Entering and Leaving the Church:

Face masks are required both inside and outside. If you do not have a mask you may use one of the pre-packaged masks located at the entrances or at the usher stations. (If a face mask was provided upon arrival, kindly deposit it in the specially marked basket at the exterior doors or at the usher stations as you leave so that it can be properly washed and prepared for use again.)

Kindly sign in at the door through which you entered. This will help if we need to be in contact.

Please take your service bulletin with you or dispose of it properly. Please don't place it back into a basket.

Offerings:

Monetary offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances to the nave or at the usher stations outdoors prior to the service or immediately following the service. You may also donate via our website at www.stpaulsyork.org

While in the Nave or on the lawn:

You may sit together as a family. Outside worshippers should place their lawn chairs using social distancing. Inside worshippers should sit in designated pews only (green card 10:30 AM. We ask that you practice social distancing from one family to the next within the pew.

Communion Procedure:

For the outside service: Communion positions are designated with a chalk cross marked on the sidewalks on Springettsbury Ave. and surrounding the lawn. Wearing your face mask., proceed to the closest sidewalk and take your place at a Communion position.

For inside services: Ushers will direct you. The pulpit side of the nave communes first followed by the font side.

Wearing your face mask, come to the chancel step taking your place at one of the five positions marked on the chancel floor with a green cross.

Your entire household may gather at one of the five positions marked by the green cross.

For all to receive the sacrament:

- Extend your arms and cup your hands together to receive the host.
- Please do not reach out to take it from the minister.
- Once the minister has moved to the next group, then remove your mask, receive the host, replace your mask and return to your pew/seat by the closest side aisle. There is no need to hurry.



Crumbs. I use them when making meatloaf. I especially like them as topping on coffee cake, muffins, and apple pie. I am not especially fond of them on the kitchen floor or under the table.

Crumbs. They are the talking point this morning between a Canaanite women and Jesus. She is not after a meatloaf, or coffee cake, or muffins, or apple pie. She is after healing for her daughter. She is focused on nothing more than her daughter being made well. She is on her own mission on behalf of another. She can't stand the sight of her daughter being tormented. And so in an unusual interplay between Jesus and a foreigner, a Canaanite women, an interplay that was perplexing enough that the disciples wanted her to be sent away, she asks for crumbs.

Kneeling before Jesus, she asks for crumbs. Moments before in a posture we may assume was standing and upright, she called out for the Lord, the Son of David, to have mercy. She even stated why she cried out for such mercy. "Yes Lord, even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their mater's table." "Throw me a crumb" she pleads. "Drop a little grace my way" she infers, as she cries out for the welfare of her daughter who is tormented.

Crumbs. Most of us won't settle for crumbs. Most of us want the whole crumb topped pie. Most of us aren't willing to name publicly why we need God's mercy in our life; afraid to disclose how sick we really are. Most of us aren't willing to make a scene in public because we certainly don't want to be numbered with people who are sent away, dismissed, thought to be an unwelcome intrusion. Most of us are even uncomfortable moving out in mission on behalf of a family member let alone someone we do not know.

For what mercy are you pleading in your own life?

For what mercy are you pleading for the sake of another?

Currently it seems that our society falls pretty neatly into two groups; those with the whole crumb topped pie and those seeking crumbs. I don't have the time to trace the history of how we arrived at such a place. How we in one of the richest nations on the planet have arrived at such an unusual perplexing place where so many are seeking crumbs.

The Canaanite women knew to whom she could turn. She had obviously heard of Jesus of Nazareth and how he was restoring, making whole;

He had fed those who were hungry,

about five thousand men, besides women and children.

He had healed the sick in Gennesaret,

a little lake side town not far from Capernaum and Bethsaida.

And after this request by a foreign woman made on behalf of her daughter, we will read how Jesus cures many people; the lame, the maimed, the blind, the mute, and many others. And they were all placed at Jesus feet, like crumbs beneath a table.

Crumbs. It is appealing to want to have the whole crumb topped pie. This morning the request is simply for the crumbs, for some mercy, some grace, to fall from the master's table. In our life together we cry out to the Lord, Son of David, for mercy, for grace; not just for ourselves but for the person next to us, the people in our neighborhood, our pantry clients, preschool families, for the students preparing for school and the faculty who will teach them open them to see the entirety of the world in which we live, for our sister congregation in Tanzania. The Canaanite women had reached the end of her rope. She couldn't take the horror of seeing one she loved so tormented. She kneels at Jesus' feet. Not requesting the bounty from the table, simply some crumbs.

That day, the Lord Jesus, responded to her request. He didn't throw her some crumbs hoping that she would go away, he acknowledged her faith. Jesus acknowledged the greatness of her faith. I think Jesus called her faith great that day because she was concerned about another, requesting help and healing for another. The Canaanite woman's daughter was healed, (salvo) salvation, made whole. Her request for crumbs was met with the Lord's abundance.

We gather at the table of the Lord this morning. Not certain if we are seeking an entire pie or simply crumbs. In Christ Jesus we are given a foretaste of the heavenly banquet. We are given a morsel containing the abundance of life, forgiveness, grace, mercy, love, so that we are made whole. Healed. Saved. Not crumbs, but the bounty of the one Lord who gives himself for the life of the world. The Canaanite woman knew to whom she could turn.

In our Alleluia verse we proclaim "Alleluia, Lord to whom shall we go? You Lord, you Son of David, you have the words of eternal life." As the baptized people of God, we also know to whom we turn amid the modern state of affairs. We know of the crummy situations that are plaguing our communities and our lives. Hatred, bigotry, greed, racist attitudes and actions that are not consistent with the loving embrace of God. And so in the spirit of the Canaanite woman we come in faith into the presence of the Lord Jesus requesting on behalf of all who are tormented, we beg for crumbs, for mercy, for grace, to be made known so that there is real and lasting healing. We come in faith, requesting that the Lord God changes hearts, and minds, attitudes, and sets things right.

Crumbs. They are often swept up and thrown away. Today we hear of great faith made known through the very thing that is kneaded into meatloaf and pressed onto the top of pie. And when crumbs fall from the table of the Lord they give life and faith is proclaimed.

Then Jesus answered her, "Woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish." And the crumbs for which she begged brought healing. Amen.

FIRST READING: Isaiah 56:1, 6-8

Thus says the LORD: Maintain justice, and do what is right, for soon my salvation will come, and my deliverance be revealed.

⁶And the foreigners who join themselves to the LORD, to minister to him, to love the name of the LORD. and to be his servants, all who keep the sabbath, and do not profane it, and hold fast my covenant-⁷these I will bring to my holy mountain, and make them joyful in my house of prayer; their burnt offerings and their sacrifices will be accepted on my altar; for my house shall be called a house of prayer for all peoples. ⁸Thus says the Lord GOD, who gathers the outcasts of Israel, I will gather others to them besides those already gathered.

SECOND READING: Romans 11:1-2a, 29-32 [Paul writes:] I ask, then, has God rejected his people? By no means! I myself am an Israelite, a descendant of Abraham, a member of the tribe of Benjamin. ²God has not rejected his people whom he foreknew.

²⁹For the gifts and the calling of God are irrevocable. ³⁰Just as you were once disobedient to God but have now received mercy because of their disobedience, ³¹so they have now been disobedient in order that, by the mercy shown to you, they too may now receive mercy. ³²For God has imprisoned all in disobedience so that he may be merciful to all.

GOSPEL: Matthew 15:[10-20] 21-28

[[Jesus] called the crowd to him and said to them, "Listen and understand: "it is not what goes into the mouth that defiles a person, but it is what comes out of the mouth that defiles." ¹²Then the disciples approached and said to him, "Do you know that the Pharisees took offense when they heard what you said?" ¹³He answered, "Every plant that my heavenly Father has not planted will be uprooted. ¹⁴Let them alone; they are blind guides of the blind. And if one blind person guides another, both will fall into a pit." 15 But Peter said to him, "Explain this parable to us." 16 Then he said, "Are you also still without understanding? 17Do you not see that whatever goes into the mouth enters the stomach, and goes out into the sewer? ¹⁸But what comes out of the mouth proceeds from the heart, and this is what defiles. ¹⁹For out of the heart come evil intentions, murder, adultery, fornication, theft, false witness, slander. 20 These are what defile a person, but to eat with unwashed hands does not defile."]

²¹Jesus left that place and went away to the district of Tyre and Sidon. ²²Just then a Canaanite woman from that region came out and started shouting, "Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David; my daughter is tormented by a demon." ²³But he did not answer her at all. And his disciples came and urged him, saying, "Send her away, for she keeps shouting after us." ²⁴He answered, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." ²⁵But she came and knelt before him, saying, "Lord, help me." 26He answered, "It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." 27She said, "Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table." 28 Then Jesus answered her, "Woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish." And her daughter was healed instantly.
