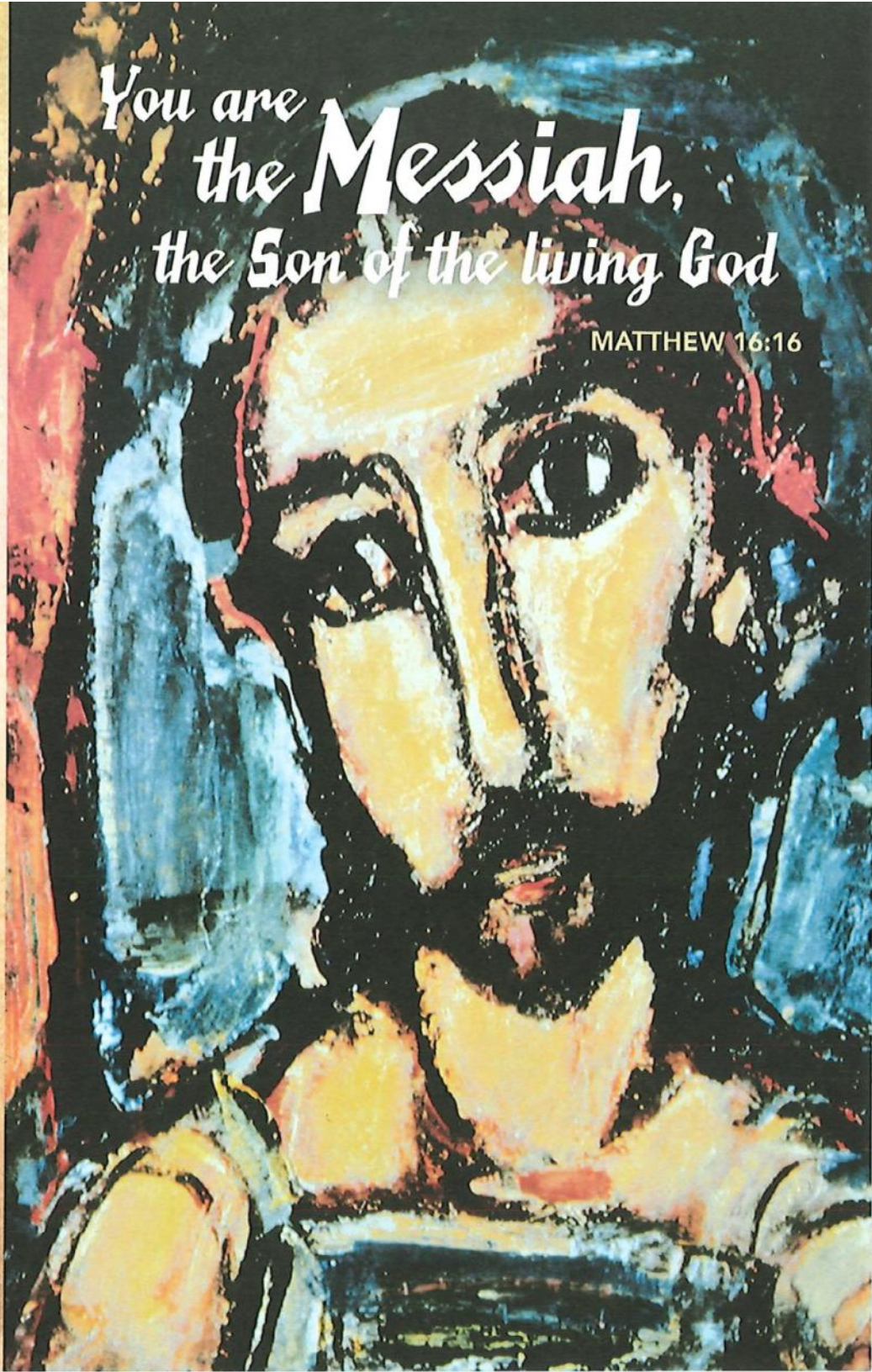

Guidelines for Worship during the time of COVID-19

Entering and Leaving the Church:

Face masks are required both inside and outside. If you do not have a mask you may use one of the pre-packaged masks located at the entrances or at the usher stations. (If a face mask was provided upon arrival, kindly deposit it in the specially marked basket at the exterior doors or at the usher stations as you leave so that it can be properly washed and prepared for use again.)

Kindly sign in at the door through which you entered. This will help if we need to be in contact.

Please take your service bulletin with you or dispose of it properly. Please don't place it back into a basket.

Offerings:

Monetary offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances to the nave or at the usher stations outdoors prior to the service or immediately following the service. You may also donate via our website at www.stpaulsyork.org

While in the Nave or on the lawn:

You may sit together as a family. Outside worshippers should place their lawn chairs using social distancing. Inside worshippers should sit in designated pews only (green card 10:30 AM. We ask that you practice social distancing from one family to the next within the pew.

Communion Procedure:

For the outside service: Communion positions are designated with a chalk cross marked on the sidewalks on Springettsbury Ave. and surrounding the lawn. Wearing your face mask., proceed to the closest sidewalk and take your place at a Communion position.

For inside services: Ushers will direct you. The pulpit side of the nave communes first followed by the font side.

Wearing your face mask, come to the chancel step taking your place at one of the five positions marked on the chancel floor with a green cross.

Your entire household may gather at one of the five positions marked by the green cross.

For all to receive the sacrament:

- *Extend your arms and cup your hands together to receive the host.*
- *Please do not reach out to take it from the minister.*
- *Once the minister has moved to the next group, then remove your mask, receive the host, replace your mask and return to your pew/seat by the closest side aisle. There is no need to hurry.*

During the last quarter of the year with; lock downs, sheltering in place, and quarantine, we watched a lot of TV. The total hours spent streaming video content by Americans was in the billions of hours. I don't recall the exact number. It was staggering. When I heard the number rattled off on a radio broadcast I thought it to be outrageous. Yes, I am guilty of adding to the confounding figure.

Among the many shows viewed in the Reep household and yes full discloser here, during quarantine my children introduced me to binge-watching. One of the shows we regularly watched was *Tiny House Nation*. Now during quarantine, with Emily and our two children, I personally couldn't imagine residing in a home with fewer than the 18 hundred square feet we currently occupy! But *Tiny House Nation* where people choose to live in spaces with the square footage about the size of my home office, helped me grasp some things about life, the world, and how people are making sense of it.

Each episode of *Tiny House Nation* follows an individual, or a couple, or even a family who for various reasons opt for tiny house living. Single folks wanting to gain financial independence, get out of debt, and live life mortgage free. Couples compelled to reduce their carbon footprint and the amount of natural resources they consume. Married couples approaching retirement years desiring to down size shedding things that are now controlling them and trading it in for a life style free of the burden of stuff they once thought necessary. Into their worlds appear the hosts of the show John Weisbarth and Zack Giffin. They come to give aide, provide a way forward when things seem bleak; they often console the distraught individuals, couples, families, as they wrestle with a desire for a new way of living life often thought to be; odd, unusual, outrageous!

I like the exercises that the hosts John and Zack ask the participants to complete. In some cases it is paring down massive wardrobes, editing drawers full of kitchen utensils, reigning in craft and hobby supplies. I like the way that Zack rethinks the use of space and has compelling conversations with the folks seeking a new way of life and living in a tiny house. He challenges them to think differently, act differently, and experience life differently now that they have set out on this new journey of tiny house living.

And at the end of every show there is a recap of the journey upon which they are embarking. Video clips of the process: planning, building, sorting, crying, laughing, and highlighting their hopes, dreams through tiny house living. It is at that point where the camera zooms in focusing on John the host as he reaches into his trouser pocket and extracts a ring with a set of keys and he says "there is only one thing left" holding the keys in front of the home owners "welcome to *Tiny House Nation*!"

Jesus presents Peter with the keys to the kingdom. "Welcome to the kingdom of heaven." Peter embarked on the Journey following Jesus. Through their time spent together they have had many compelling conversations with Jesus providing the way for new life and living in a different kind community. He has challenged Peter, the disciples, and countless men, women and children to think differently, act differently, and experience life differently now that they have set out on a journey with him. Now, in the district of Caesarea Philippi, Jesus asks a poignant question to the disciples. "Who do you say that I am?" It is Simon Peter, the Rock, who responds "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God." And from that point on, Jesus knows that he knows.

Being given the keys to the kingdom of heaven Peter is put in the awkward place that homeowners in the TV show *Tiny House Nation* are placed when handed the keys. Welcome to the kingdom of heaven. While he has participated fully in the journey so far, while he has opened himself to new possibilities for life, while he has witnessed amazing things, had conversations challenging him to think differently, act differently, and experience life differently now that the keys of the kingdom are placed in his hands, and being told that the keys will bind and loose, close and open, he is told not to tell anyone that Jesus is the Messiah.

In Holy Baptism we are welcomed into the kingdom of heaven. We are officially welcomed into a new way of life and living. We are like those single folks wanting to gain independence, getting out of the bondage of sin that weighs us down, so that we can live life freely. We are like those couples compelled to reduce our earthly footprint and human consumption by relying on ecology and stewardship practices that are life sustaining and life giving. We are like those married couples approaching retirement years desiring to be better stewards by shedding things that are controlling and burdensome for a life where the yoke is easy and the burden light. Baptismal life will often be seen as; odd, unusual, outrageous.

In the Small Catechism of Martin Luther we are reminded that this welcome into kingdom life is not a once and done deal, but rather is a daily renewal that every morning we rise to a new day, a new opportunity, recapping what is past, and how we are freed for a new day through the cross of Christ Jesus. Those participants in *Tiny House Nation* after being given the “official” welcome by John Weisbarth and Zack Giffin, when the keys are handed over to them, they are just beginning the journey of a new way to go about life. They are yet to discover if being free of debt will allow them greater opportunity to experience life. They are yet to discover if being ecological and reducing consumption affects their mental and physical well-being. They are yet to discover if giving up the stuff that controls and dictates by establishing better stewardship practices will lighten the burdens, their spirits, their countenance. They are yet to discover...just as we are yet to discover the fullness of baptismal life, kingdom life. Sure there are; **plans** in our personal lives that went “COVID”

or as we now say around our house “well that sure went 2020,”

relationships that didn’t get built the way we had hoped,

possessions that consume us even as we try sorting and purging,

tears that well up in our eyes over past hurts,

laughter at things and situations that remind us of how human we really are,

and there are **hopes and dreams** that are possible because of the thoughtfulness, concern, care devotion, commitment and sacrificial love made known through Christ Jesus who willingly gives himself on the cross for all. The risen Jesus comes to us, he comes giving aide, providing a way forward when things seem bleak, consoling the distraught moments in our lives as individuals, as couples, as families, he is with us as we wrestle with a desire for a new way of living life. Jesus comes among us granting life and salvation. Welcome to the kingdom of heaven. You have at your side, the host, Christ Jesus, making a way for you so that the journey is full and rich and free and new days of kingdom life are awaiting you. Amen.

Now when Jesus came into the district of
Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, "Who
do people say that the Son of Man is?" ¹⁴And
they said, "Some say John the Baptist, but oth-
ers Elijah, and still others Jeremiah or one of
the prophets." ¹⁵He said to them, "But who do
you say that I am?" ¹⁶Simon Peter answered,
"You are the Messiah, the Son of the living
God." ¹⁷And Jesus answered him, "Blessed are
you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood
has not revealed this to you, but my Father in
heaven. ¹⁸And I tell you, you are Peter, and on
this rock I will build my church, and the gates
of Hades will not prevail against it. ¹⁹I will give
you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and
whatever you bind on earth will be bound in
heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will
be loosed in heaven." ²⁰Then he sternly or-
dered the disciples not to tell anyone that he
was the Messiah.
