Guidelines for Worship during the time of COVID-19

Entering and Leaving the Church:

Face masks are required both inside and outside. If you do not have a mask you may use one of the pre-packaged masks located at the entrances or at the usher stations. (If a face mask was provided upon arrival, kindly deposit it in the specially marked basket at the exterior doors or at the usher stations as you leave so that it can be properly washed and prepared for use again.)

Kindly sign in at the door through which you entered. This will help if we need to be in contact.

Please take your service bulletin with you or dispose of it properly. Please don't place it back into a basket.

Offerings:

Monetary offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances to the nave or at the usher stations outdoors prior to the service or immediately following the service. You may also donate via our website at www.stpaulsyork.org

While in the Nave or on the lawn:

You may sit together as a family. Outside worshippers should place their lawn chairs using social distancing. Inside worshippers should sit in designated pews only (green card 10:30 AM. We ask that you practice social distancing from one family to the next within the pew.

Communion Procedure:

For the outside service: Communion positions are designated with a chalk cross marked on the sidewalks on Springettsbury Ave. and surrounding the lawn. Wearing your face mask., proceed to the closest sidewalk and take your place at a Communion position.

For inside services: Ushers will direct you. The pulpit side of the nave communes first followed by the font side.

Wearing your face mask, come to the chancel step taking your place at one of the five positions marked on the chancel floor with a green cross.

Your entire household may gather at one of the five positions marked by the green cross.

For all to receive the sacrament:

- Extend your arms and cup your hands together to receive the host.
- Please do not reach out to take it from the minister.
- Once the minister has moved to the next group, then remove your mask, receive the host, replace your mask and return to your pew/seat by the closest side aisle. There is no need to hurry.

Clarissa lamented leaving her little brother when she went off to college. She lamented leaving him in the same volatile home in which she had maneuvered for 18 years. She lamented that she personally, physically couldn't be there to protect him from their mother's psychotic episodes. These usually occurred when their mom would try to be "healthy" and she would stop taking her medicine prescribed for her bipolar disorder. When her mom would try to get "healthy" and ditch her medication their home quickly, without warning, became an unknown environment of rage. Sometimes it was manifest through smashing drinking glasses randomly on the floor. At other times it was focused on Clarissa, attacking her with common house hold items; a ball bat, a guitar, a butcher knife. These episodes usually ended with police on the scene and hospitalizations and her brother staying with understanding neighbors. Clarissa stood in front of the house ready to leave for school. She lamented leaving her little brother to fend for himself.

Lament is part of Biblical tradition.

"How often did I want to gather you as a hen gathers her chicks under her wings" laments Jesus over Jerusalem.

"Lord, had you been here our brother Lazarus would not have died" laments Mary and Martha over the death of their brother.

At the burial of Stephen, the men wailed to God lamenting that he had been needlessly stoned to death.

In Egypt the Hebrew people lament their slavery under Pharaoh.

Job laments how quickly people turned away from God, and how friends abandon him.

Half of the 150 Psalms are Psalms of lament with varying themes; lament for humanity, lament for the earth, lament for the environment.

Why there is an entire book in the Bible bearing the name Lamentations sandwiched between Jeremiah and Ezekiel two of the most unpopular characters in Biblical literature because of their lament.

Society has all but forgotten lament. It is often depicted as weakness. Lament is messy and complicated. It usually has ties to personal situations. Coming to the end of a summer season during this time of pandemic there is lots for us to lament, personally and collectively as a faith community. Lament for vacations that never materialized. Lament for sharing time with family members we could not visit. Lament for Employment and jobs that came back for what seemed like a moment or two, and then things closed, shuttered, suspended for an unknown amount of time. We lament not being able to fully utilize our newly renovated building. We lament not singing hymns of faith with full voice, and choir rehearsals and anthems, and hearing children's voices heralding the sweetness of God's love in Jesus. We lament not fully sharing the peace of Christ within the liturgy. We lament not sharing bread and the wine in Holy Communion. Allowing for lament allows the listener to be pulled into a story, into a situation, often an unpleasant time of pain, heartache, sorrow, even despair. Much like Clarissa lamenting leaving her younger brother at home while she takes leave for college.

Lament. Jeremiah laments. He laments suffering the loss of everything for sake of the Lord. Being a prophet for the Lord God, has taken a toll on Jeremiah. The publicly perceived persona of a prophet often punctuates the prestige as messenger of the Most High God. We often equate it with the heavenly chorus singing on the night Jesus was born, but it was nothing like that. It is not prestigious work. Jeremiah has lots of lament and today's Old Testament reading is no exception. He suffers insult. He doesn't hang out with merrymakers (so you know who he is hanging out with). He ends up alone. His pain is unceasing. His wound refuses to heal. And he puts it all out there before the Lord. **The only thing it seems he hasn't lost is God's Word!** But he says that God is like a deceitful brook, like waters that fail, here today and gone tomorrow. Jeremiah's lament comprises the first half of the Old Testament reading.

The second half of the reading is the response of God. God wants Jeremiah as well as all the people including you and me, to return; to come back, to turn back. God says I will restore you, I will take you back, I will put things right. I want you, God says, to proclaim what is precious and not the worthless things that so easily fall from your lips. I will make you a fortified wall of the strongest metal to protect you. Others will fight against you but they shall not prevail, they shall not win, for "I am with you" says the Lord God. "I am with you to save you." "I am with you to deliver you." "I will deliver you from the hand of the wicked and keep you from the choking hold of the ruthless." God's command and promise; return, repent, turn back, and be restored, delivered, saved.

We are not lacking in laments here this morning; for the world, for the seeming lack of diplomacy, for the hatred infecting our nation, lack of respect, lack of prayer, these are not regrets, these are laments. This last Sunday in August is often a time of lament for me; things that didn't come to fruition over summer holidays. Such laments are most likely different for each one of us. This morning the voice of God calls to us to turn back, to repent, because God wants to take us back. God's desire is for restoration, for deliverance from all that seeks to overtake us, for salvation from the things that separate us from him.

Jesus tells the disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and undergo great suffering at the hands of the elders and chief priests and scribes, and be killed, and on the third day be raised. This suffering is necessary for him so that restoration, deliverance, salvation is lavishly bestowed on us. Peter of course thinks that there is another way. But there is not according to Jesus. Jesus wants us to set our mind on **divine** things. Our mouths are to utter **precious** things. Our lives are to reflect **good** things.

God wants Jeremiah to change his thinking so divine salvation may be realized. God wants us to change our thinking so divine salvation may be realized here now. Through the loving gift of Christ Jesus God opens to us an avenue that leads from lament to a broad boulevard of restoration and hope. The only thing that Jeremiah didn't lose was God's Word! That word of hope is spoken to us now and is given to us in the bread of communion; Jesus' body given for deliverance, for restoration, for salvation. For in with and under this gift of Holy Communion our sins are forgiven. God is with us setting our minds on **divine** things, our mouths uttering **precious** things and our lives reflecting **good** things even as we stand with people like Clarissa in front of her house lamenting leaving her brother as she goes to college. That intersection; of the avenue of lament and the boulevard of restoration and hope, is a cross, the cross that Jesus bore and the one that we take up. Amen.
