## Guidelines for Worship during the time of COVID-19

## **Entering and Leaving the Church:**

Face masks are required both inside and outside. If you do not have a mask you may use one of the pre-packaged masks located at the entrances or at the usher stations. (If a face mask was provided upon arrival, kindly deposit it in the specially marked basket at the exterior doors or at the usher stations as you leave so that it can be properly washed and prepared for use again.)

Kindly sign in at the door through which you entered. This will help if we need to be in contact.

Please take your service bulletin with you or dispose of it properly. Please don't place it back into a basket.

## **Offerings:**

Monetary offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances to the nave or at the usher stations outdoors prior to the service or immediately following the service. You may also donate via our website at www.stpaulsyork.org

#### While in the Nave or on the lawn:

You may sit together as a family. Outside worshippers should place their lawn chairs using social distancing. Inside worshippers should sit in designated pews only (green card 10:30 AM. We ask that you practice social distancing from one family to the next within the pew.

#### **Communion Procedure:**

For the outside service: Communion positions are designated with a chalk cross marked on the sidewalks on Springettsbury Ave. and surrounding the lawn. Wearing your face mask., proceed to the closest sidewalk and take your place at a Communion position.

For inside services: Ushers will direct you. The pulpit side of the nave communes first followed by the font side.

Wearing your face mask, come to the chancel step taking your place at one of the five positions marked on the chancel floor with a green cross.

Your entire household may gather at one of the five positions marked by the green cross.

## For all to receive the sacrament:

- Extend your arms and cup your hands together to receive the host.
- Please do not reach out to take it from the minister.
- Once the minister has moved to the next group, then remove your mask, receive the host, replace your mask and return to your pew/seat by the closest side aisle. There is no need to hurry.

Tomorrow, September 14 the Church observes Holy Cross Day. The Prayer of the Day is as follows: Almighty God, your Son Jesus Christ was lifted high upon the cross so that he might draw the whole world to himself. ## The Lord's Prayer Confirmation Sessions Began Last Tuesday September 8

The first session of Confirmation Ministry was held on Tuesday September 8 at 6:00 PM in Christ Hall. The design of the program this season will allow for in person or remote participation by students grade 7 and up who have not yet confirmed their faith in Christ Jesus. Participants will be provided with a new study Bible. This is an edition of the sacred scripture that has proved helpful in past years and is accessible for students beginning the seventh grade. We will practice social distancing; each participant will have their own table and supplies. The sessions will video record the presenters (not the participants) so that any student not able to attend can have access to the session and complete the work independently. In addition to the Tuesday evening sessions scheduled, worship notes will be an ongoing part of the program. The worship notes forms will be provided along with all other necessary class materials. Worship notes can be completed through in person worship or by participating via the video recorded service posted to the church website. It is critically important that confirmation students who are not able to meet in person for class sessions discuss the materials with a member of their household. It is through conversations that faith and life is engaged. To enroll for the fall session please contact the church office 717-843-8155. The Confirmation Ministry follows the Small Catechism of Martin Luther. We hope that all of our students grade 7 and up will engage in this ministry.

## Discussions on the Letters to the Phillipians Four Monday evenings at 7:00 PM via ZOOM September 21, 28 October 5, 12.

Join Pastor Tom McKee in conversations on Paul's letters to the church in Philippi! St. Paul wrote letters to the Christians in Philippi to encourage them to keep the faith during difficult times. We will read part of a chapter each week. Pastor McKee will give some historical background. Participants will be invited to share what stands out to them and then reflect on what this means for their lives. This class will meet via Zoom. Please contact the church office to be provided with the link to the weekly study.

Wednesday Bible Study, @ 10:30 AM- Studying the scriptures together deepens our knowledge of the biblical content, renews faith and draws us closer together as a community of Christ. We will be studying the Old Testament reading and gospel reading for the upcoming Sunday morning. In the month of September our discussion will include Old Testament texts of Ezekiel, Genesis, and Jonah; and gospel texts in Matthew focusing on chapters 18 through 20. The group will gather in Christ Hall. We will practice physical distancing allowing ample space between participants. The sound system in Christ Hall will be utilized so that everyone should be able to hear even if positioned further from the leader.

Pops. That was what we called our grandpa Reep. He was loving and sensitive, in many ways a giant sort of teddy bear. He physically worked hard. He had huge hands; strong, rough, skilled hands. He put out a massive garden, grafted fruit trees so that they would bear several different kinds of fruit each season. He was wise. He spent evenings reading books and always concluded with reading from the Bible. When his older sister left the tenth grade to get a job, he left the eighth grade to get a job to earn money to free his younger siblings from an orphanage. Pops, our Pops, made a tremendous sacrifice to put his family together after calamity had separated them. This was not a story of jealousy or resentment or revenge. This was a story of God bringing to fruition a Genesis, a new beginning.

There was a vacant lot between my childhood home and the home of my grandparents, Pops and Gertrude. Yes, we called Grandma Reep, Gerty. It was always Pops and Gerty. They went together like peanut butter and jelly. Pops was gentle. Gertrud McFadden had an Irish temper. They both contributed to my understanding of forgiveness, and how making a way forward, was always better than being right. That vacant lot was the place where we played. It was a softball ball field, a football field, a badminton court, a camp site, and when my brothers and I would get into a tiff, fight, argue, disagree, over who was out while playing soft ball, who was tagged in football, and who was making up rules as they went along in some other game, Pops would always come over to us and say "boys, don't be ugly with one another. There are enough people who are going to treat you dirty, don't treat each other that way, you are brothers." Pop's word was "don't be ugly to one another."

And when we would take our grievance from the vacant lot to grandma Gerty she would say "Every dog has his day." It was her way of letting you know to let things go, drop the animosity, stop seeking revenge. Move on with life. Who would ever think that you could juxtapose "don't be ugly" and "every dog has his day" in a sermon on forgiveness?

Forgiveness is front and center in the lectionary readings this morning. Joseph is granting forgiveness to his brothers; brothers who were pretty ugly towards him. But in the final chapter of the book that means beginnings forgiveness is what makes a way. And Peter questioning Jesus about how many times to forgive not knowing how many times he will deny the Lord.

Joseph had dreams, dreams the future of which were unfathomable for his older brothers and his dear old dad Jacob. It was his dreams of sheaves and stars bowing down to him that got him tossed into an abandoned well, then sold to Midianite merchants and the story that he was "dead" circulating around the homestead by his brothers. The coat with the long sleeves was only a minor detail but it got painted with many colors and became center stage in a narrative that began in chaos and through God's Word brought forth things beyond imagination.

Those Midianite merchants delivered Joseph safely in the land of Egypt, Egypt, the land of the Pharaoh, and of fertile soil, rich culture, pyramids, and many gods. It is in that land where Joseph's interpretation of the Pharaoh's dreams swept him into good favor advancing the story. Now in the 50<sup>th</sup> chapter of the book of Genesis, the book of beginnings, a new beginning is about to be revealed. Those pesky older brothers, who sold him to the traveling Merchants years before, saturated that special coat with the long sleeves, the one we embellish with many colors, they saturated it with the blood of a wild animal and spun a tall tale that it was Joseph's blood and he was "dead". Now the brothers have traveled the meandering road to Egypt themselves one last time.

This time as they make their way toward their brother Joseph, their father Jacob is dead. The generous hospitality and renewed relationship awarded them by Joseph in past visits could easily be retracted. The brothers face a new circumstance requiring new assurances. Their years of guilt and fear associated with their jealousy and their inappropriate actions (Throwing their brother in a dry well and then selling him to merchants, and fabricating his death, that is all pretty ugly stuff) those actions plagued them as they anticipate their meeting with Joseph.

It is of course, the wronged party who can break a cycle such as this. It is only the injured one who can allow forgiveness to flow forth. So when they beg Joseph to forgive their transgression and the harm they did to him. Joseph wept. His brothers fell down (just like Joseph had dreamed when he was a 17 year old boy) and they wept too. They are willing to be servants, slaves for their brother Joseph. But he calls to them *do not be afraid! Am I in the place of God? Even though you intended to do harm to me, God meant it for good.* What? No judging, no revenge, no putting them in their place, no extreme action?

In the words of Grandma, "every dog has his day" and it seemed that this was that day for Joseph, when his brothers, the ones who treated him "ugly" fell to their knees and wept, begging for forgiveness.

His brothers had planned it for evil, while God planned it for good. Joseph's brothers were so concerned about their own plan and plot and action that in the midst of their scheme they were unable to recognize another plan about which none of them knew, a plan hidden but sure in its work. This hidden plan was God's. It is a Genesis of its own for relationship, and family, and tribe, and nation, and future that for so many is too vast to conceive.

Forgiveness is central. And forgiveness is God's to give and grant and bring about. God's forgiving love began in chaos and is brought forth in the Word. The narrative advances. Rarely do repentant perpetrators come forth. But when they do, it seems from the Genesis text that tears often accompany their fear filled lives. The Psalms and prayers of lament reflect the conviction that it is enough to trust the plan of God to refute the deathly plans of others. In God's world, we are not helpless in the face of such schemes. The purposes of God supersede the best human plans.

In these days we are faced with new circumstance requiring new assurances. The assurances continue to come from God. God continues to weep and to forgive. And I, we continue to receive that gracious Word, Christ himself in the promise of baptism and Holy Communion. Christ Jesus breaks the old cycle of sin and death allowing for Genesis, beginnings for you and me. Beginnings do flow forth from broken deadly cycles giving life for relationships, and family, and community, and a future that for so many is beyond imagination.

Sometimes we have days that seem as though we have been tossed into a drywell or sold out by the very ones we thought cared about us. Such betrayals do come. And with them forgiveness isn't the first thing on our minds. Getting even, settling the score, revenge looks pretty good. But this is not the way of God. It is not making a way, opening a future. Grandma Gerty with her "every dog has his day" and Pops with his don't be "ugly" and Joseph grasping something of God's making a way, and Jesus' seventy-seven times move us to a place of forgiveness, reconciliation, new beginnings.

When we were kids it was the thing that allowed us to resume a softball game, get back into a huddle and work out a plan to score a touchdown. Forgiveness is God making a way even out of an abandoned well, in a foreign land, among people who sometimes treat you "ugly." Amen.

# FIRST READING: Genesis 50:15-21 [not printed]

Psalm 103: [1-7] 8-13

# SECOND READING: Romans 14:1-12

Welcome those who are weak in faith, but not for the purpose of quarreling over opinions. <sup>2</sup>Some believe in eating anything, while the weak eat only vegetables. <sup>3</sup>Those who eat must not despise those who abstain, and those who abstain must not pass judgment on those who eat; for God has welcomed them. <sup>4</sup>Who are you to pass judgment on servants of another? It is before their own lord that they stand or fall. And they will be upheld, for the Lord is able to make them stand.

<sup>5</sup>Some judge one day to be better than another, while others judge all days to be alike. Let all be fully convinced in their own minds. <sup>6</sup>Those who observe the day, observe it in honor of the Lord. Also those who eat, eat in honor of the Lord, since they give thanks to God; while those who abstain, abstain in honor of the Lord and give thanks to God.

<sup>7</sup>We do not live to ourselves, and we do not die to ourselves. <sup>8</sup>If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord; so then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's. <sup>9</sup>For to this end Christ died and lived again, so that he might be Lord of both the dead and the living.

<sup>10</sup>Why do you pass judgment on your brother or sister? Or you, why do you despise your brother or sister? For we will all stand before the judgment seat of God. <sup>11</sup>For it is written,

"As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bow to me,

and every tongue shall give praise to God."

So then, each of us will be accountable to God.

## GOSPEL: Matthew 18:21-35

Peter came and said to [Jesus,] "Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?" <sup>22</sup>Jesus said to him, "Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times.

23"For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves. <sup>24</sup>When he began the reckoning, one who owed him ten thousand talents was brought to him; 25 and, as he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, and payment to be made. 26So the slave fell on his knees before him, saying, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.' 27And out of pity for him, the lord of that slave released him and forgave him the debt. 28 But that same slave, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow slaves who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat, he said, 'Pay what you owe.' 29 Then his fellow slave fell down and pleaded with him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' 30 But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he would pay the debt. 31 When his fellow slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. 32 Then his lord summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. 33Should you not have had mercy on your fellow slave, as I had mercy on you?' 34And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he would pay his entire debt. 35So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart."
