## Guidelines for Worship during the time of COVID-19

## **Entering and Leaving the Church:**

Face masks are required both inside and outside. If you do not have a mask you may use one of the pre-packaged masks located at the entrances or at the usher stations. (If a face mask was provided upon arrival, kindly deposit it in the specially marked basket at the exterior doors or at the usher stations as you leave so that it can be properly washed and prepared for use again.)

Kindly sign in at the door through which you entered. This will help if we need to be in contact.

Please take your service bulletin with you or dispose of it properly. Please don't place it back into a basket.

# **Offerings:**

Monetary offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances to the nave or at the usher stations outdoors prior to the service or immediately following the service. You may also donate via our website at www.stpaulsyork.org

#### While in the Nave or on the lawn:

You may sit together as a family. Outside worshippers should place their lawn chairs using social distancing. Inside worshippers should sit in designated pews only (green card 10:30 AM. We ask that you practice social distancing from one family to the next within the pew.

#### **Communion Procedure:**

For the outside service: Communion positions are designated with a chalk cross marked on the sidewalks on Springettsbury Ave. and surrounding the lawn. Wearing your face mask., proceed to the closest sidewalk and take your place at a Communion position.

For inside services: Ushers will direct you. The pulpit side of the nave communes first followed by the font side.

Wearing your face mask, come to the chancel step taking your place at one of the five positions marked on the chancel floor with a green cross.

Your entire household may gather at one of the five positions marked by the green cross.

## For all to receive the sacrament:

- Extend your arms and cup your hands together to receive the host.
- Please do not reach out to take it from the minister.
- Once the minister has moved to the next group, then remove your mask, receive the host, replace your mask and return to your pew/seat by the closest side aisle. There is no need to hurry.

On Monday September 14 the Church observes Holy Cross Day. The Prayer of the Day is as follows: Almighty God, your Son Jesus Christ was lifted high upon the cross so that he might draw the whole world to himself. Grant that we who glory in his death for our salvation may also glory in his call to take up our cross and follow him; through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. We will observe the day with Vespers at 6:30 PM. If the weather is cooperative we will gather on the south lawn encircling the large wooden lawn cross. If there is rain, we will hold the liturgy in the Church Nave. Worshipers are asked to bring a cross that holds significant meaning for them. The crosses will be placed on tables at the base of the cross for all to view. The Liturgy will be recorded and posted on the church website and Facebook page.

# Confirmation Sessions Begin Tuesday September 8 @ 6:00 PM

The first session of Confirmation Ministry will begin on Tuesday September 8 at 6:00 PM in Christ Hall. The sessions will last 45 minutes so please arrive promptly. The design of the program this season will allow for in person or remote participation by students grade 7 and up who have not yet confirmed their faith in Christ Jesus. Participants will be provided with a new study Bible. This is an edition of the sacred scripture that has proved helpful in past years and is accessible for students beginning the seventh grade. We will practice social distancing; each participant will have their own table and supplies. The sessions will video record the presenters (not the participants) so that any student not able to attend can have access to the session and complete the work independently. In addition to the Tuesday evening sessions scheduled, worship notes will be an ongoing part of the program. The worship notes forms will be provided along with all other necessary class materials. Worship notes can be completed through in person worship or by participating via the video recorded service posted to the church website. It is critically important that confirmation students who are not able to meet in person for class sessions discuss the materials with a member of their household. It is through conversations that faith and life is engaged. To enroll for the fall session please contact the church office 717-843-8155. The Confirmation Ministry follows the Small Catechism of Martin Luther. We will begin with the section on The Lord's Prayer. The start date for the fall session is September 8 and the concluding date is October 27. We hope that all of our students grade 7 and up will engage in this ministry.

# Discussions on the Letters to the Phillipians Four Monday evenings at 7:00 PM via ZOOM September 21, 28 October 5, 12.

Join Pastor Tom McKee in conversations on Paul's letters to the church in Philippi! St. Paul wrote letters to the Christians in Philippi to encourage them to keep the faith during difficult times. We will read part of a chapter each week. Pastor McKee will give some historical background. Participants will be invited to share what stands out to them and then reflect on what this means for their lives. This class will meet via Zoom. Please contact the church office to be provided with the link to the weekly study.

Wednesday Bible Study, September 9 @ 10:30 AM- Studying the scriptures together deepens our knowledge of the biblical content, renews faith and draws us closer together as a community of Christ. We will be studying the Old Testament reading and gospel reading for the upcoming Sunday morning. In the month of September our discussion will include Old Testament texts of Ezekiel, Genesis, and Jonah; and gospel texts in Matthew focusing on chapters 18 through 20. The group will gather in Christ Hall. We will practice physical distancing allowing ample space between participants. The sound system in Christ Hall will be utilized so that everyone should be able to hear even if positioned further from

Sacred texts gave form and shape to Ezekiel's life. Just as the Bible today gives form and shape to our lives. As God's messenger Ezekiel grasped the book of Exodus (22:21-22, 25-27) and its importance for life and living in relationship with God and with one another. We know the book of Exodus mostly as it relates to the move from bondage and captivity under Pharaoh, crossing the Red Sea, and the giving of the law as stated in the Ten Commandments. But Ezekiel had a deeper grasp of the law and how it shaped relationships.

You shall not wrong or oppress a resident alien, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt.

You shall not abuse any widow or orphan.

If you lend money to my people, to the poor among you, you shall not deal with them as a creditor; you shall not exact interest from them.

If you take your neighbor's cloak in pawn, you shall restore it before the sun goes down; for it may be your neighbor's only clothing to use as cover; in what else shall that person sleep?

These are God's laws. This section of the book of Exodus sports the heading *Social and religious laws*. We don't spend much time rooting around in religious biblical laws. We are Lutheran's; people who pride ourselves on grace. As Lutheran's we are also a biblically literate people. We are people who delve into the scriptures and use them to interpret scripture. Brother Martin himself found this endeavor to fill up nearly every waking hour of a day. (That is why his beloved wife Katie did all of the work and allowed him to wage reformation.) These religious laws are exemplary for us this morning as we tackle the reading from the Prophet Ezekiel. They provide a part of the backstory for making sense of the present story.

Every good story has a turning point. The turning point is critical to the whole of the story and the book of Ezekiel is no exception. The turning point in the first reading is the fall of Jerusalem. Now in order to fall you have to have experienced; some height, some prestige, some recognition about who you are, where you have come from, what makes you different, what makes you stand out from all the others.

And part of what made God's people stand out from all the others is that Israel's God is the protector of the legally defenseless. That God stands with the resident alien the sojourner in the land. That God positions himself with the orphan and widow and the poor. These are the religious attitudes and actions that set Israel apart from the others and what provided them with such a vibrant reputation.

But remember our turning point. These things had all but fallen by the wayside. There was so much more that was appealing, calling to them, stroking their ego. When Ezekiel lamented to God and cried out to the people to turn from their wicked, sinful ways, his words fell on deaf ears. People didn't want to hear about how far they had fallen, how their reputation was soiled, how they had forgotten the days in Egypt and the years spent eking out life and living in a place that was not theirs. But now at this turning point, at this critical moment, Ezekiel is banned from addressing his fellow Israelites.

This is a time of crisis. Ezekiel knew it. He recognized the signs; exorbitant interest being charged in the markets, lack of care for widows and orphans, sojourners being put out, and the only thing being protected was the wicked way of life that had taken possession of them. Ezekiel is doing ministry in a time of crisis. Ministry during a time of crisis is complex and burdensome. It is tough going creating an awareness that will lead people to appropriate action. Most of us would run from such a task. Ezekiel knows that to have any meaningful kind of life it involves association with God. And to have association with God one needs to be living obediently to the "life giving laws" of God. (The text sited from Exodus.) So, turning, a turning point in the story, a turning point in your life, Ezekiel reminds us that *God does not desire the death of sinners (wicked) but rather that we turn from our sinful (wicked) ways and live.* In the Gospel reading it is stated in language of binding and loosening. Turning is a matter of doing rather than aspiring or hoping or longing or even wanting something more, something other than the present situation in which you and I find ourselves. Turning is a matter of doing. It is action.

We hear this text most often in the large extended confession of sin on Ash Wednesday. Where we tell God and one another that we are going to take up the disciplines of lent; prayer, fasting, almsgiving. For 40 days we are going to pray more, eat less, and give enough so that someone else can have a life. Early in ministry as an exercise for the stewardship committee, as an example of giving, generosity, I asked folks to use the dollar amount of their weekly offering to purchase groceries in their home that week! Man O Day was there belly aching (and not because they were fasting)! We are "all in" on Ash Wednesday stating as a matter of fact how we want to turn our lives around. And the turning comes with the doing. The examples from Exodus; restoring the poor man's pledge, returning stolen property, standing with the poor and needy, helping the legally defenseless, and making sure that people aren't swindled out of having a pair of pajamas when it is time for bed. These all require doing, being active, engaging on behalf of the other.

This liberating teaching that Ezekiel was on about as messenger of the most-high God is all about removing burdens of the past and opening up the possibility of a different future. Ezekiel remembered that Israel's God is the protector of the very ones that are being given the short end of the stick, or worse, no stick at all. The liberating teaching that we proclaim is how the most-high God is all about removing burdens of the past and opening to us the possibility of a different future through his Son, Christ Jesus. Jesus comes on the scene and the first words proclaimed in a time of crisis are "repent" turn, live differently, love abundantly, give generously, transform life. Turn.

We are in the presence of the Lord this morning. He comes among us forgiving us from past burdens and opening up the possibility of a different future with him and with our neighbors. Christ Jesus through his own death and resurrection graciously provides a way for us. But the turning took action, doing, on his part. He took up the cross, was beaten, suffered and died, was buried, and was raised up on the third day, to make a way. Through Jesus there is a turning point in the story; in your story and mine, of life before when we lived for self, and life now taking up the cross living for others. Ezekiel was silenced, banned from speaking out about how far God's people had fallen. The fall of Jerusalem is a turning point. Christ Jesus gives us opportunity to turn and live. Every good story has a turning point. Ours is possible through Jesus' love. Amen.

#### FIRST READING: Ezekiel 33:7-11

So you, mortal, I have made a sentinel for the house of Israel; whenever you hear a word from my mouth, you shall give them warning from me. <sup>8</sup>If I say to the wicked, "O wicked ones, you shall surely die," and you do not speak to warn the wicked to turn from their ways, the wicked shall die in their iniquity, but their blood I will require at your hand. <sup>9</sup>But if you warn the wicked to turn from their ways, and they do not turn from their ways, the wicked shall die in their iniquity, but you will have saved your life.

<sup>10</sup>Now you, mortal, say to the house of Israel, Thus you have said: "Our transgressions and our sins weigh upon us, and we waste away because of them; how then can we live?" <sup>11</sup>Say to them, As I live, says the Lord God, I have no pleasure in the death of the wicked, but that the wicked turn from their ways and live; turn back, turn back from your evil ways; for why will you die, O house of Israel?

# SECOND READING: Romans 13:8-14

Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. <sup>9</sup>The commandments, "You shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet"; and any other commandment, are summed up in this word, "Love your neighbor as yourself." <sup>10</sup>Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law.

<sup>11</sup>Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; <sup>12</sup>the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armor of light; <sup>13</sup>let us live honorably as in the day, not in reveling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarreling and jealousy. <sup>14</sup>Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

## GOSPEL: Matthew 18:15-20

[Jesus said to the disciples:] "If another member of the church sins against you, go and point out the fault when the two of you are alone. If the member listens to you, you have regained that one. <sup>16</sup>But if you are not listened to, take one or two others along with you, so that every word may be confirmed by the evidence of two or three witnesses. 17 If the member refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church; and if the offender refuses to listen even to the church. let such a one be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector. 18 Truly I tell you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven. <sup>19</sup>Again, truly I tell you, if two of you agree on earth about anything you ask, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven. 20 For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them."
