Entering and Leaving the Church:

Face masks are required inside,

Kindly sign in at the door through which you entered. This will help if we need to be in contact.

Please take your service bulletin with you or dispose of it properly.

Offerings:

Monetary offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances to the nave prior to the service or immediately following the service. You may also donate via our website at www.stpaulsyork.org

While in the Nave:

Please wear your mask. You may sit together as a family. Please sit in designated pews only. We ask that you practice social distancing from one family to the next within the pew.

Communion Procedure:

- Ushers will direct you. The pulpit side (left) of the nave communes first followed by the font side (right).
- Wearing your face mask, come to the chancel step taking your place at one of the five positions marked on the chancel floor with a green cross.
- Your entire household may gather at a position marked by the green cross.
- Extend your arms and cup your hands together to receive the host.
- Please do not reach out to take the Host from the minister.
- Once the minister has moved to the next group, then remove your mask, receive the host, replace your mask and return to your pew/seat by the closest side aisle. There is no need to hurry.
- We are receiving communion in one kind only (bread/host).

He made water a sign of the kingdom and of cleansing and rebirth.


In obedience to this command we make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.



In the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

The relationship between God and humankind has, to say the least, been a tumultuous one. In the beginning God said: "let us make humankind in our image, in our likeness, ... So God created humankind in God's own image, in the image of God he created him, male and female God created them."

To be made in the image of God is to be created for community with God who is within God's own self a community of three persons, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and in community with one another. To be created in the likeness of God is to be created to live in a covenantal relationship with God and with one another. It is to be created by, with, and for self-giving love. It is to live in obedient trust in the One who formed us from the dust of the earth.

But from the beginning humankind has broken that relationship, not being content with being created in the image of God, but wanting to be God. And we are participants in that brokenness. We have all sinned and fallen short of the glory of God; we have not trusted God to be God. We have not trusted God's will to be for our good, our life. We have sought gods who fulfill our wishes and desires. We have rejected our Creator. Yet from the beginning God has sought to restore a positive relationship with humankind. God chose Abraham and Sarah to be the beginning of a special people, a people who would be a blessing to the nations, a people who would proclaim the love and mercy of the Creator to all the world, a people who would bring all peoples into the embrace of God's bountiful love and care. But even this chosen family turned to their own interests. Jacob stole Esau's birthright. Joseph's brothers sold him into slavery in Egypt. God raised up Moses to call an enslaved people to freedom and gave them the Law to proclaim how God's people live together before God and one another in righteousness and justice. God cared for this people in the wilderness and brought them to the promised land. And still they complained and sought other gods. The history of Israel is the story of God seeking to restore the relationship between the Creator and humankind through Israel and of Israel repeatedly turning from that relationship.

By the time of Jeremiah the break was great. Jeremiah called upon leaders and people to repent, to return to the Lord God. He announced that they were only an instant away from a cataclysmic event of God's judgment. They had provoked God's anger by their turning away from God and worshipping the works of their own hands. They sought protection and safety from political alliances with foreign governments, often playing one against another. God's sorrow and disappointment were great. Yet so was God's love and faithfulness. The people had a stubborn and rebellious heart, a heart they were unable to cure themselves. Only God can give a heart that knows the Creator and Redeemer. Only God can bring about the transformation of every person, a transformation which fulfills the Creator's will for a righteous and holy people.

After years of the prophet's announcing pestilence, slaughter, famine, and captivity if Israel did not turn from her sinful, idolatrous ways, calamity did indeed strike. Jerusalem and the Temple were destroyed; the people carried off into captivity. And now Jeremiah had a new word to speak: a word of hope and comfort proclaiming that Babylon's harsh rule would not last forever. A word that God's covenant with Israel was eternal. As Abraham Heschel writes: "Jeremiah proclaimed the promise of a covenant which will mean not only complete forgiveness of sin, but also a complete transformation of Israel." Jeremiah announced that Israel's future depended not

on the Temple, nor the kings but on God's faithfulness and mercy and on a new covenant to be written by the creative power of God's love upon human hearts. The day is coming, Jeremiah announced, when God's people would know and keep the covenant and be obedient to God's law. The people of God would know the truth. They would know the life and freedom which comes with living in a covenant relationship with God. They would know the joy and peace which comes from living lives obedient to God's will.

What is envisaged is not a new law negating the law given on Sinai, but a new way of knowing and keeping that covenant. God's Spirit will move the hearts of Israel to be obedient. The relationship of life and love between God and humanity, ruptured by humanity's idolatry, will be restored by a matchless act of Israel's God. The very Word of God by which all things were created, the second person of the Trinity, became flesh and dwelt among us full of grace and truth. Jesus, Son of God, Son of Mary – God deep in the flesh. Here God shows the extent of God's love and faithfulness – a love that reaches out to embrace all peoples from arms outstretched on the cross, a love that takes our death and sin into God's own life in order to break its power over us, a love that rises from the grave in triumph – Love is victorious!

To know this Jesus is to know the God who sent him. To know this Jesus is be set free – free from the destructive power of sin, free from our own selfish wants and desires, free to serve and love our neighbor as ourselves, free to live in a loving relationship with our Creator and Redeemer. Only through this Jesus can we know the life for which we were created. Only through this Jesus can we know true joy and peace and community.

And how do we know this Jesus? We know him as the Spirit opens our ears and hearts to meet him through the witness and proclamation of others. We know him as we hear the proclamation of the Gospel. And to that end God calls men and women to speak his Word and tell of his love.

God has called women and men from the beginning to do his will and proclaim his word. Moses was the law-giver. Miriam was a prophetess, Deborah and Samuel were judges. Jeremiah and Isai-ah, Ezekiel and Daniel were prophets. Mary, betrothed to Joseph, was called to be a bearer to the world of the Word of God. Mary Magdalene was an Apostle to the Apostles, announcing the good news of the Resurrection of Jesus to the disciples. Peter and Andrew, James and John and the other Apostles spread the good news of the resurrection. Paul and Timothy, Dorcas and Phoebe proclaimed this good news. And so it continues throughout the ages: Polycarp and Augustine, Monica and Lydia, Jerome, Martin and Katie, Stan and Emily, Kelly and Victor, Patty and Bill, Jessica and Tristan and on and on.

Humankind continues to rebel and turn away from the God who loves us relentlessly. And God continues to raise up persons to call humanity back to live in a relationship of love and obedience. God calls you and I through our baptisms into Christ.

Let us seek to respond faithfully and joyfully to the call to speak God's Word and care for God's people. Let us boast in the Cross of Christ. Let us call all God's people to repentance and to a restored, life-giving relationship with our Creator and Redeemer. God's Spirit is at work among us giving us new minds and hearts and voices so that we can live faithfully before God and in community with one another and so that we can call others also so to live. Praise be God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit!

FIRST READING: Jeremiah 31:31-34

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. 32 It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt-a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the LORD. 33But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. 34 No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, "Know the LORD," for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the LORD; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

Psalm 46

SECOND READING: Romans 3:19-28

Now we know that whatever the law says, it speaks to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be silenced, and the whole world may be held accountable to God. ²⁰For "no human being will be justified in his sight" by deeds prescribed by the law, for through the law comes the knowledge of sin.

²¹But now, apart from law, the righteousness of God has been disclosed, and is attested by the law and the prophets, ²²the righteousness

of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction, ²⁸since all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God; ²⁴they are now justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, ²⁵whom God put forward as a sacrifice of atonement by his blood, effective through faith. He did this to show his righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over the sins previously committed; ²⁶it was to prove at the present time that he himself is righteous and that he justifies the one who has faith in Jesus.

²⁷Then what becomes of boasting? It is excluded. By what law? By that of works? No, but by the law of faith. ²⁸For we hold that a person is justified by faith apart from works prescribed by the law.

GOSPEL: John 8:31-36

Jesus said to the Jews who had believed in him, "If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; ³²and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free." ³³They answered him, "We are descendants of Abraham and have never been slaves to anyone. What do you mean by saying, 'You will be made free'?"

³⁴Jesus answered them, "Very truly, I tell you, everyone who commits sin is a slave to sin. ³⁵The slave does not have a permanent place in the household; the son has a place there forever. ³⁶So if the Son makes you free, you will be free indeed."
