

Christmas Eve B, 2020 Pastor's Sermon

Roger signed up to work as a census taker. On one of his first days canvasing a neighborhood he knocked on the door of a Mrs. Harriet Manson. Mrs. Manson was a proud woman, and while she was willing to answer some of Roger's census questions there were a few for which she would not respond. One such question had to do with her age. When asked how old she was Mrs. Manson responded with a question.

"Did Mr. and Mrs. Hill across the street answer that question?"

"They certainly did" responded Roger.

"Well then" said Mrs. Manson "simply fill in what they said, because we are about the same age."

Roger filled in the line on the census form, thanked Mrs. Manson and went on to the next home. At the end of the day Roger submitted his days' work to his supervisor. Miss Shanna looked over the pile of forms rather quickly and then called Roger back into her cubical.

"Roger" she said "you need to be more exact with the information you obtain from the clients."

"What do you mean" asked Roger.

"Look, Roger, look at this form" said Miss Shanna.

"You simply can't put down that Mrs. Manson is as old as the Hills!"

It is 2020. Like I needed to remind any of you! It is the year of the census. I am not really certain who it is on the current playing field that is calling the shots on the Census in our nation; Roger, Miss Shanna or someone higher up in the administration, but at the birth of Jesus it was Caesar who was calling the shots. His imperial decree led Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem. Now if you don't think that the census mattered, take note that in the span of five verses, census is mentioned four times.

It is like having a conversation with an elementary age child in early December and in nearly every sentence they work in what it is that they would like to have for Christmas. The census was the tool that the Roman government used to levy taxes and calculate how much military force would be needed in order to keep peace, order, and maintain an upper hand. Census had the capacity to incite insurrection. It could easily be the catalyst for revolt.

The gospel writer Luke uses the census to advance the plot, to get Mary and Joseph to be in a particular place at a particular time. What should be noted is that when Caesar **commands**, the parents of Jesus **do** what is required. There is a certain amount of fear lurking behind the scenes. Imagine fear, when we just heard the angel herald "fear not" to the shepherds on the Hills outside of Bethlehem. But fear is lurking.

To be truthful, I don't think that Mary and Joseph are the revolutionary sorts. Mary sang about the poor being lifted up and the rich being sent away empty. And Joseph is a woodworker; he uses a plane and sandpaper, varnish. I don't peg them for the kind who would get onto social media and spew a bunch of stuff to get people worked up and garner a following of anti-taxers and militia want-to-bees. No I think that from the beginning of the story we are seeing how the imperial power of Rome, of humankind, is going to be in a thirty odd year collision course with the baby Jesus whose birth we celebrate this night. We are witnessing the curtain rising on the story of how God's promised Messiah the one whose rule will be forever will come into complete and total tension (butting heads) with the emperor Caser's political authority and military power.

Of course, even the emperor's decree can bring about God's purpose. It is that census decree that gets Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem linking them to the scripture, which underscored that the Messiah would be from the line of David. So something as simple as the census, decreed by a foreign government, brings to fruition the fact that the Messiah would be born in the scriptural epicenter Bethlehem.

Now we know what got Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem. The more pressing question is what got you here tonight? Why did you switch on social media to follow along on the Christmas journey? What brings us together tonight is the power of the story that what Mary sings about comes to be in Jesus. The poor are lifted up and the rich are sent empty away. Those seeking to secure their own future with political authority and military power are shown that in Christ Jesus there is another way. It is the power of God's gentle rule, of God's gracious power to transform lives and lift up the lowly and do great things for them, for us. And that story centers on a baby named Jesus born in a stable who slept gently that first night on the fresh hay piled into a cow's trough. He ends up away from home, starts his earthly life without the comforts of a family residence, and his parents are most likely weary, stressed, anxious, and a little bit afraid of the too many unknowns they are confronting.

How many unknowns are you confronting this night? How weary, stressed, anxious or afraid are you? Oh, you may be waiting for some political decree to signal that things will be different, made right. You may be anticipating some military force to straighten out what you find to be crooked. But it is in this tiny child whom we welcome, the one who grows up only to collide with the powers of the likes of Caesar, where we find true solace. Jesus binds us together.

This takes place away from home not in Bethlehem as an infant but away from home in Jerusalem as a grown man. It wasn't the census that incited an insurrection that day in Jerusalem, but it was an angry mob that forced the hand of leadership to release a bandit, a common criminal rather than an innocent man. The angry mob instilled fear in the governmental authorities and forced their hand. A known criminal Barabbas was released and Jesus was condemned to death on a cross.

There it is at the end of his earthly life without any comfort on the hard wood of the cross that he gives himself for us; the true Christmas present. On the cross he takes upon himself the; wearies, stresses, anxieties, and fears of humanity. Jesus confronts all of them so that you and I are set free from them. They along with sin and death no longer define us. In the decree of Christ Jesus you are set free. The Christmas carol states it this way; *The hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight*. Jesus comes among us to reign forever, so that in his census everyone counts, everyone matters, and everyone belongs. Amen.
