Entering and Leaving the Church:

While in the Nave:

Please wear your mask. Please sit in designated pews only. You may sit together as a family. We ask that you practice social distancing from one family to the next within the pew.

Communion Procedure:

- Ushers will direct you. The pulpit side (left) of the nave communes first followed by the font side (right).
- Wearing your face mask, come to the chancel step taking your place at one of the five positions marked on the chancel floor with a green cross.
- Your entire household may gather at a position marked by the green cross.
- Extend your arms and cup your hands together to receive the host.
- Please do not reach out to take the Host from the minister.
- Once the minister has moved to the next group, then remove your mask, receive the host, replace your mask and return to your pew by the closest side aisle. There is no need to hurry.
- We are receiving communion in one kind only (bread/host).

Epiphany 3 B, 2021 Pastor's Sermon Jonah 3:1-5, 10 1 Corinthians 7:29-3 Mark 1:14-20

At the inauguration ceremony on Capitol Hill, the young woman wearing a Canary yellow coat, Amanda Gorman, stood up, stepped up, and spoke up. Her use of vocabulary, poetic image, cadence, rhyme got me caught up in a moment where I sat up sensing that her words would build up people, who like me, were a bit fed up and needed something to pick up their spirits. After she delivered her inaugural poem I wondered what books her mother read to her as a child. I wondered what stories peaked her curiosity then and now. I wondered if words were always a thing for her, like paint is to me, wanting to mix up combinations that perk up your ears. Word combinations with more than one meaning:

build up	caught up	checkup	cleaned up	fed up	follow up	get up
hang up	hurry up	lay-up	let up	look up	mix up	
open up	pick up	put up	shut up	sit up	slip up	
speed up	step up	stop up	wind up			

These word combinations have more than one meaning. I gained my insight through the work of Lemony Snicket, author of "A Series of Unfortunate Events." In those stories the author interjects words and phrases and explains that such a word or phrase can have more than one meaning. It teaches young readers, and older readers like me, the rich use of language and how words and phrases used in a particular way, occasion, or sequence, open up new understanding for the reader, the hearer. The young woman wearing a Canary yellow coat certainly had that effect on me on Wednesday. She made me want to step up.

For example "cleaned up" may indeed be a response given to a parent inquiring of the condition of a child's bed room. "Yes mom my room is cleaned up."

"Cleaned up" may also be the response given by your spouse when she or he returns from poker night. "I really cleaned up tonight!"

"Hang up" is what people of a particular age once did to end a telephone call.

In modern culture "hang up" may be used indicating particular peculiarities causing angst.

"Shut up" is often something we are not supposed to say. But "shut up" in modern times is used as an expression of exuberance "Did you hear that Sally won the Power Ball Drawing last night?" to which Francine responded "shut up."

"Shut up" is what happened in the days of Elijah the prophet to the heavens. There would be no rain because the Lord God "shut up" the heavens.

This morning I am most interested in "caught up" which can indicate that one has moved from a place behind, lagging, to where he or she needs to be with work, or a race, or household chores. "Caught up" has the powerful thrust of being "overcome;" "taken over," as in "she is caught up in the Kingdom of God." That is where we find Peter, Andrew, James and John in the gospel reading; caught up in the Kingdom of God; The Kingdom for which they will step up and follow up and build up.

Imagine this morning that we could state whole heartedly that we are "caught up in the

Kingdom of God!" That pushes the imagery from fishing and fishing net into a new or perhaps different realm for us. Caught, caught in the Kingdom of God.

What implications would that entail? What response would we give?

How would we live?

What would guide our decision making?

How would complete strangers experience us if we were exhibiting signs of being caught up in the Kingdom of God?

For years I thought about the Kingdom of God as; place, realm, location, heaven. It took some thinking, pondering, theological reading to entertain the notion that the Kingdom of God lies in following Jesus, his call for us and to us to; step up, follow up, build up. Not so much place as action.

This morning we hear again, the third time in less than two months through the lectionary readings, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near, repent, and believe in the good news." The kingdom of God is at hand because Jesus is here! The long promised one takes on flesh and blood and lives and moves and encounters humanity in a new way. Through the cross and resurrection the pouring out of the Spirit at Pentecost the Risen Christ gives himself for us anew. In Baptism God's Spirit is bestowed on you and me and we are called to follow. Jesus calls to Peter, Andrew, James and John: "Follow me and I will make you fish for people." And just how will they fish for people? They are caught up in following Jesus. They are stepping up, following up, and building up because they are caught up!

The invitation to follow Jesus is a call to personal commitment. Personal commitment is what is required for the Christian life. It is required as a follower of Jesus, and it is required for kingdom life. Without it, few are caught up. They simply hang out in the net for a while and then swim their own way once they see an opening.

In the gospel of Mark, chapter 8:34, a key verse is written in first person singular. It is extending a personal invitation to come after Jesus just as it was for Peter, Andrew, James and John that day by the Galilean Lake. "Jesus called the crowd to him along with his disciples and said: If anyone would come after me, (That is the literal translation of "follow me") he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me and for the gospel will save it." This is just as easily read: "If anyone would come after me, she must deny herself and take up her cross and follow me. For whoever wants to save her life will lose it, but whoever loses her life for me and for the gospel will save it." This text is not corporate in nature. Most of the time I am stressing the plurality, the corporate nature of Biblical texts but this invitation to follow Jesus is a call to personal commitment which leads to personal knowledge and moves one to be **caught up** in the kingdom. And that is where authentic and fruitful ministry abounds. In the passion of our Lord who is caught up in love for you and me and all of humanity. Christ Jesus calls us to follow, to come after, to get caught up in what really matters, life now loving God and neighbor and for eternity in Christ.

On Wednesday the woman in the Canary yellow coat called me to step up. Today it is Christ Jesus calling you to be caught up in kingdom life. Once you are caught up in kingdom life in Christ Jesus you are bound to: build up, hurry up, look up, open up, sit up, stand up, step up, and speak up inviting others to get up and follow! Amen.

FIRST READING: Jonah 3:1-5, 10

The word of the LORD came to Jonah a second time, saying, ²"Get up, go to Nineveh, that great city, and proclaim to it the message that I tell you." ³So Jonah set out and went to Nineveh, according to the word of the LORD. Now Nineveh was an exceedingly large city, a three days' walk across. ⁴Jonah began to go into the city, going a day's walk. And he cried out, "Forty days more, and Nineveh shall be overthrown!" ⁵And the people of Nineveh believed God; they proclaimed a fast, and everyone, great and small, put on sackcloth.

¹⁰When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil ways, God changed his mind about the calamity that he had said he would bring upon them; and he did not do it.

Brothers and sisters, the appointed time has grown short; from now on, let even those who have wives be as though they had none, ³⁰and those who mourn as though they were not mourning, and those who rejoice as though they were not rejoicing, and those who buy as though they had no possessions, ³¹and those who deal with the world as though they had no dealings with it. For the present form of this world is passing away.

GOSPEL: Mark 1:14-20

Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, ¹⁵and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near, repent, and believe in the good news."

¹⁶As Jesus passed along the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net into the sea—for they were fishermen. ¹⁷And Jesus said to them, "Follow me and I will make you fish for people." ¹⁸And immediately they left their nets and followed him. ¹⁹As he went a little farther, he saw James son of Zebedee and his brother John, who were in their boat mending the nets. ²⁰Immediately he called them; and they left their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired men, and followed him.
