Ash Wednesday Services **Bible Study Resumes**

February 17th officially marks the beginning of the season of Lent. This holy time allows us to focus on prayer and acts of mercy. We will hold three liturgies; 8:00 AM and Noon, Holy Communion, spoken and 7:00 PM Holy Communion with cantor and limited music. This year we will not observe in the imposition of ashes. We will however be reminded of the words from Genesis "remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return." Also on Ash

Wednesday at 10:30 AM we will resume in person Bible study in Christ Hall. We will continue to be physically distant, wear masks, and keep the time limited. The microphone will be used so as to amplify the presenter throughout the room. We will spend the majority of our time studying the Epistle lesson appointed for the up-coming Sunday. Those readings are: First Peter 3:18-22, Romans 4:13-25, First Corinthians1:18-25, Ephesians 2:1-10, and Hebrews 5:5-10. We will have time to look more closely at these five letters and see how they are applicable for our life together. Please make time to mark this holy season.

5:00 PM Holy Communion The Ten Commandments

The 5:00 PM liturgy was offered on the first Sunday of November as a way to spread out worshipers so that fewer people would be in the church nave at any one time. We have enjoyed a variety of liturgies; Vespers sung and spoken, Holy Communion spoken, Holy Baptism, and Affirmation of Baptism. During the Five Sundays in Lent the 5:00 PM liturgy will be Holy Communion, spoken. The simplicity of the liturgy, the stillness of the church nave dur-

ing periods of silence, the sermon centering on the Ten Commandments and the communal celebration of the Lord's Supper provide yet another pathway for us during the season of Lent. Attendance at this service time has remained low, ranging from 3 to 24. These liturgies will serve as the next unit for our confirmation students as they study the 10 Commandments. The services will be posted to social media so that all of our students can access the sermons and instructional aspects of the liturgy.

Confirmation Ministry

Confirmation students will be focusing on the Ten Commandments during the season of Lent. The students can participate in person on Sunday evenings at the 5:00 PM spoken Holy Communion liturgy or they may view it online when it is posted for Wednesday mid-week worship. The liturgy will highlight two commandments each week for the five weeks in Lent. It is our hope that some of our students and their families will attend each week in person. Students will be asked to serve as lector where they will read one lesson. Packets of materials are available starting January 31. Each packet will include the Small Catechism

explanations to the commandments by Martin Luther, an overview of each commandment, and worship note forms for the five weeks. Through our mid-week social media the entire congregation can review the 10 Commandments and something of how we as Lutheran's make sense of them. The service bulletins will be emailed to the congregation each Wednesday so that you may follow along and participate from home.

An MIT app

Our Covid-19 Task Force included with their January meeting minutes a link to an information site designed to explore building occupancy and safety during this pandemic created by folks at MIT. Using the science of engineers and epidemiologists they created an app so that anyone can input specific information for their building and it will calculate the risk of meeting in such a space. It provides data as to how long you can remain in a space and remain at minimum risk. They provide general guidelines, but with their COVID-19 Indoor Safety Guideline you are able to tailor it to your specific circumstances. At St. Paul's the first space that I entered was our church nave and chancel. I identified that in the space we talk loudly, all wear masks, we practice physical distancing, the room's specifications of total floor area of 5255 square feet, the ceiling is 30 feet high, the mechanical ventilation rate, the filtration system, a fast recirculation rate, and average humidity. The guideline does all of the calculation and provides the pertinent data for our worship space. "To limit COVID-19 transmission after an infected person enters this space, there should be not more than:

In contrast, the six-foot distancing guideline would limit occupancy to 145 people which becomes unsafe after 3 days." Changing the field asking for *type and quality of masks* to the lowest of quality, the 45 minutes to an hour that we are together in the church nave continues to read at a very low risk of transmission. Initially we had estimated that we could comfortably physically distance about 130 people in the nave and balcony and another 10 or so in the chancel. This tool is helpful in following the science behind our mitigation efforts as we seek to reduce risk of community spread during this pandemic. Utilizing the MIT tool for other rooms in our renovated spaces, it seems that the redesign and the HVAC system that was installed to meet all current air quality codes permits us to use our spaces as they were designed. Preschool class rooms facilitate our normal enrolment numbers allowing for physical distancing. This tool is helping us as we plan for the next school year and how many children we can safely enroll. This also helps to reduce anxiety for those who have shared concern regarding risk of gathering in person for worship. This information provided by our COVID Task Force was exceedingly helpful for me as I continue to discern a path forward for us as a congregation. An important note, prior to our renovation and updated ventilation system the concluding line would read *the six foot distancing guideline would limit occupancy to 145 people which becomes unsafe after 8 hours with surgical face masks and 68 minutes with cotton face masks*. The updating of the entire facility is permitting us to make a way forward even in these difficult times. Thank you for your continuing support, participation, encouragement and prayer.

For now, we will continue to discern how to best implement our musical offerings in a safe, limited, and joyful way.




CREATE


