
Food Pantry-March

Lent 2 B, 2021 Romans 4:13-25 Mark 8:31-38

Tuesday night Miss Kelly gathered the youth of the congregation through the technological wonder of Zoom. She invited me to join in. There they were, appearing in separate blocks across my computer screen, the happy familiar faces of the children of our faith community. Their presence brought delight as they rigorously engaged in the activity described by Miss Kelly.

This week it was Lenten prayer crosses. Each one taking up his or her cross and emblazing it with images and words of things for which they need help during these days of lent. For some it was being more loving, more forgiving, for others it was remembering to be kind, some hinted at the power of generosity and still others fashioned hearts reminiscent of Valentine's Day with the words of Psalm 51 "Create in me a clean heart, O God."

With Zoom Miss Kelly touched the lives of the children reminding them of the love of God, the persistence of God's grace in Jesus, and the centrality of the cross which brings to bear our salvation through Christ. The computer screen was filled with blocks depicting children deep in concentration as they forged ahead on their projects. Each child was at work independently taking up the cross as it made sense for him or her crafting prayers for help on their Lenten journey.

In the gospel reading Peter didn't quite grasp the reason for taking up the cross. He actually takes Jesus aside and tries in an attempt to get Jesus to stop talking about suffering, death and resurrection. At this point Peter isn't able to grasp how Jesus will forever touch the lives of men, women and children reminding them of the love of God, the persistence of God's grace being made known through Jesus, and the centrality of the cross which will bring to bear salvation for all of humanity. But it is Peter who receives the rebuke that day when he is compared to Satin for wanting to squelch the passion prediction and the journey to Jerusalem where the gospel story unfolds in all of its unsavoriness with suffering and death.

The Apostle Paul is writing to the young church, newly formed and shaped, in Rome. Rome was the technological center in the New Testament world. Rome was diverse, religiously pluralistic, politically aware, and highly cosmopolitan. Paul addressed them in a letter. He is separated from them but wants to be connected to them. He stresses the relationship of creation to its Creator and Lord. He offers the young Christian community guidance through teaching and preaching and through their personal lives. Theology is of primary concern; how these ones who are new to faith make sense of God and God's righteousness bestowed through Christ. Paul uses the familiar figure of Abraham to connect the Jewish and the Gentile believers. He draws on the faith of Abraham and what the present community can learn from him.

Good old Abraham. "He did not weaken in faith." We sometime forget that his faith sustained him through decades of waiting for an heir, a son, Isaac. "No distrust made him waver concerning that God was able to do what God had promised." And then long about a decade after he receives his promised son we encounter the story of Isaac being bound up for a sacrifice. And once again Abraham's obedience in faith is greeted with the Lord God providing a ram to be used as an appropriate sacrifice, freeing Isaac from the

cords that bound him. It was such faith that Abraham modeled that "God reckoned to him as righteousness."

Christ Jesus, the Apostle Paul writes, is the appropriate sacrifice, freeing us who are bound with the cords of sin and death. It is through faith that we are put right, freed from all that holds us captive, through the gracious outpouring of God's love in Christ Jesus. It is Christ who justifies us, who sets us right, who establishes a relationship with us. Such faith was not written for Abraham alone, but for us also. Faith "will be reckoned to us who believe in God who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification." For Paul, faith in Jesus was what God required. Or Paul might say that we learn from Abraham faith requires obedience to God as Lord.

Faith and obedience, justification and righteousness, grace and mercy, Pastor there are too many theological themes going on here! Yes there are. And that was at the heart of Paul's letter to the church at Rome. Theology matters. What we think and say and do and how we make sense of God's outpoured love for us and all humanity is shaping life. It is shaping your life and my life and the neighborhood and the inhabitants of the earth. It shapes relationships with whom we work and how we engage and why we choose to spend time and money and energy. Lutheran World Relief, Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services, Lutheran World Federation, Lutheran Advocacy Ministry of Pennsylvania, St. Paul's Food Pantry and St. Paul's Preschool. For practicing Christians the relationship of creation to its Creator and Lord is serious business.

Theology is a primary concern. The Apostle Paul doesn't want the young church newly forming in Rome with all of its diversity, religious plurality, political consciousness, and decidedly international complexion to assume things about Christian faith and life. Paul wants them to know the importance of taking up the cross. So Paul addressed them in a letter. (The mail then may have been faster than what we are currently experiencing.) But he takes time to write a letter and send it. While he is separated from them he wants to be connected through any available means so that he can touch the lives of their faith community reminding them of the love of God, the persistence of God's grace in Jesus, and the centrality of the cross which brings to bear salvation through Christ. The letter to the church at Rome is filled with paragraphs depicting the importance of deep faith as those young Christians concentrate and forge ahead on their work and witness. Paul's desire seems to be that each one needs to be strengthened so the faith community bears witness to the cross of Christ giving shape for their journey.

Just so, you are important to God. God's desire is for you to engage through faith, for you to be strengthened through your participation in the faith community by hearing again the story; that Peter wanted to rebuke, and Paul wanted to write, and Miss Kelly shared with our children through Zoom, That Jesus must undergo great suffering, be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. Taking up the cross and the message of life and salvation though Christ Jesus takes faith. Paul's word to the young church at Rome and his word for us this morning, remember Father Abraham and his unwavering faith trusting God's promise. Amen.

FIRST READING: Genesis 17:1-7, 15-16

When Abram was ninety-nine years old, the LORD appeared to Abram, and said to him, "I am God Almighty; walk before me, and be blameless. ²And I will make my covenant between me and you, and will make you exceedingly numerous." ³Then Abram fell on his face; and God said to him, 4"As for me, this is my covenant with you: You shall be the ancestor of a multitude of nations. ⁵No longer shall your name be Abram, but your name shall be Abraham; for I have made you the ancestor of a multitude of nations. 6I will make you exceedingly fruitful; and I will make nations of you, and kings shall come from you. 7I will establish my covenant between me and you, and your offspring after you throughout their generations, for an everlasting covenant, to be God to you and to your offspring after you."

¹⁵God said to Abraham, "As for Sarai your wife, you shall not call her Sarai, but Sarah shall be her name. ¹⁶I will bless her, and moreover I will give you a son by her. I will bless her, and she shall give rise to nations; kings of peoples shall come from her."

Psalm 22:23-31

SECOND READING: Romans 4:13-25

The promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. ¹⁴If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. ¹⁵For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.

¹⁶For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, ¹⁷as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations")—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist.

¹⁸Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become "the father of many nations," according to what was said, "So numerous shall your descendants be." 19He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. 20 No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, 21 being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. 22 Therefore his faith "was reckoned to him as righteousness." 23 Now the words, "it was reckoned to him," were written not for his sake alone, ²⁴but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, 25 who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.

GOSPEL: Mark 8:31-38

[Jesus] began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. ³²He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. ³³But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, "Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things."

³⁴He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. ³⁵For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. ³⁶For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? ³⁷Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? ³⁸Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels."
