### **Entering and Leaving the Church:**

#### While in the Nave:

Please wear your mask. Please sit in designated pews only. You may sit together as a family. We ask that you practice social distancing from one family to the next within the pew.

#### **Communion Procedure:**

- Ushers will direct you. The pulpit side (left) of the nave communes first followed by the font side (right).
- Wearing your face mask, come to the chancel step taking your place at one of the five positions marked on the chancel floor with a green cross.
- Your entire household may gather at a position marked by the green cross.
- Extend your arms and cup your hands together to receive the host.
- Please do not reach out to take the Host from the minister.
- Once the minister has moved to the next group, then remove your mask, receive the host, replace your mask and return to your pew by the closest side aisle. There is no need to hurry.
- We are receiving communion in one kind only (bread/host).

This week the news cycle was dominated by President Biden's rescue plan for the American people. The rescue plan made its way from House to Senate and back to the House before heading across Pennsylvania Avenue to the presidential desk for signature. But the rescue plan that was spoken of during what seems like ages ago on the 2020 campaign trail, and the one that was speedily sent from House to Senate seeking support and needing support, created discussions about the scale of what was and is needed to rescue the American people, the economy, and to provide for a sustainable future. This week the news cycle was in sync with the very topic that dominates the readings for this Fourth Sunday in Lent, God's rescue plan for humankind.

The Old Testament reading captures the impatient nature of humanity. We pick up the story as the Israelites make their way from bondage, captivity, oppression under the dominance of foreign rule on their way toward a new future. The impatience is born out in their grumbling and murmuring, their lack of appreciation for the provisions provided for the journey, and their frustration with God and with their appointed leader Moses. This is the point in the story where God sends poisonous serpents among the people, and the serpents bit the people so that many Israelites died. Now that things had gone from bad to worse they needed to be rescued not only from their former way of life as slaves to the Pharaoh in Egypt, but from the serpents that were bringing death. And the Lord God provides what I would like to think of as a rescue package when the Lord has Moses fashion a serpent out of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and be rescued, they would live. This rescue package didn't keep the snakes from biting, but it provided healing so that the story didn't end in the death of the Israelite people. God's plan rescued them from death and provided for a future.

The Gospel reading captures the darkness of the world, the evil that works its way into every nook and cranny. The irony is that the darkness is so pervasive that folks don't even know that they need to be rescued from it. The stumbling around, the lack of clarity, the familiarity of eyes whose rods and cones have adjusted to such darkness can't imagine the sure footing, clarity, shape and color that are possible when they are brought into the light through God's rescue event in Christ Jesus. God gives Jesus as light for the world! "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." People, John says, love darkness better than light, because they don't want their evil deeds, thoughts, words, actions, ulterior motives to be scrutinized. They fear such pain. They would rather keep on stumbling than to be rescued for fear of how things might look. God of course already knows how bad things are; that is why God prepares a rescue plan made know through his only Son, Christ Jesus. That rescue plan is the one we give particular attention to during our Holy Week observance. We are rescued through the suffering death and resurrection of Christ Jesus.

The New Testament reading from the letter to the Ephesians addresses a wide range of things that need attention, chief among them, humanity's rescue from sin and death. The letter to the Ephesians states clearly the need to be rescued from the power of the air, the

spirit at work among the disobedient. This is the writer's code language for the devil. The writer identifies how humanity is seemingly more content following the desires of the flesh than the ways of God. The writer is sure of one thing, that we can't set ourselves free, or rescue ourselves from such desires and from such wrath. We need God's rescue package. "But God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ – by grace you have been saved." This rescue is a gift to us made possible through a loving and gracious God. And now that we have been rescued through the work of Christ Jesus; his immeasurable riches, his grace and kindness, we are restored, put right, brought back to how God made us. Now that I have rescued you, God says, you are to be about the business for which you were created, for good works; that is to be your way of life.

You may be one of those people who doesn't think or believe that you need to be rescued. Or you may have forgotten your rescue when you were adopted, made an heir, washed in baptismal water, and marked with Christ's cross. You may even be one who doesn't think that you are so far gone, so deep in sin, so distant from God that you need to be rescued, especially through the sacrifice of Christ Jesus dying on a cross. But Ephesians reminds us that is precisely the work of the Beloved, Jesus, God's only Son. This is God's rescue package for humankind.

God's rescue package came as the infant child of Bethlehem wrapped up in bands of cloth and placed in an animal trough.

God's rescue package came among as an itinerant preacher calling ordinary people to leave behind their old ways of life and to follow him into a new future.

God's rescue package came bringing healing to those cast aside by society and welcome to those who seemingly didn't fit in.

God's rescue package came to an upper room and shared supper that provides the food necessary for the journey from captivity and death to freedom and eternal life.

God's rescue package was so despised by civic and religious leaders that they tried their best to kill him, to put him to death, so that their own ways could live on. But God's rescue package could not be held in a tomb.

God's rescue package sings forth a new song on Easter morning as God raises Christ Jesus from death to life and pours out his Spirit upon those gathered behind closed doors.

God's breath was breathed into you and poured out upon you when you were rescued through your adoption through Baptism.

Human rescue packages, like those provided by government, they help for a time, but they are not eternal. Would that the government only had to provide a rescue package once for all; a situation like that may even garner full bipartisan support, but that is not the way of our humanness. The way of God, rescuing us from sin and death through Christ Jesus is indeed once for all. That is why the writer of Ephesians calls upon us to lead a life worthy of our calling. That is why the writer advocates putting away anger and living in love. By so doing who knows who else might be rescued through extending such grace. Amen.

### FIRST READING: Numbers 21:4-9

From Mount Hor [the Israelites] set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom; but the people became impatient on the way. <sup>5</sup>The people spoke against God and against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food." <sup>6</sup>Then the Lord sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. <sup>7</sup>The people came to Moses and said, "We

have sinned by speaking against the LORD and against you; pray to the LORD to take away the serpents from us." So Moses prayed for the people. <sup>8</sup>And the LORD said to Moses, "Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live." <sup>9</sup>So Moses made a serpent of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.

## SECOND READING: Ephesians 2:1-10

You were dead through the trespasses and sins <sup>2</sup>in which you once lived, following the course of this world, following the ruler of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work among those who are disobedient. <sup>3</sup>All of us once lived among them in the passions of our flesh, following the desires of flesh and senses, and we were by nature children of wrath, like everyone else. <sup>4</sup>But God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us <sup>5</sup>even when we were dead through

our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved—<sup>6</sup>and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, <sup>7</sup>so that in the ages to come he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. <sup>8</sup>For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God—<sup>9</sup>not the result of works, so that no one may boast. <sup>10</sup>For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.
