



Your mercy is great.





These readings direct our Sunday worship during this joyous season of Easter with a duel focus on the good news that God has raised Jesus from death to life and in our missionary effort to tell and share the good news with others here and around the world. Acts 3:12-20a

"Binge watch" was not in my vocabulary until last year. It was just about this time when everything was shut down and we were sheltering in place that I learned about binge watching through the technology of TV on demand. Teaching a parent about this critical part of pop-culture brought delight to one middle school boy and one university woman. And because we were stuck at home, "binge watch" filled hours during those early days of the pandemic.

But now, now that time has passed, now that governmental restrictions are lifting, now that things are opening up a bit, now that vaccines are available, now that warmer weather is returning; "Binge watch" has been replaced with a more regulated calculated viewing of a favorite TV series. "Binge watch" has been superseded, replaced, with something more along the lines of "episodic viewing" where we watch one episode at a time. It is a rather slow methodical way to crawl through a series rather than the leaping through them when we had time to "Binge watch."

If someone within the household decided to move on in the days of binge watching, I would be so lost and so far behind that abandoning the show became my default setting. But now in these days where we view one episode at a time, well if I miss one, it doesn't take too much time to catch up.

Both the reading from Acts and the gospel from Luke seem to have a member of the household advance the story, watch the next episode, without the rest of us. In Acts we have Peter talking about an event that happened in the previous episode; a man lame from birth, a man who begged at the temple gate, was healed, restored, set free, released from the infirmity that held him captive. And in Luke we have the risen Jesus interrupting the conversation of his gathered followers. They had in the previous episode heard from Cleopas and his friend how the risen Christ appeared to them, walked with them on the Emmaus Road, talked with them about Moses and the prophets, and how he was made known to them in the breaking of bread when their eyes were opened and they saw Jesus with them before he vanished from their sight.

Missing an episode doesn't change the plot, but it does call upon the viewer to work harder, engage earnestly to make sense out of the current action, dialogue, drama.

Peter wants us to know that a man has been released from what had held him, controlled him, and in many ways diminished him from communal life. The man went from crawling to leaping by the power of God. Through Christ Jesus he was given perfect health in the presence of everyone who was gathered that day at the temple as a way to exhibit faith. Faith that would lead those first followers to tell others what they had seen and heard "*so that times of refreshment may come from the Lord*." Peter is still relatively new to all of this speaking publicly about God and what God has done though Christ Jesus. Peter doesn't want any of them to continue to act in ignorance. He wants them to repent, turn around, be released from what has held them captive so that they can embrace a new way of life and living. Turn to God so that your sins are wiped out. Be renewed, refreshed, restored, live at peace.

The Risen Jesus interrupts the conversation taking place among his followers. They were talking about what Cleopas and his friend had reported when they arrived back from Emmaus, out of breath, filled with hope, telling others what they had heard and that they had seen the risen Lord. And now in the midst of a room palpable with their unbelief, with fear and doubt permeating the scene, Jesus interrupts their conversation and ushers them one more time from fear and doubt. He guides them toward confidence, in what had been told them by the Emmaus walkers. And Jesus draws them toward a new found perceptive-faith informed by rereading scripture, and making sense of recent events as life giving.

Take heart friends, even in the presence of the Risen Jesus there is disbelief; those early followers reacted with fear and questioning about the One who was in their midst. And while the eyes of Cleopas and his friend were opened while at the Emmaus Café, now the minds of all those gathered were opened to understand the scriptures. Now they would know that through Christ repentance and forgiveness is to be proclaimed. And now, not just the women at the tomb, or Cleopas and his friend, but all of the followers gathered are to be witnesses of these things.

Gathered this morning behind closed doors with our own fears and doubts the Risen Christ comes among us releasing us from what holds us, releasing us from what controls us, and in many ways what diminishes communal life for us. The powerful Word of God releases us so that we move from crawling to leaping, so that we move from fear and doubt, to trust and belief. We are released, opening a way, a reordering of life, built on transformed perceptions and understandings from being in Christ's presence. In faith we tell others what we have seen and heard "*so that times of refreshment may come*" for all people. We are witnesses of these things.

We are living during days where people need a time of refreshment. The pandemic has permeated all aspects of life. It has certainly impacted people differently. But I think that all people are in need of a time of refreshment. People need release from what holds them and they need new perceptions about life and living. We are witnesses of God's message of forgiveness and hope.

Most of us are more likely to bear witness to a favorite TV show that we have binge watched or methodically enjoyed episode at a time than to share "these things" that have been revealed to us this morning. Perhaps our own fears and doubts make it easier to bear witness to a great movie, a book we would recommend to a friend, an accomplishment we would share with a coworker, a highlight from a sports team whose jerseys comprise our wardrobe. But to witness to "these things" which bring release from what holds us captive, that allows for a reordering of life, that transforms perceptions and understandings through God's word of grace, love, peace, patience may prove to be as challenging for us as is was for those first followers. And yet both Peter at the temple in Jerusalem and the Risen Christ gathered with his followers call upon us to be witnesses of "these things" the events surrounding the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus, which make possible a lame man leaping and startled terrified disciples believing.

Witnesses are not limited to the women at the tomb on that Easter morning. Witnesses are not limited to Cleopas and his friend at Emmaus on that Easter evening. Witnesses are not limited to the disciples to whom Jesus spoke peace on that Easter night. Witnesses are not limited to Peter and the man restored to perfect health in Jerusalem. Witnesses are made through the pouring out of the Holy Spirit. You and I are witnesses of these things so that a time of refreshment may come for all people. Such refreshment comes from the presence of the Lord. Please don't sit back and think that you can binge watch Christian witness, or methodically watch others engage in Easter's calling. Proclaiming "these things" wipe out sin bringing release so that a time of refreshment may come giving everyone a new day. Amen.

Third Sunday of Easter

FIRST READING: Acts 3:12-19

[Peter] addressed the people, "You Israelites, why do you wonder at this, or why do you stare at us, as though by our own power or piety we had made him walk? ¹³The God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, the God of our ancestors has glorified his servant Jesus, whom you handed over and rejected in the presence of Pilate, though he had decided to release him. ¹⁴But you rejected the Holy and Righteous One and asked to have a murderer given to you, ¹⁵and you killed the Author of life, whom God raised from the dead. To this we are witnesses. ¹⁶And by faith in his name, his name itself has made this man strong, whom you see and know; and the faith that is through Jesus has given him this perfect health in the presence of all of you.

¹⁷"And now, friends, I know that you acted in ignorance, as did also your rulers. ¹⁸In this way God fulfilled what he had foretold through all the prophets, that his Messiah would suffer. ¹⁹Repent therefore, and turn to God so that your sins may be wiped out."

Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have." ⁴⁰And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. ⁴¹While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, "Have you anything here to eat?" 42 They gave him a piece of broiled fish, ⁴⁸and he took it and ate in their presence.

⁴⁴Then he said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with youthat everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled." ⁴⁵Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, ⁴⁶and he said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, 47 and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. 48You are witnesses of these things."
