Communion Procedure:

- Ushers will direct you. The pulpit side (left) of the nave communes first followed by the font side (right).

- Extend your arms and cup your hands together to receive the host.



Keep us in union with those who have gone before us and bring us all to that day when we will abide in the fullness of your love. Hear us, O God.







Wednesday Bible Study The Book of Acts

Wednesday Bible Study is held at 10:30 AM in Christ Hall. During the season of Easter the first reading each Sunday is from the book of Acts. We will spent a portion of our time together gaining greater insight into the book of Acts while still spending time reflecting on the Easter gospel readings. The Acts of the Apostles is a continuation of the narrative of the Gospel according to Luke. The book of Acts can be divided into two large portions. The first portion centers on Peter and deals with the early church in Jerusalem in the days following the resurrection of Jesus. The second portion centers on Paul and deals with his three missionary journeys and the expansion of the message of Christ crucified, raised and ascended. These readings direct our Sunday worship during this joyous season of Easter with a duel focus on the good news that God has raised Jesus from death to life and in our missionary effort to tell and share the good news with others here and around the world. 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Easter 5 B, 2021 Acts 8:226-40 John 15:1-8

The uniform identified him as a museum guide. The classic dark blue blazer, red piping, and family crest emblazon on the breast pocket were all telling signs. He waited with patience as the next group formed in the rotunda before leading the journey through the appointed sections of the museum. The museum's vast foot print and priceless treasure could be best viewed with the assistance of a guide. The most notable treasures on display, the things that you would not want to miss viewing, were best experienced with the knowledge of a guide.

Such situations translate easily from national galleries of art and natural history to working museums like that of Colonial Williamsburg. In working museums like Colonial Williamsburg you are able to interact with the guides, ask questions, inquire more deeply about the story behind the object, the story behind the story being told, or the story behind the historical figure in question.

Similarly guides prove to be an important element in national park settings, cave exploration, and wilderness adventures. Guides in those situations will not only point out breath taking aspects of the park, cave, or wilderness but also can be lifesaving for the participant. "Stay away from that cliff." "Make certain your equipment is in proper working condition." "Watch out for Grizzly Bears this time of year!"

Philip isn't wearing a classic dark blue blazer with red piping sporting the Disciples of Jesus family crest on the breast pocket when he encounters the man from Ethiopia. No one warned him about wilderness roads, translating the scriptures, or freighting situations he might encounter. Philip has had some positive experiences in guiding some Samaritans to understanding the word of God and even guiding them to the waters of baptism earlier in the first part of chapter 8. But guiding a powerful court official, one in charge of Queen Candace's treasury, in understanding the prophet Isaiah was not part of the brief from the angelic messenger.

A guide is needed this morning. A critical moment arises when the Ethiopian is reading from the text of the Prophet Isaiah, what we know as chapter 53. Philip inquires if he understands what he is reading. The response from the man seated in a chariot reading from the scroll of the prophet, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" The text doesn't indicate how the Ethiopian recognized Philip as a guide. He certainly wasn't sporting the blazer with piping and crest. We know him as an Apostle, an eye witness of the resurrection. For some reason the man on the wilderness road recognizes Philp as a guide, as one who could tell him about the story behind the story, about the treasure that is being made known through a story about a lamb being slaughtered. This is the place where a guide is needed, and that is precisely what the Ethiopian asks of Philip. It is the story within the story that advances the story of God's extravagant love for all people.

Philip moves from his role as Apostle, one who witnessed the resurrected Lord, to a role of evangelist, one who is opening, telling, and sharing the good news of Jesus! Riding along together on a wilderness road they come across some water. And the Ethiopian man, a person of different race, a person of higher social status, a person of different culture, exclaims to Philip when he sees some water along the road "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" The chariot comes to an abrupt halt and both of them went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. And that

is the end of the guided portion of the journey for the Ethiopian. The Spirit of the Lord snatches Philip away and he lands in a new region as guide for a new community. And the newly baptized man, he went away from the guided portion of his journey rejoicing.

We are part of God's story of life and salvation. We are welcomed into the family of God through baptism into Christ's suffering, death and resurrection. We aren't sporting dark blue blazers with red piping and the Disciples of Jesus family crest on the breast pocket to make it easy to identify us as guides. But we are called to be guides in faith and life for all who don't know what story the scriptures proclaim. We are entrusted with the story within the story that advances the story of God's extravagant love for all people.

There are scriptures to teach, prayers to pass on, and commandments for us to live by. There are liturgies to attend and sacraments to sustain us. There is love to undergird us, not only the kind of love represented by our faith community here today, but the steadfast love of God, the selfless love modeled to us by Christ, the love that is given in that new commandment "That we have love for one another."

Guide is what Philip proved to be to the Ethiopian man in the story from Acts. Guide is what we are as we share the story of God's love. We guide people to see and hear and make sense of the Priceless Treasure, Christ Jesus. We guide people away from the dangers of life; the proverbial treacherous cliffs, faulty equipment, ravenous beasts that comprise life's journey. We guide people toward the Priceless Treasure, Christ Jesus, using the tools of scripture, sacraments, catechism, creed, and confessional writings. We guide those new to the faith. And we guide those who are well seasoned.

It is easy to lose our way, to get off of the right path, to head in a direction that takes us away from the one that we do not want to miss seeing, hearing, experiencing, or being in his presence. Would that we all had the easily identifiable classic dark blue blazer with red piping and the Disciples of Jesus family crest emblazon on the breast pocket. Instead we wear the identifying sign of the cross emblazoned on us in baptism, and traced over and over again through faith's journey. That cross tells the story within the story of God's extravagant love for you and for all people. You may not be invited to sit in a chariot, ride along a wilderness road, be in the presence of a court official or someone from an exotic place. But as a baptized child of God know that at any time you may be called to; venture into the unknown, sit with a stranger, converse in a language other than your own, discuss biblical texts and questions about who can be baptized. As guide, your calling may very well be lifesaving.

Philip simply asked a question. "Do you understand what you are reading?" The man in the chariot replied "How can I, unless someone guides me?" Philip's role as Apostle, one witnessing the resurrected Lord, shifts to the role of evangelist, one opening, telling, and sharing the good news of Jesus! The Priceless Treasure is best beheld with the assistance of a guide.

If this were a celebrity TV talk show and I was host, This would be the moment when I would ask you to look under your seat where you would each find, a dark blue blazer with red piping and the Disciples of Jesus family crest emblazon on the breast pocket. Put it on and where it with confidence. Guide people to the life-giving treasure we know in Christ. Amen

FIRST READING: Acts 8:26-40

An angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) ²⁷So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship ²⁸and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. ²⁹Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." ³⁰So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" ³¹He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. ³²Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this:

"Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth.

³³In his humiliation justice was denied him.

Who can describe his generation?

For his life is taken away from the earth." ³⁴The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" 35 Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. ³⁶As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" ³⁸He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. 39 When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. 40But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

SECOND READING: 1 John 4:7-21

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. ⁸Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. ⁹God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. ¹⁰In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. ¹¹Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. ¹²No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.

¹³By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. ¹⁴And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. ¹⁵God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. ¹⁶So we have known and believe the love that God has for us.

God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. ¹⁷Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. ¹⁸There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. ¹⁹We love because he first loved us. ²⁰Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. ²¹The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.

GOSPEL: John 15:1-8

[Jesus said:] "I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinegrower. ²He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. ³You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you. ⁴Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. ⁵I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. 6Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned. 7If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. ⁸My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples."
