

Guidelines for Worship during the time of COVID-19

Entering and Leaving the Church:

Face masks are required inside,

Please take your service bulletin with you and dispose of it properly.

Offerings:

Monetary offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances to the nave prior to the service or immediately following the service. You may also donate via our website at www.stpaulsyork.org

While in the Nave:

Please wear your mask. Please sit in designated pews only. You may sit together as a family. We ask that you practice social distancing from one family to the next within the pew. Occasionally an usher may seat a guest in the red zone.

Communion Procedure:

- Ushers will direct you. The pulpit side (left) of the nave communes first followed by the font side (right).
- Wearing your face mask, come to the chancel step taking your place at one of the five positions marked on the chancel floor with a green cross.
- Your entire household may gather at a position marked by the green cross.
- Extend your arms and cup your hands together to receive the host.
- Once the minister has moved to the next group, then remove your mask, receive the host, replace your mask and return to your pew by the closest side aisle. There is no need to hurry.
- We are receiving communion in one kind only (bread/host).

Our COVID-19 task force is assisting us as we remain open at St. Paul's. Please thank Dr. Jessica Ericson, Sheridan Palmer, Deacon Harold Sargeant, and Dr. Martha Thomas for their dedication and service.





in your holy Church both now and forever. Amen.





St. Paul's Food Pantry - Volunteer Opportunity on Sunday Morning

Thankfully, the St. Paul's Food Pantry has been able to remain open, with modifications, throughout the pandemic. In March 2020, pantry volunteers moved quickly to prepackaging food for clients and meeting them outside with groceries. Our highest numbers were up to 80 families per week. Now we are closer to 40 which is in the high range of pre-pandemic times. Every family receives 3-4 four frozen meats, 1-2 dozen eggs, milk, cheese, and often a fresh fruit along with cereal, pastas, soups, canned fruits, beans, and vegetables.

While some volunteers were unable to continue serving, some stepped forward and began serving weekly instead of monthly. At least 8 new volunteers have participated as well. For those wishing to help, but unable to participate due to jobs or school during the week, there is a new volunteer opportunity. Twice a month volunteers work between Sunday services at 9:00 AM to stock the shelves. Contact Patty Snyder if you are willing to help in this ministry.

Pantry volunteers look forward to the time when we can once again safely bring clients into the building to select their own groceries.

Items needed: Pancake mix, 4 pks of toilet paper, canned or boxed potatoes, stuffing mix, jelly, boxed rice. We also need paper grocery bags with handles.

Next Sunday Council and Committee Chairpersons Meet on Retreat

Next Sunday Outdoor Service at 8:00 AM

During the 2020 summer cottage meetings the outdoor worship opportunities provided during the time of COVID-19 were highlighted as something good that came out of the pandemic. Participants in several of the cottage meeting groups hoped that we would continue to hold outdoor worship even after the virus released its hold.

On the first Sunday of June we will resume the 8:00 AM liturgy on the South Lawn. The liturgy is planned from inception to be held out of doors so there will not be a lot of singing or liturgical music. We are planning to have children's sermons utilizing Hula-hoops as a way to provide social distancing for the children. The Hula-hoops will be strategically placed so that the children can sit or stand inside the colorful circle for the children's sermon time. We are eliciting the musical talent of congregation members to provide music during the distribution of Holy Communion. This might be instrumental, vocal, or a combination. If you are willing to share your talent please communicate with Victor Fields as soon as possible to schedule a Sunday. And as we have done in the past, please bring your own lawn chair, maintain a safe distance, wear your mask, and remain vigilant until such time that vaccine is available for our children and youth. These outdoor Sunday services make great opportunities to invite a friend to join you in worship at St. Paul's.

Wednesday morning marked the last day of school for our St. Paul's Preschool. It was the last day for chapel with the children. We didn't have as much time together this year for chapel because of COVID-19 we didn't resume weekly services until Ash Wednesday. But we did cover some important aspects of our lives of faith.

Though Psalm 1 we stressed the importance of listening to God and doing what God asks. Being like a tree planted by a river, a tree full of fruit, with leaves that are always green (Marie Helena Delval). We listened to parables of Jesus; workers in the vineyard, the Good Samaritan, the farmer who sows seeds, the lost sheep and the joyful party. We counted "one, two, three, church" but acknowledged we cannot count the mercies of God (Gail Ramshaw). And before we prayed together the Lord's Prayer and received the blessing of God "Father, Son and Holy Spirit" we sang a paraphrase of Psalm 46. Psalm 46 inspired Martin Luther in the 16th century to pen the prose "A Mighty Fortress is Our God." But on Wednesday we recited a version of Psalm 46 from Marie Helena Delval's book *Psalms for Young Children.* "If the ground starts to shake, if the mountains break in pieces and fall into the sea, if the waves grow as big as giants, I'm not scared, God is with me." Then the children took their leave. Many of them I will most likely not see again. I pray that something they experienced in our short time together will move them to explore aspects of the Christian faith as they advance in years and mature in adulthood.

Then on Wednesday evening we learned of the death of Eric Carl, author of books we read to our own children; *The Very Hungry Caterpillar, Brown Bear, Brown Bear, What do you see.* Eric Carl equipped young readers with material that would move them more deeply into the joys of reading. And by moving them to read, he moved their minds, unleashed their creativity and imagination, gave shape to their understanding of language and strengthened their ability to communicate with those around them as they advanced in years and matured in adulthood.

In our lives of faith it is the scriptures, hymns, liturgy and sacraments that equip us to live fuller, richer, joy filled lives as Christian people. Through engagement with the scriptures, hymns, liturgy and sacraments we are strengthened providing us with language to communicate with those around us as we advance in years and mature in adulthood.

Isaiah equipped readers with material that opened them to the salvation and forgiveness that God provides for all people. Isaiah uses prose to capture the minds of all who would listen and to provide them a way to give shape to today and hope for tomorrow.

Back then the divides were great. Struggles for control were real. People living in close physical proximity were far apart in their thoughts and ideas and expressions of belief and unbelief. Alliances were strategically calculated in order to gain the upper hand, or in order to maintain the current situation, or to simply survive.

The Prophet Isaiah lived during such a time as this. The Prophet wrote oracles addressing God's people; where their loyalties must lay, inevitable consequences from straying from the law of the Lord, and a reoccurring theme of salvation. Isaiah lived a good long

time. His words of prophecy spanned 40 years. He had a way with words. Such a way that New Testament writers utilize his images, insights, and solace as they strive to communicate the gospel message of hope and salvation made known through Christ Jesus.

Such situations are not new to us. Divides remain great. Struggles for control are real. People live in close physical proximity and are far apart in their thoughts and ideas and expressions about what they do believe and what they don't. Alliances are strategically calculated in order to gain the upper hand, or retain it. They are deliberately designed in order to sustain the status quo. And some continue to build alliances in order to survive.

The recent events in what we call "The Holy Land" bear this out as do recent events in our nation's capital; Israelis and Palestinians, Democrats and Republicans. We have reached such divides that the chasm seems to have more in common with the one fixed between the Rich man and the old beggar Lazarus than the one spanned by the cross of Christ bringing all people together though his sacrificial love. The love Jesus communicated to Nicodemus that night when he came seeking knowledge of the kingdom of God. "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him."

Today we are reminded that we are God's holy people. We may not have received a vision like Isaiah of old; a vision of the Lord enthroned, high and lofty, with Seraphs flying about, and announcing to one another the holiness of the Lord and the earth being full of such glory. And no, our lips have not been cauterized with a hot coal taken from the temple altar eradicating guilt and sin. But our lips are touched by Christ himself in the bread of Holy Communion, provided from the altar of the Lord, eradicating our guilt and sin; *The body of Christ given for you for the forgiveness of sin*.

God's voice is every bit as strong "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?"

Our lips announce the departing of guilt and the blotting out of sin. We remind God's people of Psalm one's listening and doing and continuous fruit bearing. We comfort God's people with Psalm 46 reminding them that when the waters rage and foam the Lord of Hosts is with them. We tell the stories of God's ways through the parables of Jesus. We pass on the prayer the Savior taught his disciples through our faithful recitation of it. We share the message of the cross, Christ Jesus being lifted up drawing all people to him for healing, narrowing the great divide.

"Here I am; send me" was the response given by Isaiah. Such responses come through the power of God. God's power; marvelous, mysterious, merciful, mighty, all made known to us in Christ Jesus through the Holy Spirit. Isaiah equipped readers with material that opened them to the salvation and forgiveness that God provides for all people. God opens hearts and minds, unleashes creativity and imagination, shaping understanding and giving language to communicate with those around us as we advance in years and mature in adulthood. God uses us to tell the stories of faith, shaping today and giving hope for tomorrow. Here I am send me. Amen.

FIRST READING: Isaiah 6:1-8

In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple. ²Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. ³And one called to another and said:

"Holy, holy, holy is the LORD of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory."

⁴The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke. ⁵And I said: "Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!"

SECOND READING: Romans 8:12-17

Brothers and sisters, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live according to the flesh—¹³ for if you live according to the flesh, you will die; but if by the Spirit you put to death the deeds of the body, you will live. ¹⁴ For all who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. ¹⁵ For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, "Abba! Father!" ¹⁶ it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God, ¹⁷ and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ—if, in fact, we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him.

GOSPEL: John 3:1-17

Now there was a Pharisee named Nicodemus, a leader of the Jews. 2He came to Jesus by night and said to him, "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God; for no one can do these signs that you do apart from the presence of God." 3Jesus answered him, "Very truly, I tell you, no one can see the kingdom of God without being born from above." 4 Nicodemus said to him, "How can anyone be born after having grown old? Can one enter a second time into the mother's womb and be born?" 5Jesus answered, "Very truly, I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit. 6What is born of the flesh is flesh, and what is born of the Spirit is spirit. 7Do not be astonished that I said to you, 'You must be born from above.' 8The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit." 9Nicodemus said to him, "How can these things be?" 10 Jesus answered him, "Are you a teacher of Israel, and yet you do not understand these things?

11"Very truly, I tell you, we speak of what we know and testify to what we have seen; yet you do not receive our testimony. ¹²If I have told you about earthly things and you do not believe, how can you believe if I tell you about heavenly things? ¹³No one has ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the Son of Man. ¹⁴And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, ¹⁵that whoever believes in him may have eternal life.
