

Monetary offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances to the nave prior to the service or immediately following the service. You may also donate via our website at www.stpaulsyork.org

While in the Nave:

Please wear your mask. Please sit in designated pews only. You may sit together as a family. We ask that you practice social distancing from one family to the next within the pew.

Communion Procedure:

- Ushers will direct you. The pulpit side (left) of the nave communes first followed by the font side (right).
- Wearing your face mask, come to the chancel step taking your place at one of the five positions marked on the chancel floor with a green cross.
- Your entire household may gather at a position marked by the green cross.
- Extend your arms and cup your hands together to receive the host.
- Once the minister has moved to the next group, then remove your mask, receive the host, replace your mask and return to your pew by the closest side aisle. There is no need to hurry.
- We are receiving communion in one kind only (bread/host).

Through the sea you led your people Israel from slavery into freedom.







Wednesday Bible Study The Book of Acts

Wednesday Bible Study is held at 10:30 AM in Christ Hall. During the season of Easter the first reading each Sunday is from the book of Acts. We will spent a portion of our time together gaining greater insight into the book of Acts while still spending time reflecting on the Easter gospel readings. The Acts of the Apostles is a continuation of the narrative of the Gospel according to Luke. The book of Acts can be divided into two large portions. The first portion centers on Peter and deals with the early church in Jerusalem in the days following the resurrection of Jesus. The second portion centers on Paul and deals with his three missionary journeys and the expansion of the message of Christ crucified, raised and ascended. These readings direct our Sunday worship during this joyous season of Easter with a duel focus on the good news that God has raised Jesus from death to life and in our missionary effort to tell and share the good news with others here and around the world. Please bring your Bible and join us!

Easter VI B St. Paul, York, 2021 May 9, 2021

Acts 10:44-48; I John 5:1-6; John 15:9-17

Our first reading from the Acts of the Apostles is the conclusion of the story of the conversion and baptism of Cornelius and his family and friends. Cornelius was a devout, Godfearing man, who had not yet come to know Jesus as the Incarnate Word of the Father. Cornelius was also a centurion – a Roman soldier, a Gentile, one considered an outsider to the people of Israel. To a Jew, he was the oppressor. How is it that he comes to be a part of the community of the Church?

An angel of the Lord had appeared to him and told him to send for Peter. At the same time Peter also had had a vision telling him to go to the home of Cornelius. We need to remember that Jews did not go to the homes of non-Jews. It was considered unclean to do so. Peter was a devout Jew. But in a vision from the Holy Spirit Peter was told that the good news of Jesus was not only for the Jews, but for all people! If Jesus is Lord of creation, he is Lord of all of creation! Peter comes to understand that God shows no partiality. This was not an easy word for Peter and for the early Jewish Christians to hear.

Peter, obedient to the Spirit's guiding, goes to the home of Cornelius and proclaims to him and his household the good news of forgiveness and new life through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth. Filled with the Holy Spirit, given through the preaching of Peter, Cornelius asks to be baptized.

The book of Acts is full of stories of conversion: The disciples proclaim the Resurrection, and the Spirit falls upon the crowd gathered in Jerusalem and turns scoffers into repentant believers. An Ethiopian eunuch is converted by the preaching of Philip and asks to be baptized. A raging enemy of the Gospel and of the early church, Saul of Tarsus, is converted into a courageous brother in Christ, Paul, bold missionary to the Gentiles.

Today we hear of a Gentile, a Roman, a soldier, and his family being adopted into the family of Christ, the Church, through the waters of baptism. Wherever the Gospel is preached, the Spirit brings change of heart, mind, and life. Both those who hear and those who speak this Gospel are changed. Peter was changed from an apostle to his Jewish brothers and sisters into an apostle to all humanity, to anyone who would hear and believe, both Jew and Gentile. The Ethiopian eunuch and the Roman soldier Cornelius were inquiring persons who, filled with the Spirit, came to faith. Saul was a fierce enemy and persecutor of the Christian church. His conversion demonstrates the power of the Gospel to change even its enemies.

These stories of the conversion of the Ethiopian, of Saul, and of Cornelius, do not flow like a gentle stream from the day of Pentecost. They come on the heels of great persecution of believers. They come following the storing of Stephen, a deacon of the church, who helped serve widows and orphans, as he proclaimed the resurrection of Christ.

Those first followers of Jesus had been devastated by the reaction of the world to their preaching. They could not help but ask if the world with all its power and might, its agen-

das and self-interest, would be victorious in silencing them. Was this persecution the beginning of the end of the Gospel's life in the world?

NO! It was not. And it is not. That is the resounding response of the book of Acts. The stories of the conversion of the Eunuch, of Saul, of Cornelius, point the followers of Jesus beyond the persecutions, beyond despair, to God's new beginning, to God's faithfulness, to God's Spirit at work in the world. These stories are told and retold by the church as witnesses to the power of the Spirit to call forth the Christian community in each new generation despite any roadblocks thrown in the way. It

We live in a time of great divisions and isolation from one another. COVID makes us suspicious of being too close to one another and has forced many to become isolated from even their closest family members and from the community of the church. The results of this pandemic have made the divide even greater between economic classes, those who are struggling financially and those who are not. It seems like our whole word is polarized. Politically the radical left and the radical right leave little room for moderates of both parties. Racially divisions seem to be growing rather than disappearing among people of Asian, or European, or African, or Native American or Latino descent. Who is on the inside and who is on the outside our circle of friends, family, acquaintances? We desire to take control of our lives as well as the lives of those around us.

Into our midst comes the Holy Spirit, taking control of our lives, our desires, our wishes and transforming them through the power of our Risen Lord. The story of the Gospel's spread is the story of ever increasing, ever widening circles reaching out to include all peoples. The story of the Gospel's proclamation is the story of the Holy Spirit gathering through the preaching of that Gospel and by the gift of Baptism more and more persons into the community that is the Body of Christ, the Church. We are never Christians in isolation. We are never alone in our calling. We are called into the Body of Christ, into the community that is the Church. The story of the Gospel's work in the world is the story of the Holy Spirit calling that community into a life of speaking and acting and sharing the Good News that Christ is Risen and lives, bringing hope, forgiveness, new life to all.

In the Gospel for today Jesus says: "As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love." We who have been called by the Spirit through the waters of baptism abide in Christ's love as we are fed by his Word and by his Holy Supper, as we live in community with one another, sharing each other's joys and sorrows, sharing responsibility for one another's well-being, as we pray together for one another and for the world. His love will break down all barriers and walls, all divisions and separations. His love will restore community and bind us together. His love will change us. His love will make us bold in proclaiming the Good News to even those we find cantankerous, or unlovable, or difficult. His love will open new possibilities for community. His love will bring unity and peace to a world divided and at war with one another. His love will fill us with joy unbounded! Thanks be to God!

FIRST READING: Acts 10:44-48

While Peter was still speaking, the Holy Spirit fell upon all who heard the word. ⁴⁵The circumcised believers who had come with Peter were astounded that the gift of the Holy Spirit had been poured out even on the Gentiles, ⁴⁶ for they heard them speaking in tongues and extolling God. Then Peter said, 47"Can anyone withhold the water for baptizing these people who have received the Holy Spirit just as we have?" ⁴⁸So he ordered them to be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ. Then they invited him to stay for several days.

Psalm 98

SECOND READING: 1 John 5:1-6

Everyone who believes that Jesus is the Christ has been born of God, and everyone who loves the parent loves the child. ²By this we know that we love the children of God, when we love God and obey his commandments. ³For the love of God is this, that we obey his commandments. And his commandments are not burdensome, ⁴for whatever is born of God conquers the world. And this is the victory that conquers the world, our faith. 5Who is it that conquers the world but the one who believes that Jesus is the Son of God?

⁶This is the one who came by water and blood, Jesus Christ, not with the water only but with the water and the blood. And the Spirit is the one that testifies, for the Spirit is the truth.

GOSPEL: John 15:9-17

[Jesus said:] "As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. ¹⁰If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. ¹¹I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete.

¹²"This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. ¹³No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. ¹⁴You are my friends if you do what I command you. ¹⁵I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father. ¹⁶You did not choose me but I chose you. And I appointed you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last, so that the Father will give you whatever you ask him in my name. 17I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another."
