Entering and Leaving the Church:

Face masks are required inside,

Please take your service bulletin with you and dispose of it properly.

Offerings:

Monetary offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances to the nave prior to the service or immediately following the service. You may also donate via our website at www.stpaulsyork.org

While in the Nave:

Please wear your mask. Please sit in designated pews only. You may sit together as a family. We ask that you practice social distancing from one family to the next within the pew. Occasionally an usher may seat a guest in the red zone.

Communion Procedure:

- Ushers will direct you. The pulpit side (left) of the nave communes first followed by the font side (right).
- Wearing your face mask, come to the chancel step taking your place at one of the five positions marked on the chancel floor with a green cross.
- Your entire household may gather at a position marked by the green cross.
- Extend your arms and cup your hands together to receive the host.
- Once the minister has moved to the next group, then remove your mask, receive the host, replace your mask and return to your pew by the closest side aisle. There is no need to hurry.
- We are receiving communion in one kind only (bread/host).





St. Paul's Food Pantry - Volunteer Opportunity on Sunday Morning

Thankfully, the St. Paul's Food Pantry has been able to remain open, with modifications, throughout the pandemic. In March 2020, pantry volunteers moved quickly to prepackaging food for clients and meeting them outside with groceries. Our highest numbers were up to 80 families per week. Now we are closer to 40 which is in the high range of pre-pandemic times. Every family receives 3-4 four frozen meats, 1-2 dozen eggs, milk, cheese, and often a fresh fruit along with cereal, pastas, soups, canned fruits, beans, and vegetables.

While some volunteers were unable to continue serving, some stepped forward and began serving weekly instead of monthly. At least 8 new volunteers have participated as well. For those wishing to help, but unable to participate due to jobs or school during the week, there is a new volunteer opportunity. Twice a month volunteers work between Sunday services at 9:00 AM to stock the shelves. Contact Patty Snyder if you are willing to help in this ministry.

Pantry volunteers look forward to the time when we can once again safely bring clients into the building to select their own groceries.

Items needed: Pancake mix, 4 pks of toilet paper, canned or boxed potatoes, stuffing mix, jelly, boxed rice. We also need paper grocery bags with handles.

"Whoever has ears to hear, let them hear."

The list of weekend chores is not glamorous. Weekend work is mostly grounded in the daily aspects of life. There are always things more alluring, things that capture your imagination, things more interesting, and certainly things more fun to do during a day or two when not otherwise engaged with the labor of occupation, than weekend chores.

It was Saturday. Any chance of frost was long gone. Last year's vegetable patch needed a good weeding. The surface of the garden already covered in green; sprigs of chartreuse popping up, and spidery octopus like blue green vines greedily stretching as far as possible laying claim to territory atop what had once been fertile soil. The three pronged digger loosened compacted earth. The "vegetable imposters" released their grip; the garden bed turning over in preparation of birthing an eatable assortment of greens.

Lurking amidst and under the unwanted variety of green were tiny marigolds; identifiable by their unique aroma, red tinted stem, feathery growth, and the beginnings of miniscule golden flower heads. Standing slender and tall, stretching for light amid the darkness created by the greed of weeds, there was an entire community of beauty. A new community that sprung up from last year's dried scattered seed heads. We call them volunteers. They are I suppose better thought of as gift; no labor, no use of time waiting to see if seeds would sprout and grow, no trip to a hothouse, no outlay of currency, just tender young shoots needing a bit of care and protection nurturing them on their way.

Quickly to the garage fetching shallow egg carton like trays, filling them with potting soil, the marigold community was rescued, relocated to fertile ground where adequate root development could occur, and in time, the plants returned to garden beds bringing beauty, color, delight. The tiny red tinted feathery green plants with miniscule flower buds will grow into bushy plants producing hundreds of golden flower heads cascading like fountains till the last autumn frost.

A preschool child from next door comes to help.

"What are you doing?" he inquisitively asks.

"Potting up marigolds."

"How do you do that?"

"Gently tease them out from the weeds and carefully place them in the seed tray. Prepare a place for them. Poke your finger in the center to make a little hole in the potting soil, and then lower the marigold gently down into it. Now pull some soil up to its stem."

"Oh," said the boy, "I thought it was going to be something complicated."

"You are right, not complicated; just give them a little care and respect."

"What are you going to do with them?"

"Let them get strong. In a week or so they should develop stronger roots and sturdier stems. Then they can be planted directly into the ground."

"Can I plant some?"

"Certainly you may."

"What are they going to look like? Can you eat them? Will they grow at my house?" the enthusiastic youthful gardener probed.

Taking some three inch pots and searching for the strongest, healthiest marigold shoots, together they potted up a dozen or so plants, watered them, and placed them in the sun to bask in the light alongside the trays of what appeared to be baby feathery ones.

A family of three leashed to their Labradoodle pass by the driveway where the relocation of marigolds was underway. The preschool boy abandoned the potting process running up the drive to pet their fluffy cinnamon brown puppy. While petting the dog the boy shared his new found gardening knowledge with the family. Their first grade daughter wasn't quite as taken by the whole marigold enterprise as was the young gardener.

"Come and see" said the boy, extending an invitation to the girl to come take a closer look at what was going on with the flower potting process. Hesitating ever so slightly, the boy's eagerness lured her down the driveway to the potting operation. The two of them stooping down to get a better look at the plants, materials and process, the boy picked up the largest pot of flowers; four of the sturdiest plants, the four topped with golden flowing crowns, and proudly presented them to her.

"These are for your garden. Water them and give them light. In a week or so you can put them in the ground."

Telling God's story of hope and salvation is not glamorous work. It is rooted in the daily aspects of Christian life. Out of darkness Jesus calls us into his marvelous light. A beloved, beautiful, fruit bearing, community formed from and deeply rooted in the suffering, death and resurrection of Christ Jesus. Rescued from sin and death we are given a place in the kingdom of God through the cascading water of baptism. We are given a crown of unfading glory. Glory more brilliant than any batch of marigolds. An eternal crown given through Christ's victory over all that is greedy, dark and deadly. In our daily work we enthusiastically invite others to come and see and to show them the work that is kingdom life. Tell them, like the preschooler to the first grader, "This is for you."

well known to God, and I hope that we are also well known to your consciences. ¹²We are not commending ourselves to you again, but giving you an opportunity to boast about us, so that you may be able to answer those who boast in outward appearance and not in the heart. ¹³For if we are beside ourselves, it is for God; if we are in our right mind, it is for you.] ¹⁴For the love of Christ urges us on, because we are convinced that one has died for all; therefore all have died. ¹⁵And he died for all, so that those who live might live no longer for themselves, but for him who died and was raised for them.

¹⁶From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. ¹⁷So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!
