Guidelines for Worship during the time of COVID-19

Entering and Leaving the Church:

Face masks are required inside,

Please take your service bulletin with you and dispose of it properly.

Offerings:

Monetary offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances to the nave prior to the service or immediately following the service. You may also donate via our website at www.stpaulsyork.org

While in the Nave:

Please wear your mask. Please sit in designated pews only. You may sit together as a family. We ask that you practice social distancing from one family to the next within the pew. Occasionally an usher may seat a guest in the red zone.

Communion Procedure:

- Ushers will direct you. The pulpit side (left) of the nave communes first followed by the font side (right).
- Wearing your face mask, come to the chancel step taking your place at one of the five positions marked on the chancel floor with a green cross.
- Your entire household may gather at a position marked by the green cross.
- Extend your arms and cup your hands together to receive the host.
- Once the minister has moved to the next group, then remove your mask, receive the host, replace your mask and return to your pew by the closest side aisle. There is no need to hurry.
- We are receiving communion in one kind only (bread/host).





Through him all glory and honor are yours, Almighty Father, with the Holy Spirit, in your holy Church both now and forever. Amen.







St. Paul's Food Pantry – Volunteer Opportunity on Sunday Morning and Tuesday Distribution

Thankfully, the St. Paul's Food Pantry has been able to remain open, with modifications, throughout the pandemic. In March 2020, pantry volunteers moved quickly to prepackaging food for clients and meeting them outside with groceries. Our highest numbers were up to 80 families per week. Now we are closer to 40 which is in the high range of pre-pandemic times. Every family receives 3-4 four frozen meats, 1-2 dozen eggs, milk, cheese, and often a fresh fruit along with cereal, pastas, soups, canned fruits, beans, and vegetables.

While some volunteers were unable to continue serving, some stepped forward and began serving weekly instead of monthly. At least 8 new volunteers have participated as well. For those wishing to help, but unable to participate due to jobs or school during the week, there is a new volunteer opportunity. Twice a month volunteers work between Sunday services at 9:00 AM to stock the shelves. Contact Patty Snyder if you are willing to help in this ministry.

We can once again safely bring clients into the building to select their own groceries. With this return comes the need for additional helpers on Tuesday mornings. Please help if you can.

Items needed: Pancake mix, 4 pks of toilet paper, canned or boxed potatoes, stuffing mix, jelly, boxed rice. We also need paper grocery bags with handles.

I fear we have lost our momentum. I fear we have lost sight of being an Easter people. I fear that decisions made during the past months of the pandemic have offended, annoyed, aggravated, and have driven away sisters and brothers once embraced by the mission of the congregation "To teach the world that God is love." I fear that complacency has reached in and wrapped folks up turning them inward rather than out toward neighbor and world. These are a few of my congregation fears. But there are other fears that are beyond the community of faith.

On the global front South Korea fears North Korea's growing arsenal of missals. Japan fears China's advancing border as they push out into the sea. The UK, post Brexit, fears ramifications of trade from the European Union. Developing nations fear they won't receive enough vaccine in a timely fashion to keep up with advancing variants. On the home front, perhaps masked by recent celebrations of Independence Day, we fear Cyber-attacks, nuclear proliferation, climate change, national debt, and a host of other things from vulnerable power grids to increased gun violence in our streets.

Such fears are not new to people, especially to people of faith. We have a history that is riddled with fearful situations, fearful times, fearful leaders, and a God who persistently acts seeking to calm fears and put us on a different footing.

In the Old Testament reading Amaziah, the priest of Bethel, feared Amos the prophet. God's people have not been living according to the law of the Lord. King Jeroboam has led the people astray. Amaziah knows that the king will not like what Amos the prophet has to say. They are not measuring up. The prophet Amos' word will not be welcomed by King Jeroboam it will offended him, annoy him, aggravate him, and seek to have Amos driven away.

In the gospel reading from Mark, it is the religious community who feared the disciples. Can you imagine fearing the disciples? These are a dozen folks who have been called to follow Jesus going about doing the things that he commands them to do. But the religious community feared them. They feared them because the disciples went out 2 by 2 and were successful. Success, meaning that they did what they were sent to do; casting out demons, healing the sick, and preaching the Word in the greater community. They were doing the same things that Jesus was doing. Now there were more of them. Fear was heightened.

King Herod feared John the Baptist. John the baptizer opens the account of the gospel announcing repentance for the forgiveness of sins. He is seen as a prophet on the edge. This one who wore camel's hair and ate wild locusts is now incarcerated in one of King Herod's prison cells. Herod feared him. Herod feared him because of the immorality he entered into utilizing the improper use of his civic power. John sits in a prison cell while Herod and his guests celebrate at a birthday party that is careening out of control. It is out of control because once again the King's immoral desires and actions lead to an outlandish promise.

John's fate now rests in the hands of a ruler who can be manipulated by others. "When his daughter Herodias came in and danced, she pleased Herod and his guests; and the king said to the girl, "Ask me for whatever you wish, and I will give it." And he solemnly swore to her, "Whatever you ask me, I will give you, even half of my kingdom." The girl went out and

said to her mother, "What should I ask for?" her mother replied, "The head of John the baptizer." Immediately she rushed back to the king and requested, "I want you to give me at once the head of John the Baptist on a platter." Herod feared John.

Later on we encounter Pilate. Pilate feared Jesus. Jesus, whose message was peaceful, ends up in the presence of a ruler who can be manipulated by others. Like Herod, Pilate, reluctantly agrees to an execution he would not have chosen himself. The people screamed "crucify him" Pilate caved, and Jesus is put to death on a cross on a hill outside of Jerusalem.

Fear is in the air. Sometimes it is palpable. I fear lots of things; the results of medical tests, I fear skin cancer in the summer and I fear falling and breaking bones on winter's ice. I fear other things too; like the societal drift from God, congregants who scarcely participate in worship, I fear the slip of prayer from daily life. And you, you have fears too. Some we may share, but many are different I am sure. For the majority of the faith community it's been over a year and a half since we have gathered together formally or informally and articulated our fears.

These texts creep into the middle of our summer worship. They creep into the middle of the gospel account of Mark and provide the reader a turning point, a transition as Jesus' ministry moves into full swing. Fear is a terrible thing. That is why messengers of God, more times than not, proclaim "Fear not" "Don't be afraid." And yet in our human condition fear remains.

South Korea fears North Korea. Japan fears China's subtle but threating advances. The UK fears ramifications from Brexit. Nations fear vaccine unavailability. We fear Cyber -attacks, nuclear proliferation, climate change, national debt, vulnerable power grids and violence in our streets. Amaziah fears Amos. The religious community fears the disciples.

Herod fears John the Baptist. Pilate fears Jesus.

The good news in Christ Jesus is that our fears need not manipulate us, or lead us to reluctant decisions. Christ Jesus was feared by those who could not control him, who did not understand him, who could not grasp the love that he embodied or the depth of his kindness, his grace, his mercy. Jesus offers us a turning point this morning. To turn from fear and the things and situations that draw us away from him, that draw us away from the faith community, and away from his message of beauty, truth, and love for all, to turn to him.

This morning there isn't a birthday party featuring exotic dancers, but there is a rich and sumptuous feast, a holy meal to which you are invited. At this banquet we are not granted anything we wish as participants, but we are given what is needed for life, the body of our Lord Jesus Christ; we receive his forgiveness and the reconciliation that comes from it. Such a lavish gift can seem to be exotic but it cannot be controlled, completely understood, or fully comprehended. That is the way of God. Coming to us suddenly when we least expect it, a child in a manger, a teacher in an upper room, a healer on a cross, a voice from the other side of the tomb providing us a turning point where fears subside and life that is really life begins. Christ Jesus calls us from fear and death, to live as his hope filled sisters and brothers. Amen.

FIRST READING: Amos 7:7-15

This is what [the Lord God] showed me: the Lord was standing beside a wall built with a plumb line, with a plumb line in his hand. 8And the LORD said to me, "Amos, what do you see?" And I said, "A plumb line." Then the Lord said,

"See, I am setting a plumb line in the midst of my people Israel; I will never again pass them by; 9the high places of Isaac shall be made desolate,

and the sanctuaries of Israel shall be laid waste, and I will rise against the house of Jeroboam with the sword."

¹⁰Then Amaziah, the priest of Bethel, sent to King Jeroboam of Israel, saying, "Amos has conspired against you in the very center of the house of Israel; the land is not able to bear all his words. 11 For thus Amos has said,

'Jeroboam shall die by the sword, and Israel must go into exile away from his land."

12 And Amaziah said to Amos, "O seer, go, flee away to the land of Judah, earn your bread there, and prophesy there; 13but never again prophesy at Bethel, for it is the king's sanctuary, and it is a temple of the kingdom."

¹⁴Then Amos answered Amaziah, "I am no prophet, nor a prophet's son; but I am a herdsman, and a dresser of sycamore trees, 15 and the LORD took me from following the flock, and the LORD said to me, 'Go, prophesy to my people Israel."

SECOND READING: Ephesians 1:3-14

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, 4just as he chose us in Christ before the foundation of the world to be holy and blameless before him in love. 5He destined us for adoption as his children through Jesus Christ, according to the good pleasure of his will, 6to the praise of his glorious grace that he freely bestowed on us in the Beloved. ⁷In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of his grace 8that he lavished on us. With all wisdom and insight 9he has made known to us the mystery of his will, according to his good pleasure that he set forth in Christ, ¹⁰as a plan for the fullness of time, to gather up all things in him, things in heaven and things on earth.

¹¹In Christ we have also obtained an inheritance, having been destined according to the purpose of him who accomplishes all things according to his counsel and will, 12 so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory. 13In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; 14this is the pledge of our inheritance toward redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory.

GOSPEL: Mark 6:14-29

King Herod heard of [the disciples' preaching], for Jesus' name had become known. Some were saying, John the baptizer has been raised from the dead; and for this reason these powers are at work in him." 15 But others said, "It is Elijah." And others said, "It is a prophet, like one of the prophets of old." 16But when Herod heard of it, he said, "John, whom I beheaded, has been raised."

¹⁷For Herod himself had sent men who arrested John, bound him, and put him in prison on account of Herodias, his brother Philip's wife, because Herod had married her. 18 For John had been telling Herod, "It is not lawful for you to have your brother's wife." ¹⁹And Herodias had a grudge against him, and wanted to kill him. But she could not, 20 for Herod feared John, knowing that he was a righteous and holy man, and he protected him. When he heard him, he was greatly perplexed; and yet he liked to listen to him. 21But an opportunity came when Herod on his birthday gave a banquet for his courtiers and officers and for the leaders of Galilee. 22When his daughter Herodias came in and danced, she pleased Herod and his guests; and the king said to the girl, "Ask me for whatever you wish, and I will give it." 23And he solemnly swore to her, "Whatever you ask me, I will give you, even half of my kingdom." ²⁴She went out and said to her mother, "What should I ask for?" She replied, "The head of John the baptizer." 25 Immediately she rushed back to the king and requested, "I want you to give me at once the head of John the Baptist on a platter." 26 The king was deeply grieved; yet out of regard for his oaths and for the guests, he did not want to refuse her. 27 Immediately the king sent a soldier of the guard with orders to bring John's head. He went and beheaded him in the prison, 28 brought his head on a platter, and gave it to the girl. Then the girl gave it to her mother. 29 When his disciples heard about it, they came and took his body, and laid it in a tomb.
