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WELCOME Thank you for being with us.

COVID-19 Up-Date We will resume wearing masks for all indoor services due to the surge of cases in our county and in compliance with CDC guidelines. Our COVID-19 Task Force has been meeting for more than a year and a half tracking data and reviewing information provided through a variety of sources. While resuming masking for indoor worship may seem like a step backward it can be viewed as a step forward as we continue to make a way for the congregation to gather as safely as possible to offer prayer, praise and thanksgiving to God. Our desire to have children and youth, who are not eligible to receive vaccines, take an active part in the faith community added to the decision by Congregation Council at their August 9th meeting. Thank you for respecting their decision.

Guidelines for Worship during the time of COVID-19

Entering and Leaving the Church:

Please wear a mask while in worship and take your service bulletin with you and dispose of it properly.

Offerings:

Monetary offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances to the nave prior to the service or immediately following the service. You may also donate via our website at www.stpaulsyork.org

While in the Nave:

Please sit in designated pews only. You may sit together as a family. We ask that you practice social distancing from one family to the next within the pew. Occasionally an usher may seat a guest in the red zone.

Communion Procedure:

- Ushers will direct you. The pulpit side (left) of the nave communes first followed by the font side (right).
- Come to the chancel step taking your place at one of the five positions marked on the chancel floor with a green cross.
- Your entire household may gather at a position marked by the green cross.
- Extend your arms and cup your hands together to receive the host. Return to your pew by the closest side aisle. There is no need to hurry.
- We are receiving communion in one kind only (bread/host).

Our COVID-19 task force is assisting us as we remain open. Please thank Dr. Jessica Ericson, Sheridan Palmer, Deacon Harold Sargeant, Norma Shue, and Dr. Martha Thomas for their dedication and service.

We are a Christian church within the Lutheran tradition (Evangelical Lutheran Church of America) and we welcome people of all Christian traditions as well as people of other faiths and people of little or no faith. Christian worship has been offered to God in this congregation for 185 years. By worshipping with us today, you become part of that living tradition.

Years ago, there was a politician in Michigan who had unsuccessfully run for office eight times in a row. Finally, at what would become his last attempt, he lost again by only a few votes. His narrow miss at winning might have been contested by other candidates. The news reporter asked, "How did it feel to come so close to winning?" The politician replied "Panicky! I hadn't thought of winning; I just like to run!"

I wonder whether his attitude is really as strange as it may seem. All the emphasis seems to be on winning elections, not on what happens afterward. Many men and women seem to fail because they are unprepared to do anything with the office, they worked so hard to win.

This is true in realms other than the political world. There are people who continually interview for jobs. And then when one is offered, they reject the offer for one reason or another. I have a colleague in ministry who repeatedly completed candidacy papers, sent them to the Bishop, went through the call process, and became a congregation's first choice Pastoral candidate, only then he would retract his name from the process. This occurred four times to my knowledge, there may have been more. The colleague, it seems, liked being courted by call committees. And when the word would get out on the street that he was interviewing, (and it always seemed to leak out somewhere) his parishioners would return to church, those who liked him, to show their support, and those who didn't like him to jockey for position when he would leave. Anyway, the colleague was courted, and the local congregation was present and accounted for.

The summer months are like this for many of us. We spend a lot of time thinking and dreaming about summer (especially during dark cold winter days), school being out of session, nice days to accomplish tasks and then when summer comes, we don't always know what to do with it. We lull ourselves into believing that these long days of daylight will go on endlessly. Or that there will be plenty of time to complete tasks relegated to a summer season that quickly evaporates. While I had time on vacation to put paint to paper and canvas, I confess that not one lick of paint has been applied to our back porch posts or interior walls!

In our Christian lives we long for Christ to come and manifest his presence among us. We desire his forgiveness, peace, grace and love. We long for his presence but are not really sure what to do when we discover him staring us in the face in the ordinary ways he is revealed. We want to be God's elect, but few of us prepare to go any farther than winning the election.

Mary the maiden of Galilee receives startling election news from the angel Gabriel. "Hail, O favored one, the Lord is with you!" God sends a message to Mary, informing her that she among all women has found favor. God is staring her in the face in the form of the angel Gabriel. Mary is elected by God to be the mother of the Messiah. "Do not be afraid" says the angel. "For you have found favor with God." Mary didn't deserve this election or earn it or work for it. It simply was granted to her by God. God's favor reflects God's goodness not ours. To be God's elect is an occasion for humility, not pride. It was in humility that Mary responded.

The question of election had always been a concern for the people of Israel. They knew that they were God's chosen people. This meant that they did not choose God, but the Lord God

chose them. Just as later Jesus said to his disciples "You did not choose me, but I have chosen you." God continually reminded the Hebrew people that they had been chosen not because of their righteousness, but because of grace. The entire Old Testament message emphasizes that God's love for the Chosen people was wholly unmerited.

For Mary this election was not only a glorious privilege but a great responsibility. Not only was finding favor with God a joyful part of life, it was also a painful time as well. God had a purpose in mind for Mary. She carried out the Divine will in faithful obedience. "Let it be done to me according to your will" responds Mary to the news of the angel of God. "I am a servant of the Lord." Mary exclaims.

Christianity for many people has been thought of, and lived out, as though it is a personal achievement, rather than the mercy of God. I encounter Christian people who pride themselves in being God's elect when it is humility that is really called for. Certainly, there is joy in being chosen. But God's choosing us does not end only in joy. There is a purpose to our election. There is something more, something beyond, something God is calling us to do, or be, or take part in. You may be struggling to figure that out, or it may be incredibly clear to you. Most of the time it seems that I am more on a continuum moving back and forth between the two.

For Mary that something more has to do with pregnancy, marriage, travel, giving birth, motherhood, escape, teaching, nurturing, loving, sorrow, grief and mourning, standing at the foot of the Cross on Good Friday. Being favored, being elected means that life is lived out in a new position, a new calling, a new vocation.

We are given opportunities to grow in grace and love. We are given opportunity to look beyond, to what lies ahead, to what is in store for us who have been favored by God. We have been given both great privilege and responsibility. In Baptism God calls us to life in Christ Jesus. God favors us. There is joy. But as it was with Mary, so it is with us. Our election by God's gracious outpoured love doesn't end in a joyful moment or two. We are called to a life of service.

Today the clarity of this feast day blurs the announcement of a coming savior, the announcement that the savior has come, and that the savior has died and has risen. The announcement to Mary by one angel, that she has found favor with God is now multiplied times over by the announcement to us that we have found favor with God. And this gracious election is given to us and stares us in the face. In the Blessed Sacrament we receive the body of this one who comes favoring us, electing us as servants just as God did to Mary centuries ago. We spend so much time looking for Christ to come into our lives, longing for his presence but not really sure what to do when we discover him staring us in the face. Mary serves as the example for all of us. She is the archetype of the Christian life. Through Holy Baptism we are God's elect.

We are elected by God to be bearers of the Word, Jesus the Messiah. "Do not be afraid" says the angel to Mary. "For you have found favor with God". Like Mary, we didn't deserve this election, or earn it, or work for it. It simply is granted to us by God.

This morning as we turn our attention toward Mary Mother of our Lord and the startling election news announced by an angel, let us also turn our attention to her example in being servants of the Lord. Amen.
