Entering and Leaving the Church:

Communion Procedure:







Wednesday morning Bible Study at 10:30 AM, Christ Hall. Primary focus this month will be on the Book of Hebrews.

Genesis 2:18-24 Psalm 8 Hebrews 1:14; 2:5-12 Mark 10:2-16

Jesus is teaching about kingdom life. We have been following along on the way to Jerusalem. We are not there yet. We haven't reached our destination. But we are making the journey. Somehow, kingdom life gets upstaged again. This is a common reality. And kingdom life gets pushed aside for a hotter more controversial topic. This morning in Mark chapter 10 it is divorce.

With kingdom life sidestepped we hear about the hardness of the human heart. Our hard heartedness permeates the gospel scene. The Pharisees are setting a trap, gathering data so that they can judge pointing an accusing finger toward Jesus. Divorce just happens to be the hot topic in the region of Judea, beyond the Jordan River. It is a topic that gets in the news and is bound to make or break this prophet, teacher, healer from Nazareth. What will Jesus say? How will he respond? And into this scene add the twelve disciples who when left alone with Jesus raise the same topic again. Jesus' response to them is to state as a matter of fact that anyone who divorces and remarries commits adultery.

Yes commandment number six broken, shattered, left in pieces. But remember this same Jesus sharpens the Law by saying that anyone looking, with longing or desire at another, breaks the same commandment. And no sooner does Jesus recap the Decalogue with the disciples when people begin bringing children, little children to him in order that he might touch them and bless them. The disciples try to send the children away but Jesus reprimands them! He is in a gathering together moment.

Jesus uses the situation to teach about kingdom life in the realm of God. Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. It is the "such as these" that resumes the focus for the day. It is not on the Pharisees or on their knowledge of the Law, or on their ability to craft appropriately worded probing questions, or on their self-secured position in God's realm. Jesus identifies the children in his midst as an example of "whom" and "how" one enters the kingdom of God.

This is a reminder for us that we are to be more like children and less like the knowledgeable adults identified as Pharisees. We are to be more trusting and less judging. We are to be more caught up in the moment than perplexed about tomorrow. We are to be gathering together seeking blessing rather than pointing fingers and setting traps. We are to be more reliant on God than deluding ourselves thinking that it is by any effort of our own that we come into God's realm.

Nearly twenty years ago I was privileged to officiate at my cousin's wedding. Both my cousin and his bride had been previously married. They both had children. Both of their marriages ended in divorce. The guests assembled, on that particular autumn evening, in their back yard. Fairy lights sparkled in the trees, illuminated tent peaks, and flowed freely through flower beds making chrysanthemums glow with brilliant reds and yellows. At the appointed time the bride and groom along with their sons and daughters gathered on the steps of their back garden. The bride and groom exchanged vows. They made outrageous promises. They voiced their love, commitment, and hopes and dreams.

As the sky darkened candle light danced across the table tops and guests dined at a sumptuous buffet and danced on the patio to up-beat music. It was a joyous event.

For a brief moment I was reminded of another garden, that of Eden, the garden in Genesis, when at least for a time everything was perfect. Relationships were in tack. The man and the woman were beside each other caring, tending, naming, and living in God's realm.

And I thought of that other garden too, that heavenly banquet when we will all gather at the table of the Lord, the marriage feast of the Lamb, a feast with no end; a marriage feast that will not end in brokenness, separation, or with shattered promises. No, this feast provided by our gracious Lord Jesus is celebrated in love, commitment, with hopes and dreams all brought together through his victory of sin and death. We are given a foretaste of this feast in the Holy Communion.

This morning we come with our hard hearts and the hot topics of our own time. We often have more in common with the Pharisees, with our pointing fingers and attempts to trap and blame. And just so, Jesus reminds us that we are his children. He reminds us that we are welcomed and forgiven, and are promised a place at the table. We hear from Jesus in whose presence we assemble that we are forgiven and made whole because of his love and his promise to us through baptism. This love is from the beginning bigger and greater and richer and fuller, it is more excellent than anything that we can imagine. The Pharisees that day didn't seem to imagine anything much beyond the Law and how it could be applied in any given situation. God in Christ Jesus applies the law of love beyond what we can comprehend. Jesus points out the obvious to us by showing us how much he loves us by giving his life for us on the cross. Jesus' outstretched arms on the cross embrace all of humanity. He blesses us with his joyous welcome, announcing the forgiveness of our sins. He is present with us now restoring life and opening us to a heavenly vision where there are no hard hearts but only joy in his presence. Amen.

FIRST READING: Genesis 2:18-24

The LORD God said, "It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him a helper as his partner." ¹⁹So out of the ground the LORD God formed every animal of the field and every bird of the air, and brought them to the man to see what he would call them; and whatever the man called every living creature, that was its name. ²⁰The man gave names to all cattle, and to the birds of the air, and to every animal of the field; but for the man there was not found a helper as his partner. ²¹So the LORD God caused a deep sleep to fall upon the man, and he slept; then he took one of his ribs and closed up its place with flesh. ²²And the rib that the LORD God had taken from the man he made into a woman and brought her to the man. ²³Then the man said,

"This at last is bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh; this one shall be called Woman, for out of Man this one was taken."

24Therefore a man leaves his father and his mother and clings to his wife, and they become one flesh.

Psalm 8

SECOND READING: Hebrews 1:1-4; 2:5-12

Long ago God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets, ²but in these last days he has spoken to us by a Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, through whom he also created the worlds. ³He is the reflection of God's glory and the exact imprint of God's very being, and he sustains all things by his powerful word. When he had made purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high, ⁴having become as much superior to angels as the name he has inherited is more excellent than theirs.

^{2:5}Now God did not subject the coming world, about which we are speaking, to angels. ⁶But someone has testified somewhere,

"What are human beings that you are mindful of them,

or mortals, that you care for them?

⁷You have made them for a little while lower than the angels;

you have crowned them with glory and honor, subjecting all things under their feet." Now in subjecting all things to them, God left nothing outside their control. As it is, we do not yet see everything in subjection to them, ⁹but we do see Jesus, who for a little while was made lower than the angels, now crowned with glory and honor because of the suffering of death, so that by the grace of God he might taste death for everyone.

¹⁰It was fitting that God, for whom and through whom all things exist, in bringing many children to glory, should make the pioneer of their salvation perfect through sufferings. ¹¹For the one who sanctifies and those who are sanctified all have one Father. For this reason Jesus is not ashamed to call them brothers and sisters, ¹²saying,

"I will proclaim your name to my brothers and sisters,

in the midst of the congregation I will praise you."

GOSPEL: Mark 10:2-16

Some Pharisees came, and to test [Jesus] they asked, "Is it lawful for a man to divorce his wife?" ³He answered them, "What did Moses command you?" ⁴They said, "Moses allowed a man to write a certificate of dismissal and to divorce her." ⁵But Jesus said to them, "Because of your hardness of heart he wrote this commandment for you. ⁶But from the beginning of creation, 'God made them male and female.' ⁷For this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, ⁸and the two shall become one flesh.' So they are no longer two, but one flesh. ⁹Therefore what God has joined together, let no one separate."

¹⁰Then in the house the disciples asked him again about this matter. ¹¹He said to them, "Whoever divorces his wife and marries another commits adultery against her; ¹²and if she divorces her husband and marries another, she commits adultery."

¹³People were bringing little children to him in order that he might touch them; and the disciples spoke sternly to them. ¹⁴But when Jesus saw this, he was indignant and said to them, "Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. ¹⁵Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it." ¹⁶And he took them up in his arms, laid his hands on them, and blessed them.
