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Proper 19 B, 2021

I am an observer when it comes to in-service days for teachers. I observe what hopes and dreams are articulated prior to the academic year. I observe room readiness. I observe buckets and cleaning supplies heading off to school. I observe cheerful countenance prior to such events and I observe the disappointments that often follow.

Teachers don't have an easy time of it. I have been surrounded by teachers within my family system; an aunt and uncle, a sister, a wife, mother-in-law, father-in-law, and most recently added to the list, daughter. In parish ministry I have been blest to serve in four congregations all of which included teachers. So when the Prophet Isaiah begins "The Lord God has given me the tongue of a teacher," I sit up and take note. The skill, craft, giftedness of the teacher is the ability to "know how to sustain the weary with a word." At least that's the prophet's take on teachers.

I observe the prophet Isaiah acting as teacher. And he has observed that the people are weary. God's people were weary from being in exile. They were weary of being in a foreign land, with foreign religion, leaders, and landscape. They were weary of being put under, pushed toward spiritual defeat. The Lord God addresses such weariness through the Prophet Isaiah. This message about being given the tongue, the ability to speak, like a teacher, is better rendered as the ability to speak as "those who are taught." What appears like first person singular is more accurately rendered as communal, plural, group, faith community. The word for the weary is a word of redemption, a word of future, a word of hope, a word of return. Not a return to the way things used to be, but a return to the land of the living; where there is life lived in the presence of God. To buffer all of the weariness the prophetic word advocates that the community stand up together. They are united in mission, in focus, and in a shared future. The future is not more of the same old weariness, but of a new morning awakening us to what God declares. God's declaration is one that sustains you. What God declares gives life.

We are a people who have grown weary. Weary of COVID-19. Weary of masks. Weary of political polarization. Weary of brutality. Weary of conspiracy theories. Weary of restrictions. Weary of interruptions in the supply chain. Weary of war. Weary of natural disasters. We are just plain weary. I am weary of all of the words that aren't life giving. There are so many words that are leading people further from one another and further from God. Words of politicians, words of reporters, words posted on social media, words sent via emailed, words spoken in frustration, hatred and prejudice.

Isaiah was weary of the people listening to such words in his own time. He listened to what the people were saying and it drove him to deep despair. He used his best vocabulary to shock the people, attempting to move them to a place where they could recognize how far they had drifted from the Lord God; how far they had slipped from using their tongue to sustain the weary with a word; how far they are from being teachers of God's life bringing word.

God's declarative word is made known to us most clearly in Jesus. Jesus, God's son is the Word made flesh, the one dwelling among us. This is what we celebrate at Christmas and sing in carols. This is the word coming into a weary world. He enters into our human existence bringing life. He forgives sins and grants salvation. And as a 16<sup>th</sup> century teacher by the name of Martin Luther puts it in his teaching pamphlet "where there is forgiveness of sins there is life and salvation." Too often we become observers rather than teachers of the Divine Word. We observe that training is offered but don't engage. We observe hopes and dreams that are articulated prior to an academic year but remain on the sidelines watching to see what if anything will come about. We observe room readiness. We observe those with buckets and cleaning supplies. We observe the cheerful countenance of some and the disappointments of others. But as observers we are hesitant to speak a word, God's word that is life giving, hope filled, a word of new day things, awakening others to hear God and know of God' love, acceptance, and promised future.

Isaiah knew that his people, his community dwelling in exile, living in a foreign land, that they had grown weary. They needed to be sustained by God's life giving word. We are sustained by God's life giving Word, Christ Jesus. He comes among us sustaining us in our weariness and awakening us with Easter's joyful news of life and hope and future. We receive that Word in the bread of Holy Communion.

In Bible study this week I invited the participants to complete the sentence "I love God...;" It was a joy to hear what those gathered were saying. Their words were life giving.

I love God because he first loved me.

I love God because he forgives my sin.

I love God because of grace.

I love God because of Jesus, the Word of life.

I love God, writes the Psalmist, because God listens to me, God hears prayers.

All that they articulated were things that they were taught; through sermons, scripture, catechism, hymns, liturgy, Sunday school. All of these sustain us, especially in times when we grow weary.

Jesus is teaching his disciples. He's sorting out what is known and what is unknown. Through a series of questions he is discerning what the disciples are hearing about him. Some think he is John the Baptist. Others think he is Elijah. There are others traveling around with them who think that he is one of the prophets. But then in a moment of absolute clarity Jesus presses in on the disciples "But who do you say that I am?" It is Peter who answers. "You are the Messiah." Then Jesus proceeds to teach them about the suffering and rejections inflicted by the religious leaders and how he will be killed and after three days rise again. Such an extreme situation was more than Peter could bear. Jesus called them to set their minds on divine things, life giving things, hope filled things, new day things. It seems that people were observing a great many things about Jesus. Jesus wanted them to move from observers to teachers. He challenged them to take up their cross and follow. Active participation! Through discipleship the weary are sustained.

You may not teach in school, you may not think that you have the tongue of a teacher. But through the scriptures we observe that God uses human voices to speak his word to sustain the weary. God speaks a life giving word to us in Jesus, awakening us to a new day. Amen.

#### FIRST READING: Isaiah 50:4-9a

The Lord GOD has given me the tongue of a teacher, that I may know how to sustain the weary with a word. Morning by morning he wakenswakens my ear to listen as those who are taught. <sup>5</sup>The Lord GOD has opened my ear, and I was not rebellious, I did not turn backward. <sup>6</sup>I gave my back to those who struck me, and my cheeks to those who pulled out the beard; I did not hide my face from insult and spitting. <sup>7</sup>The Lord GOD helps me; therefore I have not been disgraced; therefore I have set my face like flint, and I know that I shall not be put to shame; <sup>8</sup>he who vindicates me is near. Who will contend with me? Let us stand up together. Who are my adversaries? Let them confront me. <sup>9</sup>It is the Lord God who helps me; who will declare me guilty?

#### Psalm 116:1-9

#### SECOND READING: James 3:1-12

Not many of you should become teachers, my brothers and sisters, for you know that we who teach will be judged with greater strictness. <sup>2</sup>For all of us make many mistakes. Anyone who makes no mistakes in speaking is perfect, able to keep the whole body in check with a bridle. <sup>3</sup>If we put bits into the mouths of horses to make them obey us, we guide their whole bodies. <sup>4</sup>Or look at ships: though they are so large that it takes strong winds to drive them, yet they are guided by a very small rudder wherever the will of the pilot directs. <sup>5</sup>So also the tongue is a small member, yet it boasts of great exploits.

How great a forest is set ablaze by a small fire! <sup>6</sup>And the tongue is a fire. The tongue is placed among our members as a world of iniquity; it stains the whole

body, sets on fire the cycle of nature, and is itself set on fire by hell. <sup>7</sup>For every species of beast and bird, of reptile and sea creature, can be tamed and has been tamed by the human species, <sup>8</sup>but no one can tame the tongue—a restless evil, full of deadly poison. <sup>9</sup>With it we bless the Lord and Father, and with it we curse those who are made in the likeness of God. <sup>10</sup>From the same mouth come blessing and cursing. My brothers and sisters, this ought not to be so. <sup>11</sup>Does a spring pour forth from the same opening both fresh and brackish water? <sup>12</sup>Can a fig tree, my brothers and sisters, yield olives, or a grapevine figs? No more can salt water yield fresh.

#### GOSPEL: Mark 8:27-38

Jesus went on with his disciples to the villages of Caesarea Philippi; and on the way he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that I am?" <sup>28</sup>And they answered him, "John the Baptist; and others, Elijah; and still others, one of the prophets." <sup>29</sup>He asked them, "But who do you say that I am?" Peter answered him, "You are the Messiah." <sup>30</sup>And he sternly ordered them not to tell anyone about him.

<sup>31</sup>Then he began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. <sup>32</sup>He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. <sup>33</sup>But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, "Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things."

<sup>34</sup>He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. <sup>35</sup>For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. <sup>36</sup>For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? <sup>37</sup>Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? <sup>38</sup>Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels."
