





Receive these prayers, O God, and those in our hearts known only to you; through Jesus Christ our Lord.






PREFACE



Proper 20 B, 2021 Mark 9: 30-37

Car trips have certainly changed over my lifetime. When I was a kid going on a car trip there was; no air conditioning (hot sticky vinyl seats), no seatbelts (other family members could easily encroach on your space as they chose to stretch out), no entertainment center (if you were lucky the AM radio would maintain a strong signal). We played family games to pass the time. The Alphabet Game using road signs and billboards was a favorite.

When I became a father going on a car trip we had; air conditioning, seatbelts, and an entertainment center. I knew the sound track of movies, like the Incredibles, by heart, but hadn't seen the images I was driving keeping my eyes on the road, and the kids were watching as the time passed! When screen time ran out we would revert to some travel games. My kids often played Counting Punch Buggies (VW Beetles) and Yellow colored cars and trucks. A yellow car or truck counts as one point. A punch buggy counts as one point. A yellow punch buggy counts two points. It is imperative to always seek out and find the yellow VW Beetle along the way. This simple game kept all of us on the lookout. It helped to pass the time. And for the most part the game was great fun.

But sometimes along the way the whole thing would break down. It often occurred when the point totals began favoring one person over another. Group dissension broke out. An argument ensued about who got what, who spotted the last Punch Buggy or the most recent yellow pick-up truck. What began always as an amusing game, a simple contest to keep us alert and watching and counting sequentially, most often deteriorated into a competitive argument. And the sad part of it was that the next few minutes, or the remainder of the trip, often ended up with someone not talking to someone else.

We all want to be winners. We all want to be the best at spotting those jelly bean colored subcompacts or pick out the sedan or jeep that looks as though it was drenched in French's mustard. We forget that it is a game and the important part of it is to pass the time so that all of us arrive together at our destination.

Along the way, the disciples of Jesus have been keeping their eyes open too. Not for punch buggies or yellow vehicles. They have seen what Jesus can do. The list is getting rather lengthy in Mark's account. By chapter 9, blind eyes have been opened. Sick people have been made well. Those who were hungry were fed. Jesus had chosen them to follow and to join him on the journey. It was inevitable that they would begin to think that they had something over the rest of the crowds. And if they were "in," then of course one or more of them would be just a little bit better, greater, more with it, than some others who were called to tag along. One of them must have been bold enough to put himself out there as the greatest, best, first, favorite. Image this after last week when we heard Jesus' rebuke of Peter. Peter had been in that position but after his encounter with Jesus, well I think it rather bold to even bring up who is first. But they argued just the same about who was indeed the greatest. They kept walking until they reached Capernaum.

The argument happened. Jesus confronts them. They were silent. This after Jesus had told them the second time about what would happen when he arrived in Jerusalem. It was as though they were so busy trying to figure out which of them was the greatest that they didn't have any time to think about Jesus being betrayed, handed over, killed, and raised up. They were keeping score. One of them would surely be the winner. One whose eyes were keen would surely be deemed the greatest.

But that's not how it played out. It ended in silence. It ended pretty much the same way when the punch buggy game would break down with me and my family on a car trip. The game ended in silence. The disciples when asked flat out what they were arguing about along the way, they were silent. Jesus addressed the twelve, "Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all."

I think that the disciples really did hear Jesus when he brought up the primary role servant hood plays in his realm. But before they had a chance to seek clarity on serving, Jesus propels the story with the important part that follows. Jesus takes a child, places the child among them, and embraces the child. Then he says, "Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me."

Children had no status in Bible times. Unfortunately they were thought less of than women were in that time. Children were ones who didn't count, would never be given a place, let alone be seen as having worth or value. What was Jesus really communicating to the twelve? What did He want them to grasp? Where does greatness fit when called by Jesus to follow in the way of the cross?

These questions are important. They remind us that servant hood is not about title, fame, appreciation, attention, or status. In Baptism we are welcomed into the community of faith. We are embraced by Christ and are given a place at his table, a life to be lived in love, an identity as heir of his kingdom, and a promise that is equal for all who believe and call upon him to be saved. The disciples on that day as they traveled to Capernaum thought for sure that at least one among them was the greatest, that one was just a little bit more important, a little bit more worthy than were his counterparts.

Sentiments such as these are far too common. They plague nations, politicians, churches, pastors, community organizations, athletes, musicians, physicians, educators, entertainers, news anchors, neighborhoods, school boards, school districts, law enforcement personnel, accountants, attorneys, CEOs and all whose prejudices blind them from reaching out to those who have no status, place, or position.

Often I am silent because I know all too well that I have not lived fully into my baptismal calling. It is easy for me, for us to slip into the mindset of the inner group of the twelve. Easy for us to begin to think more highly of ourselves than what it is that we bring to the table. We forget that our discipleship isn't a game, not something to pass the time, but is the work that Jesus calls us to, so that everyone arrives together at God's promised destination.

Today, it is Christ Jesus who welcomes us, who calls us to His table of love and for-giveness. We are given position and status only through the One who was willing to suffer for our sake. There is only one who is the greatest and that is Christ Jesus. All of us are called to follow, to serve, and to love as we travel up the road to Jerusalem. A couple of good games might help to pass the time, make the trip more pleasant, or keep someone else from getting tired, bored or antsy along the way. But each of us is needed, each of us is redeemed, and each of us is loved, because Christ made the trip to Jerusalem, to suffer and die and to be raised up, so that through him we are raised up too. This news is indeed good. Whether the journey is long or short, servant hood is the trademark, welcoming those along the way who lack position, or title is what our Lord models, so that we arrive together at our promised destination. Amen.
