

Entering and Leaving the Church:

The Holy Gospel according to **St. Luke**. **Glory to you, O Lord.**



“Paint what you see” Professor Wert instructed the class of Painting One university art students. They began with individual still life images arranged at their painting stations. Professor Wert called them “Kitchen Sketches.” He wanted students to begin with something that they knew well and with which they could easily relate. “Bring something from your kitchen, not something fancy, bring something ordinary, common.” A small cutting board and an orange sliced in half, a paring knife resting on the side, and all of this placed on a dark blue placemat.

You set out on your picture with eagerness and before you know it you are adding orange paint and blue paint and you aren’t really looking at what is before you. The difficulty with painting a still life comes of course when you begin to think that you know what something is or what an object looks like and so you start painting without really looking. You start, “making crap up.” Professor Wert used more colorful language to describe this phenomenon. But those situations always ended with the mantra “paint what you see.”

This morning we have St. Luke who does his best to get us to look more carefully at what is before us. The difficulty of course for us, who have been raised in the church, is that we are familiar with so much, that we begin to make crap up. We stop looking carefully at what has been placed before us in the Incarnation, God taking on human flesh and dwelling among us. Luke uses the language of story and common, familiar things, to get us to look, and to listen, and to experience God. Luke paints pictures for us:

Elizabeth and Mary, two pregnant women consoling one another

Shepherds on a hill side tending their flock at night

A baby wrapped in blankets and placed in a feed trough

An unexpected catch of fish

A Samaritan helping out when no one else would

A father with two sons who loved them more than they could comprehend

A repentant thief ready to exhale his last breath

Friends walking along, talking, consoling one another, sharing their disappointment with recent events

Luke writes words that spring into action, like a paint brush on a canvas, words, stories, images bringing comfort to those, to all who need comforting.

In Luke’s day, like in our own, there are so many who need to be comforted. Such comfort brings healing. And that I believe is why St. Luke the Evangelist is known as Luke the Physician. His gospel account is set down in an orderly way so that God fearing people will know the comforting message of God’s love in Christ Jesus. Luke wants people to stop making crap up (I set out to write, put down, an orderly account he begins in the gospel) and to look deeply into the story of God, who is always

working to bring about deliverance, making a way, providing opportunity to reimagine what repentant life brings. We hear of this from Isaiah in the Old Testament reading and from the Psalmist who acknowledge that the Lord God is on our side.

Luke tells the whole story of Jesus weaving together the ordinary aspects of daily life. He tells of disappointment, unbelief, and those who believe so confidently that they; call out for mercy, call out for healing, call out for Jesus. They call him Master and Lord. They redirect their lives because of him. They willingly take up cross and follow, without counting the cost of discipleship. Luke tells of blind eyes opened of skin diseases cured of hungry people filled with good things.

Luke is an artist. He was ahead of his time. Today we might even think of him as an art therapist. But in those days, he was one of the disciples, who utilized his entire being to open humanity to the message of God's love; love that heals, love that forgives, love that binds, love that comforts, love that brings and gives and bestows hope.

This morning we come with our blind eyes, our wrinkled skin, and a hunger for life different than how we currently experience it. We are in the presence of the Risen Lord. We are called upon to look and see, not to make crap up. In faith we continue telling the story of Jesus who journeys with us. Through Luke we are reminded to look carefully and to see:

the importance of consoling one another,
the beauty of moon light on a hill side,
sheep who need a shepherd,
the need to help those who are down trodden,
dysfunctional family systems that need more love than is humanly possible,
giving breathe when it seems that the oxygen is all but used up,
and recognizing the one walking with us during days of deep disappointment.

Luke with his orderly account, his creative use of story and prose, and his incarnational theology, makes sure that we listen and hear what God promises. Luke isn't going to take any chances. He doesn't want us to make crap up. He provides an orderly account of the gospel assuring us of the "power from on high" of the gift of the Holy Spirit. Luke knew how much that gift is necessary in order to live another day. It is the gift of the Holy Spirit that empowered him to set down a love story, ink on velum, of God's unending love for the lowly, hungry, sick, blind, lame, dying, disappointed; for folks like you and me caught between days of unbelief, and faith so strong that we call out like those who encountered Jesus on his way to Jerusalem, *Lord, Master, you are the healer of every ill*. Luke captures that healing, that comfort, that hope that we know in Christ.

Professor Wert reminded us to "paint what we see." Luke reminds us to look deeply and listen attentively to the love that God bestows in Jesus; because that is the love that heals. Amen.
