Entering and Leaving the Church:

"Lower than a snake belly lizard lipped two timing gossip breading sack of crumbled cookies!" Welcome to the preaching of John the Baptist.

On this third week of Advent we are introduced to one of the finest preachers of Bible times. "You brood of vipers" is really a much more polite translation than what may have been stated in his native language. A clearer more direct string of adjectives might better shed light on his passionate proclamation for listeners to "repent." I can imagine a compilation of expletives rolling of the lips from a preacher like that of Nadia Boltz-Webber. I haven't been able to bring myself to use "R" rated language from the pulpit. So, you are stuck this morning with; "Lower than a snake belly lizard lipped two timing gossip breading sack of crumbled cookies!"

John is a seasoned preacher. He knows his material and his audience. He is knowledgeable with the words from the prophets Isaiah and Malachi. He shouts out for repentance and reminds his listeners of who they are; children of Abraham. He is part of a long line of preachers. He is the forerunner of preachers who like many of those in the previous century that we referred to as pulpit giants. Great orators who frequented podiums and pulpits gaining celebrity like status:

James Stewart (not the American actor) the Scottish preacher and New Testament professor at the University of Edinburgh,

Billy Graham perhaps a more familiar name,

Martin Luther King Jr., civil rights leader and Nobel Prize recipient,

George Buttrick, 30 years preaching at the NY Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church,

and Harry Emerson Fosdick of famed River Side Church.

I have been blessed through the years to hear some preachers of such acclaimed status at the Chautauqua Institute amphitheater;

Barbara Lundblad, preaching professor at Union Theological, and frequent guest on the radio show the Protestant Hour;

Raphael Warnock, now Senator Warnock, but former preacher who stood and preached from the pulpit of Martin Luther King Jr;

Barbara Brown-Taylor, New York Times best-selling author, preacher, educator;

Craig Barnes, President at Princeton Theological, and former Old Testament professor Pittsburgh Theological; these are just a few of my contemporaries who preach, in the long line like that of John. They all have their unique styles, vocabularies, perspectives, life experiences and theological traditions. But they all preach the expectancy of another way of life and living revealed through God's love in Christ Jesus.

The faculty of Gettysburg Seminary shaped me as a preacher. I was formed by then President Herman Stuempfle who taught a form of preaching that was poetic and elegant; a balance of law and gospel revealing God's infinite power and love. We glimpse his creative prose in some of our modern hymn texts.

Tom Ridenhour who was all about the earthiness of life, when we students were piling it on a little bit thick, if you get my gist, he would leap up on top of a desk holding up his arm high over his head shouting "Save the watch!" Or "golly I wish I would have worn waders!"

Richard Thulin was a brilliant story teller; he had the ability to weave a sermon together in such a way that you could almost feel the threads and see the beauty of the whole as he communicated the love of Christ and his desire for your life.

Bob Kysier intently listened to us as we honed our craft presenting sermons and would ask at the conclusion "where was Jesus?" Doctors; Steumpfle, Ridenhour, Thulin and Kysier all stressed the importance of the content, like John, of the one who is to come, and the one who comes, and the one who is present with us now.

John preaches of a new age. He advances the image of refiner's fire of Malachi and of purifying water and fire of Isaiah. He uses metaphors familiar to those who were standing on the banks of the Jordan River listening; "threshing floor" and "winnowing fork." That language doesn't necessarily translate well for us, but it is all about bearing fruit, in this case the grain so that there is life. John boldly proclaims what he can do and what he can't. He baptizes with water, but the Mightier One will baptize with the Holy Spirit. In the Old Testament it is the Spirit that is life-giving. John is pointing to the Spirit Bearer. He is pointing to Jesus. He identifies Jesus by and through life giving ministry.

On this day when we are presented with the powerful preaching of John, when we recognize powerful preachers; eloquent, earthy, captivating and content concerned, I think of Peter and his sermon in the book of Acts. There he proclaims Christ Jesus crucified and risen in such a way that the people are cut to the heart and begin to question among themselves "what should we do?" They are so moved by the spirit of the Living Lord that they want to figure out, discern, come up with ways to focus life in Christ Jesus. They want to tell the story of Jesus and the power of his Spirit. They want the repentant purified life that John preached that day by the Jordan River. They want the risen Christ to be the center of their life and of their living. Maybe you want that too.

Expletives may very well get your attention, "Lower than a snake belly lizard lipped two timing gossip breading sack of crumbled cookies!" John's preaching wasn't just about getting your attention; it was about a different way to live. It was about experiencing life refined by the Spirit of God. That has been the work of preachers throughout the ages, to move from the self-centered culture of which we are apart, to the repentant, refined, refocused community of Christ Jesus. We are invited into that community through baptism.

FIRST READING: Zephaniah 3:14-20

Sing aloud, O daughter Zion; shout, O Israel!

Rejoice and exult with all your heart, O daughter Jerusalem!

¹⁵The LORD has taken away the judgments against you,

he has turned away your enemies. The king of Israel, the LORD, is in your midst;

you shall fear disaster no more. ¹⁶On that day it shall be said to Jerusalem:

Do not fear, O Zion;

do not let your hands grow weak.

¹⁷The LORD, your God, is in your midst, a warrior who gives victory;

he will rejoice over you with gladness, he will renew you in his love;

he will exult over you with loud singing ¹⁸as on a day of festival.

I will remove disaster from you, so that you will not bear reproach for it.

¹⁹I will deal with all your oppressors at that time.

And I will save the lame and gather the outcast,

and I will change their shame into praise and renown in all the earth.

²⁰At that time I will bring you home, at the time when I gather you; for I will make you renowned and praised among all the peoples of the earth, when I restore your fortunes

before your eyes, says the LORD.

GOSPEL: Luke 3:7-18

John said to the crowds that came out to be baptized by him, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bear fruits worthy of repentance. Do not begin to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our ancestor'; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire."

¹⁰And the crowds asked him, "What then should we do?" ¹¹In reply he said to them, "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise." ¹²Even tax collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, "Teacher, what should we do?" ¹³He said to them, "Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you." ¹⁴Soldiers also asked him, "And we, what should we do?" He said to them, "Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages."

¹⁵As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, ¹⁶John answered all of them by saying, "I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. ¹⁷His winnowing fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

¹⁸So, with many other exhortations, he proclaimed the good news to the people.
