Being totally caught off guard can be a bit unnerving. Angels generally don't just appear out of nowhere, at least not to me. They appear out of nowhere in the Bible: to Zachariah while tending the incense in the temple, to Mary going about her chores in Nazareth, to Shepherds tending sheep on the Bethlehem hillside, to the Magi after offering their gifts to the Christ Child, but honestly those encounters all happened centuries ago. Each of those situations was punctuated with surprise. Each one was caught off guard and wasn't certain what all of this might mean.

I do recall one occasion when I was startled by an angel. It was an experience which I remember quite vividly. So taken by the splendor, the brilliance, the color, the glistening wings, the close proximity to which I was encountered, that I didn't have the sense to even snap a picture; didn't think to take a selfie. We were all together, the entire family; Emily, Amelia, Allen and I, when the angel appeared.

We were on sabbatical. It was the summer of 2013. We were in Italy. We had just finished touring the Academe Museum in Florence. We had a 9:00 a.m. timed entrance for our tickets. The Academe is home to Michael Angelo's huge marble sculpture of David. There in the rotunda especially created for him he stands larger than life poised ready to engage in battle with the enormous Philistine warrior, Goliath. This was the first time that an artist depicted David before the encounter with the towering opposing giant. This was also the first time to see David a winner before the battle, with the sling shot hanging over his shoulder and the smooth rock, which would penetrate the forehead of the antagonist, still in the palm of his hand.

We had spent a rather lengthy time not only admiring Michael Angelo's work, but the work of lesser known artists. Allen at age 5 especially liked all of the altar piece paintings depicting our Lord on Calvary's Cross. He picked out the swords, the blood dripping down from the wounds, and the skull often depicted at the foot of the cross in most every painting. So there we were, late morning on a gorgeous June day in Florence Italy, and after visually feasting on such incredible artwork, our stomachs indicated the need for feasting on some incredible Italian Focaccia bread.

Emily had researched a little place just around the corner off of Piazza San Marco. There we ate our fill. With our hunger pangs eliminated by the delicious flat bread sandwiches we ventured into a little lesser known convent. It is now called the Museum of San Marco. For the equivalent of about \$11 dollars the four of us were granted entrance. There were no crowds. The place was nearly vacant. The frescos in the court yard were beautiful and told the story of the life of Christ. The Refectory had a corky fresco of the Last Supper; definitely not painted by Leonardo Da Vinci. As we made our way up the broad stair case to the portion of the former convent occupied by the sisters that is when we encountered the angel.

As we turned at the landing to complete the last half dozen stairs, there the angel Gabriel stood. Well not so much standing but bending forward, as if to kneel, but not yet on one knee. The robes were a dazzling rose color, trimmed with golden lace. And the wings were more colorful than a peacock. And they glistened in the light, as if preschoolers had decided to use multicolored glitter all over them. The angel was speechless. And so was I; caught off guard, taken back by such beauty, by such an unexpected encounter.

My family and I were not the first ones to have our jaws drop open out of reverence, amazement, awe, wonder. This angel had encountered others, many, many others. This angel Gabriel has occupied the wall at the top of the staircase since 1436 when Fra Angelico painted him there; placed into the plaster in perpetuity announcing to Mary that she will bear a son and will name him Jesus. That she of all women has found favor with God. And that she, Mary, will bear the long awaited Messiah, the one who will save humanity from sin.

So the four of us, Emily, Amelia, Allen and I stood there mesmerized by the dazzling glory. There were no velvet covered ropes keeping us back, holding us at a distance. We were able to place our noses next to the fresco, next to the image of Gabriel heralding salvations tidings. I had studied this particular piece of art work during my undergraduate days of art school. Then I viewed the angelic messenger through a vintage slide projected onto a screen during an art history class. I had visited Florence Italy many times before. I had even visited the old convent made museum once before but the second floor was then off limits to guests. It was the right time. It was the time when for some peculiar reason the angel appeared to me and my family. And we didn't think to take a picture, to document the moment, to hold it in time.

The angel Gabriel appeared out of nowhere to Mary. The startling news didn't seem to faze her. She was composed enough to ask a question or two and then after he departed from her she set off to visit a family member, Elizabeth. She needed to tell someone about the encounter. Who would believe her story? Who would grasp that the time had come? Who would bask in the moment with her before her finding "favor" would lead to marriage, nine months of pregnancy, travel, giving birth, motherhood, escape, teaching, nurturing, loving, sorrow, grief and mourning. This favorable news from the unexpected encounter with the angel Gabriel caught her off guard, but in humility she responded to the magnitude of such news with confidence. When she enters the home of Zechariah and greets Elizabeth, Elizabeth knows that the time has come. There is no photo opportunity of this moment either, only the story told by those for whom salvation, forgiveness, and hope matter. Luke tells the story. We tell the story. But Mary, in that moment of unbelievable amazement sings. She sings of God's power, she sings of God's deeds, she sings of God's equity, she sings of God's hope for all who are yet to come, all for whom God's gift of life is miraculously given.

On this fourth Sunday in Advent we encounter the message of hope and salvation in the Word proclaimed and in the sacrament given in the body of Christ Jesus. We are not the first ones to have our jaws drop open out of reverence, amazement, awe, and wonder at the presence of God among us. His Word and sacramental gift encounters generation after generation since Easter's Angel announced an empty tomb. The Bread of Heaven placed into our hands; the Body of Christ given announcing in perpetuity God's grace, forgiveness and love for you and for me. This one, Jesus, is the long awaited one. He is the one who saves humanity from sin. He is the one announced through the angel Gabriel, and the one acknowledged by Elizabeth, and the one magnified in song by Mary.

Being caught off guard can be a bit unnerving. We encounter God this morning. Take in the season's splendor, brilliance, color, and the close proximity in which Jesus comes giving himself to you. Don't be taken back by such simple beauty. In these means of grace he comes to us at the right time; be it marriage, pregnancy, travel, giving birth, parenting, teaching, nurturing, loving, sorrow, grief, mourning -he comes. In humility we confidently receive his love. Amen.

And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit 42 and exclaimed with a loud cry, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. ⁴³And why has this happened to me, that the mother of my Lord comes to me? 44 For as soon as I heard the sound of your greeting, the child in my womb leaped for joy. ⁴⁵And blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfillment of what was spoken to her by the Lord."

[46And Mary said,

"My soul magnifies the Lord,

⁴⁷and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior,

⁴⁸ for he has looked with favor on the lowliness of his servant.

Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed;

⁴⁹for the Mighty One has done great things for me,

and holy is his name.

⁵⁰His mercy is for those who fear him from generation to generation.

⁵¹He has shown strength with his arm; he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of their hearts.
