The Blessing of the Christmas Crèche **8:00 AM Sunday, December 19**

The Child in the manger and other representations of the Nativity has been used in churches since the first centuries. The earliest known depiction comes from around A.D. 380 and served as a wall decoration in the burial chamber of a Christian family in St. Sebastian's Catacombs, Rome. The crèche as we know of it traces its origins to St. Francis of Assisi, who made the Christmas crib popular through his celebration on Christmas Eve 1223, with a Nativity scene including live animals.

At the conclusion of the liturgy on the Fourth Sunday of Advent we will have the blessing of our Christmas Crèche. The simple order for the blessing of the crèche calls our attention to God's gift to us in and through Christ Jesus. It recalls how God works through the ordinary to bring about his plan to save us from sin. Sin separates us from God. Christmas points us to the infant Jesus who takes away sin and makes the way for us to be brought into right relationship with God. The liturgy will be spoken and the hymns sung. For those seeking a holiday liturgy with less singing and fewer in attendance this service option may be right for you.



The Ringing in of Christmas **10:30 AM Sunday, December 19**

Bells have been rung throughout the centuries to mark both solemn and joyful occasions. At the conclusion of the liturgy on Sunday December 19th the members of the Handbell and Children's Choirs will join forces to ring in the joyful season of Christmas at St. Paul's. The bell peal will begin with the tolling of the largest handbell. As it tolls other bells, tone chimes and suspended chimes will add to a rich cacophony of sound. Then after the peal has had time to joyfully announce the end of Advent and the beginning of the Christmas season the organ will be added as it introduces *Joy to the World!* We will add our voices joyfully singing together with our thoughts focused on the birth of our Savior.

The Nativity of Our Lord **Christmas Eve 4:00 and 7:00 PM**

The Christmas Eve services will be held this year at 4:00 and 7:00 PM on Friday December 24. With the radical shift currently being seen in attendance patterns the Worship and Arts Committee has planned earlier service times to facilitate those who are currently attending in person liturgies, mostly young families and older adults. The services will be nearly identical with the exception being the children's choirs will ring handbells and sing at 4:00 PM and the Chancel Choir and Handbell choirs will sing and ring at 7:00 PM. The church will be beautifully decorated and we will enjoy the sound of our beautiful pipe organ leading us in our prayer, praise and thanksgiving to God for the great gift of his Son, Christ Jesus. Our Christmas Eve liturgies have become one of the favorite services of the entire year. Do come, invite friends and family members, and rejoice as we celebrate the birth of our Savior.



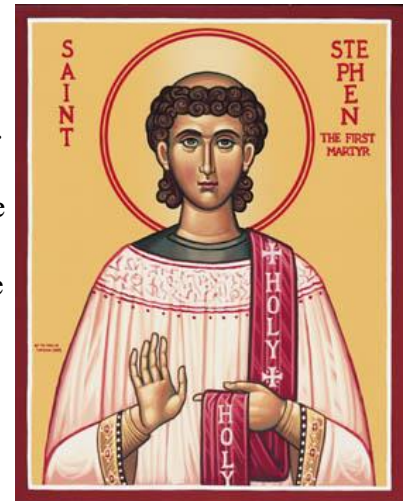
Christmas Day 10:30 AM

Our Christmas Day liturgy 10:30 AM December 25th will provide yet another opportunity for us to celebration the joyous Nativity of Our Lord. This celebration of the Holy Eucharist will reveal in the beauty of morning light, the new day that is ours in Christ. On this Holy Day we will remember the greatest gift given, God's Son, Christ Jesus. And we will rejoice in the life, health and salvation given to us through him. We will sing several of the traditional German Carols. This liturgy is becoming more popular among our church family. It helps in a very concrete way to keep Christ Jesus our Lord at the center of this Holy Day.



St. Stephen's Day Sunday December 26

The Carol "Good King Wenceslaus" is associated with this feast day. For many of us that may be all that we know about the day. But there is so much more to the story of Stephen and his Martyrdom. In the gospel of Luke we hear that Stephen was "full of grace and power and did great wonders among the people." In the book of Acts we learn of his sincere faith, his love for those who persecuted him and his death by stoning (Acts 6 & 7). In the Western church St. Stephen's Day is the first of three red days that follow Christmas Day; St. Stephen, St. John, and the Holy Innocents. We will commemorate St. Stephen on December 26 with one liturgy at 10:30 AM.

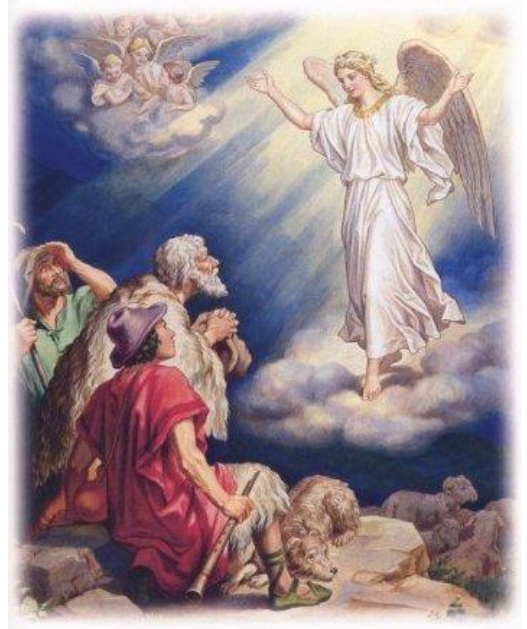
Angels Leave Us to Our Tasks

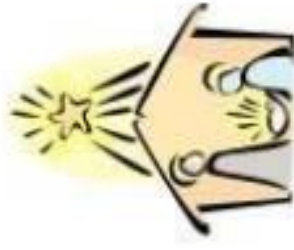
