WELCOME Thank you for being with us.

We are a Christian church within the Lutheran tradition (Evangelical Lutheran Church of America) and we welcome people of all Christian traditions as well as people of other faiths and people of little or no faith. Christian worship has been offered to God in this congregation for 186 years. By worshipping with us today, you become part of that living tradition.

Restrooms are available in the Good Shepherd Room (Springettsbury lobby) and the narthex (George St). Baby changing stations are provided in these restrooms as well as in the nursery.

Our Communion is "open" to all believers who trust that the Risen Christ is present for his people in the Holy Eucharist.

The Nursery is accessed through the front right double doors. The 10:30 AM liturgy is live-streamed into the Nursery. The audio portions of the service are provided at 8:00 AM.

Guidelines for Worship during the time of COVID-19

Entering and Leaving the Church:

Wearing a mask while in worship is optional, recommended or required based on the local percentage of infection. 5% or lower/Optional, Between 5% &10%/Recommended, 10% or higher/Required.

Offerings:

Monetary offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances to the nave prior to the service. You may also donate via our website at www.stpaulsyork.org

Communion Procedure:

1. Come to communion using the center aisle (about 8 adults per side).

2. Communion glasses are placed on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).

3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.

4. Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.

5. Extend your hands to receive the communion host.

6. Consume the communion host before you leave the chancel edge.

7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.

8. Consume the wine.

9.Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle. 10.Return to your pew using the side aisle.




PREFACE *The preface appropriate to the day is sung.*

THANKSGIVING

You are indeed holy, O God, the fountain of all holiness; you bring light from darkness, life from death, speech from silence. We worship you for our lives and for the world you give us. We praise you for the grace shown to Israel, your chosen, the people of your promise: the rescue from Egypt, the gift of the promised land, the memory of the fathers, the homecoming from exile, and the prophets' words that will not be in vain. 

Paul had a vision. The vision occurs early in his life and ministry. The vision brings clarity to his calling. It points him in a particular direction and opens him to new adventures. He has a vision to keep people from perishing.

"Come over to Macedonia and help us" pleads the man in Paul's vision. Generally you ask someone you know pretty well to help you. Or, out of desperation you are willing to ask anyone for help. I have never been certain if the man from Macedonia pleading knows the Apostle Paul or if the Apostle is a complete stranger to him. What I do know from the biblical text is that God, identified as the Holy Spirit and then a bit later on identified as the Spirit of Jesus, doesn't want Paul and his entourage going into certain areas of Asia. It is as though the pleading, the beckoning, is the work of the Holy Spirit clarifying God's desire for Paul to travel to a new land, the land we know as Europe, and the land from which many of our forbearers hail. Where Paul thought he should go to proclaim the resurrection news is thwarted, and it is thwarted by the Holy Spirit. This situation doesn't call a halt to the mission nor is the mission scrapped. It is simply redirected.

"Come over to Macedonia and help us." This is the vision of which Paul is the recipient. There is a man standing, pleading with Paul to enter into a new land and to provide what is clearly stated as much needed help. What Paul grasps from the vision is the clarity of conviction that God has called him and his companions to proclaim the good news in Macedonia, in a new land among new people.

Perhaps the man from Macedonia knew that he lived among a people without vision. Perhaps the man from Macedonia knew that without vision, he and all the people among whom he lived are perishing. And without delay the biblical text states, "We immediately tried to cross over to Macedonia. They set sail from Troas and took a straight course to Sam-o-thrace, the following day to Neapolis, and from there to Philippi, which is a leading city of the district of Macedonia and a Roman colony." There, they did it. They responded to the vision. They traveled a new direction. They crossed unfamiliar water. They entered into a land inhabited with people they did not know. And they took the good news message of God and God's love with them. This would be the content of the message that they would be proclaiming at every juncture, every opportunity that would arise. And along the way, they continued to gather for prayer, worship, and sought out places to proclaim the mighty acts of God.

A number of years ago the Social Ministry Committee was pursuing work in the neighborhood. We had established some reliable relationships and had participated in events that helped get us known, helped deliver some resources to neighbors in need, and through the work helped to communicate God's love in Christ. But for some reason phone calls and emails were not returned. This was perplexing at the time for Committee members. This was a sudden change. They were uncertain why their phone calls were not returned, why their emails went unanswered, and why people with whom they had once interacted were no longer responding. Then suddenly a new door opened. Jackson Elementary school was most willing to entertain members of the committee. The Social Ministry team traveled in a new direction, entered into a new building, met with people they did not know, but were convinced that God had called them to share the story of God's love through acts of kindness as neighbor. And while the vision may not have been as vividly pronounced as the one recorded in the book of Acts, they responded to

people pleading with us for help. Help with ingredients for breakfast for the children during the spring PSSA testing that particular year. Help with collecting books for the summer reading program so every child would have a book to read while school is in recess. Help with food for families suffering food insecurity. Help with coats and hats and gloves providing warmth and protection from winter weather. The Social Ministry Committee was being called in a new and different direction. This wasn't their original vision, but it sure seemed to be one where God was calling, opening doors. In ministry things don't always happen with such immediacy. But in this example things moved quickly.

In the first reading, the vision positions the Apostle Paul and his companions so that they are able to share the good news. It was a Sabbath day and they went to a place where they supposed people would be at prayer. There they encounter a group of women praying. Among them was a certain woman named Lydia. She was a worshiper of God. She was a dealer in purple cloth; she dealt with people of means, financial wealth, because purple cloth in Bible times was among the most expensive fabric and dye. That day when the women were at prayer, when Paul and his companions sat and talked with them, the Lord opened hearts to listen to the message of God's love in Christ Jesus. The word moved Lydia and her entire household to be baptized. She was numbered among the Lord's faithful.

This morning Molly Mae is welcomed into the Lord's family. She is numbered among the Lord's faithful. As she grows in years there will be opportunity for her to listen to the message of God's love in Christ Jesus. The word will, as it did that day for Lydia and as it does for us, open her heart to listen to the message; a message proclaimed by angels and apostles, by prophets and priests, by Sunday school teachers, catechists, and pastors. It is a message that sends us out, that opens hearts, transforms life, calling us to a new and radiant vision.

"Where there is no vision the people perish." Proverbs 29:8

¹⁷ "In the last days, God says, I will pour out my Spirit on all people.
Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your young men will see visions, your old men will dream dreams. Acts 2:17

I believe that the Lord God is calling us to share the word of hope and salvation in a land where people don't even know that they are perishing. The land is closer than you may suspect. It means of course that we will need to open ourselves to God in new and different ways. It means that we will need to position ourselves so that we speak God's word of love bringing peace into situations that are often complex and at times tumultuous. Knowing that on Sunday there is a group, who with regularity, gathers for prayer and sustains us in the mission. Here it is that the Lord opens hearts. Here it is that we listen eagerly to what is said so that new life, amended life, baptismal life springs forth. With opened hearts, attentive ears, and lives marked with the cross of Christ a new and radiant vision of our calling is carried out.

"Come over to Macedonia and help us." People are pleading for help, pleading for a word of life, and we are called to proclaim the good news. Amen.

FIRST READING: Acts 16:9-15

During the night Paul had a vision: there stood a man of Macedonia pleading with him and saying, "Come over to Macedonia and help us." ¹⁰When he had seen the vision, we immediately tried to cross over to Macedonia, being convinced that God had called us to proclaim the good news to them.

¹¹We set sail from Troas and took a straight course to Samothrace, the following day to Neapolis, ¹²and from there to Philippi, which is a leading city of the district of Macedonia and a Roman colony. We remained in this city for some days. ¹³On the sabbath day we went outside the gate by the river, where we supposed there was a place of prayer; and we sat down and spoke to the women who had gathered there. 14A certain woman named Lydia, a worshiper of God, was listening to us; she was from the city of Thyatira and a dealer in purple cloth. The Lord opened her heart to listen eagerly to what was said by Paul. ¹⁵When she and her household were baptized, she urged us, saying, "If you have judged me to be faithful to the Lord, come and stay at my home." And she prevailed upon us.

SECOND READING: Revelation 21:10, 22-22:5

And in the spirit [one of the angels] carried me away to a great, high mountain and showed me the holy city Jerusalem coming down out of heaven from God.

²²I saw no temple in the city, for its temple is the Lord God the Almighty and the Lamb. ²³And the city has no need of sun or moon to shine on it, for the glory of God is its light, and its lamp is the Lamb. ²⁴The nations will walk by its light, and the kings of the earth will bring their glory into it. ²⁵Its gates will never be shut by day—and there will be no night there. ²⁶People will bring into it the glory and the honor of the nations. ²⁷But nothing unclean will enter it, nor anyone who practices abomination or falsehood, but only those who are written in the Lamb's book of life.

^{22:1}Then the angel showed me the river of the water of life, bright as crystal, flowing from the throne of God and of the Lamb ²through the middle of the street of the city. On either side of the river is the tree of life with its twelve kinds of fruit, producing its fruit each month; and the leaves of the tree are for the healing of the nations. ³Nothing accursed will be found there any more. But the throne of God and of the Lamb will be in it, and his servants will worship him; ⁴they will see his face, and his name will be on their foreheads. ⁵And there will be no more night; they need no light of lamp or sun, for the Lord God will be their light, and they will reign forever and ever.

GOSPEL: John 14:23-29

Jesus answered [Judas (not Iscariot),] "Those who love me will keep my word, and my Father will love them, and we will come to them and make our home with them. ²⁴Whoever does not love me does not keep my words; and the word that you hear is not mine, but is from the Father who sent me.

²⁵"I have said these things to you while I am still with you. ²⁶But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you. ²⁷Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid. ²⁸You heard me say to you, 'I am going away, and I am coming to you.' If you loved me, you would rejoice that I am going to the Father, because the Father is greater than I. ²⁹And now I have told you this before it occurs, so that when it does occur, you may believe."
