Guidelines for Worship during the time of COVID-19

Entering and Leaving the Church:

Wearing a mask while in worship is optional, recommended or required based on the local percentage of infection.

Offerings:

Monetary offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances to the nave prior to the service. You may also donate via our website at www.stpaulsyork.org

Communion Procedure:

1. Come to communion using the center aisle (about 8 adults per side).

2. Communion glasses are placed on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).

3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.

4. Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.

5. Extend your hands to receive the communion host.

6. Consume the communion host before you leave the chancel edge.

7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.

8. Consume the wine.

9.Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle. 10.Return to your pew using the side aisle.

"The word has gone out and it will not return empty" proclaimed the Prophet Isaiah. The Psalmist poetically penned "Their word has gone out through all the earth and their works to the end of the world." Paul corresponding to Rome "Their voice has gone out into all the earth." Jesus in the gospel of John "My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me."

In the early days of the church there were lots of great challenges. But one thing certainly aided in the spread of the good news of Christ Jesus and it had to do with the word that was communicated about life in the community of faith; what was going on, healing, the power of prayer, the stories of hope, and the conviction that "people of the way" were really on the way, they were following. Not plateauing, not stagnating, not slipping back into former ways of sin, death, and evil, but on the way to new life in Christ; new relationships, new possibilities, new ways to view the world and relate to their neighbors.

Every year the word would go out about the Brown's annual Christmas party. It was usually held between December 26 and January 6. "Spread the word," Marge said. And they did. Once Marge and Ed set the date and time for the party, they simply went in to town, at the super market, the library, the barber shop, the wine and spirits store, and a few stops around the university; telling people to "spread the word." And the word went out! All they had left to do was make the preparations to receive all those who heard and who would respond to the word that went out! Ed did the exterior decorating stringing strand after strand of lights and most of the other preparations were left to Marge. To this day those were some of the most memorable of parties.

There weren't any RSVP cards and this was long before the convenience of text messages; so you never knew for certain who would be in attendance. There were some regulars you could always count on. And there were others who simply heard the word, and came to the party. Over the years the list of attendees varied: educators, paleontologists, a retired Dean of Julliard, librarian, plumber, nurses, horticulturist, pathologist, bookstore proprietor, restaurateur, musicians, students, local judge, and loads of clergy, Ed was a retired Lutheran pastor. The party was always a huge success measured by people gathering for a good time, sharing in Christmas cheer, reflecting on the past and hoping for the future. Of course the entire thing hinged on that word, the word that went out. Spread the word they would say!

In the Acts text we hear about the word going out. The word has to do with a woman of great faith, Tabitha or in Greek, Dorcas. And the word was about her good works. Now that is an example for us. Spread a good word about another's works. Today we are more likely of spreading a word that makes us look good rather than a word that builds someone else up. And we have plenty of examples of people spreading words that are simply hateful, deceitful, outright lies. We can't assume that our contemporaries know anything at all about the Ten Commandments, especially the one about *bearing false witness*, which makes all of this more challenging. But in those early days in the life of the church when people were craving new rela-

tionships, longing for new possibilities, desiring new ways to view the world and relate to their neighbors, the word spread regarding her good works. She produced beautiful garments. Her acts of charity and love were noted. The faith community would not let her die. Her witness to the resurrected Lord had an effect on the persons with whom she came into contact.

Not much is really known about Dorcas. Her name throughout the centuries has become synonymous with Christian women's societies. Luke thought her to be important enough to include when he was writing what we know as the book of Acts. And while we may puzzle over Peter's ability to raise her from death to life, a truly amazing thing is that this story has endured time. Her witness to Christ Jesus gave her life meaning and purpose. It made a difference in her community. The residents remembered her, valued her and her devotion to good works and acts of charity.

The Greek name Dorcas literally means gazelle. Gazelles are creatures we know from the continent of Africa; nimble, swift, beautiful, graceful running and galloping at high speeds. They have elegant markings on their hide, long vertical horns and faces sporting large dark eyes. I think that Dorcas worked at such a fast pace that she indeed lived up to her name. She busied herself, not trivially with things that benefited her, but with things that bore witness to the Easter Event: to resurrection, new life, forgiveness of sins, and future hope. She didn't set out to change the world, **just her neighborhood** by caring for widows, making clothing, doing good in the sense of what we know as the Golden Rule.

Throughout our 186 year history there have been men and women who typify the Christian witness, who in some way or another are remembered, not because they set out to be, but because in their living they bore witness to the Easter Event. Many such names are mentioned in conversation, listed in captions under assorted photographs, a few sentences jotted down in anniversary booklets, or perhaps inscribed on a utilitarian item used to carry out Gospel ministry; a flagon holding communion wine, the chancel cross, the bell 100 feet up in the steeple. These things help to inform us as faithful followers of Christ Jesus and of the power of the Easter event.

Today, we are not here only to recall the faithful acts of time past: of faithful women like Dorcas, and of faithful parishioners in the chronicles of St. Paul's. We are here to celebrate the faithfulness of our current community in this generation. We are here because we crave new relationship, long for new possibilities, desire new ways to view the world and relate to neighbors. Through our host, Christ Jesus, we are invited into new life, forgiven, strengthened, renewed.

"Spread the word," she said. And they did. The word went out. Peter heard their request and came to their aid. And the word spread, not only about the resuscitation of life for Dorcas, but for the resuscitation of life for all people given the gift of the Holy Spirit, the breath of God being breathed into, enveloping and empowering people, as the Bible records it, "of every tribe and nation." And the word went out. The word of God, opening new avenues for mission and witness, creating opportunities from which good works flow, extending charity, providing for those in need, offering life lived in the joy of Easter. "Spread the Word," she said. And they did. Amen.

Fourth Sunday of Easter

FIRST READING: Acts 9:36-43

Now in Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and acts of charity. 37At that time she became ill and died. When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. ³⁸Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, "Please come to us without delay." 39So Peter got up and went with them; and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. 40Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, "Tabitha, get up." Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. 41He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. 42 This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. ⁴³Meanwhile he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.

Psalm 23

SECOND READING: Revelation 7:9-17

After this I looked, and there was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, robed in white, with palm branches in their hands. ¹⁰They cried out in a loud voice, saying,

"Salvation belongs to our God

who is seated on the throne,

and to the Lamb!"

¹¹And all the angels stood around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshiped God, ¹²singing,

"Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honor and power and might be to our God forever and ever! Amen." ¹³Then one of the elders addressed me, saying, "Who are these, robed in white, and where have they come from?" ¹⁴I said to him, "Sir, you are the one that knows." Then he said to me, "These are they who have come out of the great ordeal; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb.

¹⁵For this reason they are before the throne of God,

and worship him day and night within his temple,

and the one who is seated on the throne will shelter them.

¹⁶They will hunger no more, and thirst no more;

the sun will not strike them,

nor any scorching heat;

¹⁷for the Lamb at the center of the throne will be their shepherd,

- and he will guide them to springs of the water of life,
- and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes."

GOSPEL: John 10:22-30

At that time the festival of the Dedication took place in Jerusalem. It was winter, 23 and Jesus was walking in the temple, in the portico of Solomon. ²⁴So the Jews gathered around him and said to him, "How long will you keep us in suspense? If you are the Messiah, tell us plainly." 25 Jesus answered, "I have told you, and you do not believe. The works that I do in my Father's name testify to me; ²⁶but you do not believe, because you do not belong to my sheep. ²⁷My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me. ²⁸I give them eternal life, and they will never perish. No one will snatch them out of my hand. 29 What my Father has given me is greater than all else, and no one can snatch it out of the Father's hand. ³⁰The Father and I are one."
