**The Nursery** is accessed through the front right double doors. The 9:15 AM liturgy is live-streamed into the Nursery.

# Guidelines for Worship during the time of COVID-19

### Entering and Leaving the Church:

Wearing a mask while in worship is optional, recommended or required based on the local percentage of infection. 5% or lower/Optional, Between 5% &10%/Recommended, 10% or higher/Required. The instruction will be posted on the entry doors. Please be sure to bring a mask in the event of required/recommended masking.

#### **Offerings:**

Monetary offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances to the nave prior to the service or immediately following the service. You may also donate via our website at www.stpaulsyork.org

### **Communion Procedure:**

1. Come to communion using the center aisle (about 8 adults per side).

2. Communion glasses are placed on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).

3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.

4. Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.

5. Extend your hands to receive the communion host.

6. Consume the communion host before you leave the chancel edge.

7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.

8. Consume the wine.

9. Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle.

10.Return to your pew using the side aisle.

Deuteronomy 30:9-14

Colossians 1:1-14

Luke 10:25-37

It's good to be back. I appreciated all of the calls, texts, and emails welcoming me back into the Christian fellowship of St. Paul's. It was good to have time away, time to read and paint and reflect and spend time with my family. However it is rather ironic that on the first Sunday that I return the first reading from Deuteronomy is a portion of Moses' rather lengthy good bye speech. I say hello and he says goodbye! He is not going to be crossing over the Jordan River into the land of Canna. He is reflecting on their 40 year plus time together and summarizing the important things that his faith community needs to know and remember as they make their way into a new and extremely diverse community. Moses is not providing them with numerical lists of things to post but rather sharing stories about communal life together. The big take away this morning is about the command of the Lord. It's not too hard he says. It's not too far away. You don't have to climb up to heaven or cross to the other side of the sea. *"The word is very near you; it is in your mouth and in your heart for you to observe."* 

Moses is about advancing the mission. He has provided leadership for over 40 years. He wants God's people to move into a diverse new land remembering whose they are and that they are to be "a blessing" to others. Being "a blessing" flows out of their turning to the Lord God with all of their heart and soul. This language gets picked up in the gospel reading.

In the gospel narrative we encounter Jesus advancing mission on his way to Jerusalem. We are from Luke's point of view reaching a high point in the narrative. He has passed by the region of Samaria. The people there were not receptive to him. Unwelcoming to the extent that James and John want to bring down fire upon them, but Jesus scolded them! And along the way Jesus is now talking with his followers, the ones he sent out to heal and cast out demons, the ones who were amazed at what they were able to do in his name.

While Jesus is talking to them about faithfulness to God, he is interrupted. And he is interrupted by a lawyer. Who would think that a lawyer would interrupt a private conversation in order to get his own question answered? This is behavior more suitable to toddlers and elementary school children. This raises serious questions about who is hanging around with Jesus and his disciples. But the interruption doesn't seem to change the conversation. In some ways it advances the story. The 70 were rejoicing in their mission. They were over joyed with their witness. They were sharing what they had learned and experienced. The lawyer seemed to know about faithfulness too.

In my line of work you might be surprised to learn that there are many interruptions. This week sermon writing day was interrupted with a request for a Pennsylvania ID, followed by a request for information regarding the Garden of Memory, arrangements for home communion calls, the most recent proof of the Sunday worship folder, a reminder that the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter statements and letter needs to be prepared, the launching of the newly designed and updated preschool website, and a few welcome back greetings interspersed for good measure. Each one was important in its own way. They each had something to do with life. They just seemed to be somewhat more subtle than the interruption that Jesus experienced that day on his way to Jerusalem.

The interruption; "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" What is written in the law asked Jesus. "What do you read there," he inquires; and the legal expert then summarizes the law

"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." The very thing that Moses wanted members of his faith community to remember! And this one who interrupts, the lawyer, is greeted with "you have given the right answer; do this, and you will live."

"Do this" says Jesus and you will live. "Do this," the foreshadowing of the very words that he speaks when gathered with his followers that night in the upper room when he blesses bread and wine. And the very words he speaks to us this morning; "do this."

The interruption allows for a story to be told. A message about love for neighbor that moves earlier words of Jesus, "love your enemies," from the sermon on the plain, moves them into a heightened reality. While the lawyer wants Jesus to clarify who is his neighbor, (who are the ones he has to love and who are the ones he can skip over) Jesus tells a story that leaves the listener with clarity, NEIGHBOR LOVE knows no boundaries. There are no legal loop holes.

Luke doesn't document what the lawyer does. But what we know is that encounters with Jesus have a way of destabilizing our world views, and the ways in which we operate. We are left, like the lawyer in the story, challenged to embrace a new world, a new realm of God made known through Jesus' ministry; a ministry of mercy. And we carry out this ministry in a diverse community and world.

"The one who showed him mercy" that was the answer reported that day. The question posed by Jesus, "Which of these three; the priest, the Levite, the Samaritan, do you think was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" The one who showed him mercy, the one doing mercy, the one who did mercy to him. Jesus says "Go and do likewise."

The Congregation council historically includes on its summer retreat agenda some really important aspects of our life together in Christ. Things you might say that are vital to our life together as a faith community. The discussion on these items, as I reflected on it, often centers on the command of Christ to "do this" to do mercy and in the "doing of it" the doing of mercy gathering others to join in the mission, helping us to live more fully into the life given to us. We are encouraged by President Tristan to share some of the amazing things that we have been permitted to do in the name of the Resurrected One (similar to the return of the 70). Such active mercy, the "do this" that Jesus commands, advances the mission of our faith community.

Today our lives are interrupted by Christ's command to "do this." We don't talk much about doing mercy. But we know that the merciful are blessed by God. Moses wanted his faith community to remember to be a blessing, do things that bless, remember the word is near. That alone should move us along a different trajectory from the diverse community and world around us. We are not always attentive to God's word. We state that in the brief words of our weekly confession. We aren't always listening like our life depends on it. Christ is calling to us to do mercy, to love neighbor, to experience the life he created for us through his own suffering, death and resurrection because the time is right for NEIGHBOR LOVE! Do this. Do mercy. Amen.

#### Sunday, July 10, 2022

#### FIRST READING: Deuteronomy 30:9-14

The LORD your God will make you abundantly prosperous in all your undertakings, in the fruit of your body, in the fruit of your livestock, and in the fruit of your soil. For the LORD will again take delight in prospering you, just as he delighted in prospering your ancestors, <sup>10</sup>when you obey the LORD your God by observing his commandments and decrees that are written in this book of the law, because you turn to the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul.

<sup>11</sup>Surely, this commandment that I am commanding you today is not too hard for you, nor is it too far away. <sup>12</sup>It is not in heaven, that you should say, "Who will go up to heaven for us, and get it for us so that we may hear it and observe it?" 13 Neither is it beyond the sea, that you should say, "Who will cross to the other side of the sea for us, and get it for us so that we may hear it and observe it?" 14 No, the word is very near to you; it is in your mouth and in your heart for you to observe.

#### SECOND READING: Colossians 1:1-14

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, and Timothy our brother,

<sup>2</sup>To the saints and faithful brothers and sisters in Christ in Colossae:

Grace to you and peace from God our Father.

<sup>3</sup>In our prayers for you we always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, <sup>4</sup> for we have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love that you have for all the saints, 5because of the hope laid up for you in heaven. You have heard of this hope before in the word of the truth, the gospel <sup>6</sup>that has come to you. Just as it is bearing fruit and growing in the whole world, so it has been bearing fruit among vourselves from the day you heard it and truly comprehended the grace of God. 7This you learned from Epaphras, our beloved fellow servant. He is a faithful minister of Christ on your behalf, 8 and he has made known to us your love in the Spirit.

<sup>9</sup>For this reason, since the day we heard it, we have not ceased praying for you and asking that you may be filled with the knowledge of God's will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, <sup>10</sup>so that you may lead lives worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him, as you bear fruit in every good work and as you grow in the knowledge of God. 11 May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power, and may you be prepared to endure everything with patience, while joyfully 12 giving thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light. <sup>13</sup>He has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, <sup>14</sup>in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.

#### GOSPEL: Luke 10:25-37

Just then a lawyer stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he said, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" <sup>26</sup>He said to him, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?" 27He answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." 28And he said to him, "You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live."

<sup>29</sup>But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" 30 Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. <sup>31</sup>Now by chance a priest was going down that road; and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. <sup>32</sup>So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. <sup>33</sup>But a Samaritan while traveling came near him; and when he saw him, he was moved with pity. <sup>34</sup>He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. <sup>35</sup>The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, 'Take care of him; and when I come back, I will repay you whatever more you spend.' <sup>36</sup>Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" <sup>37</sup>He said, "The one who showed him mercy." Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."
