Entering and Leaving the Church:

Communion Procedure:

1. Come to communion using the center aisle (about 8 adults per side).

2. Communion glasses are placed on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).

3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.

4. Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.

5. Extend your hands to receive the communion host.

6. Consume the communion host before you leave the chancel edge.

7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.

8. Consume the wine.

9. Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle.

10.Return to your pew using the side aisle.

Entertaining is an art form. A previous generation seems have been far better at laying a table, preparing a menu, and gathering guests in rooms designated with the sole purpose for dining. My seminary liturgics professor Dr. Brown and his wife Marge were part of that generation. They were among those who were inspired by Julia Childs, and cookbooks that moved beyond Fanny Farmer.

Brown as everyone called him headed the division for worship in the former Lutheran Church in America. At that time, nearly half a century ago, he was associated with global liturgical and theological scholars. On the Lutheran side names of leading contributors were; Ralph VanLoon, Charles Anders, S. Anita Stauffer, and a young new comer, Gordon Laithrop. And among the Anglican Communion there were names like; Jaspers, Geoffrey Wainright and Cannon Gray who was at the time in charge of Westminster Abby. Brown brought them to speak and present papers for students at Susquehanna University and for gatherings of ecumenical clergy. And with every presentation and speaking engagement each one of the presenters ended up at the Brown's home for a dinner party in their honor. Marge cooked.

It was my friend Marge, when I was young and single, who taught me to entertain simply. She had mastered the art of preparing what she called one pot meals. She calculated the preparation and timing of an evening's dinner party so that she maximized her time with the guests. She didn't want to miss out on any of the conversations. In those days she was all about advancing the place of women in the church. If she wasn't present to press the conversation, well her point of view might go unheard.

Her outline for entertaining; start with a hearty cheese board and drinks, make a mixed green salad in advance adding dressing at the last minute, accompany it with crusty European style bread wrapped in a damp towel and popped in the oven to warm, and prepare an entree in a large cast iron enameled pot. That way, she instructed me, you can spend most of the time in the same room with your guests.

It was shortly after that that I added to by wish list an eight quart Le Crueset pot!

That day in Bethany when Jesus came to the home of Mary and Martha, they could have benefitted from a bit of Marge's entertaining outline and maybe even an eight quart Le Cruset pot! Martha wouldn't have spent the bulk of the time in the kitchen preparing. She may have spent more time listening to Jesus and would have had more time with her sister Mary in the presence of their Lord.

But we know how the story really unfolds with Mary not giving much help to her sister Martha. Mary had positioned herself in the living room, sitting on the footstool right beside Jesus. The biblical witness doesn't give any evidence that there was a cheese board. But the narrative does confirm that Mary was listening, she was listening to everything Jesus said. She was feasting on his word.

And when Martha came out of the sweltering hot kitchen thinking that she could leverage a little help whipping up dinner, well she was stopped in her tracks when the Lord himself responded to her plea for assistance "Martha, Martha," he said "you are worried and distracted by many things; there is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better portion which will not be taken away from her." The better portion! Ah, so now I know where my friend Marge learned of the importance of being present in the room with the guest, with the one presenting, challenging, causing folks to think and think again. She gained her entertaining knowledge from the gospel of Luke, from this very story of Jesus and the exchange with Martha.

Jesus' remark to Martha about portion has nothing to do with what is on the plate, how much gets ladled out of the Le Crueset pot, the size of the slice of pie, the amount of berries heaped on the scoop of ice cream. Here portion has to do with what is selected. The portion that is needed is the Word himself, Jesus. He alone is what will save the day, save the household, save the people, save the nation, save the world, save you and me. He is the one that provides what is needed. He gives himself so that no one need perish. He saves us.

He provides the feast today his word proclaimed and his body broken and given to feed us, sustaining us for our work, nurturing us for lives of devotion and service. He wants us sitting on the footstool listening and in the kitchen feeding but not anxiously, frantically, but lovingly as a way to provide hospitality. He is the better portion. But how many of us anxiously remove ourselves from his presence thinking that something else is of greater importance?

Last week we encountered Jesus asking a question of the lawyer "Who was neighbor to the man who fell among robbers?" The lawyer responded "The one who did mercy, the one who showed mercy, the one who did mercy to him."

The question for us this morning; "What portion are you seeking?" Have you picked out the portion that will fill you? Have you selected the portion that is most tempting? Perhaps the portion that is most profitable? Or have you cleverly figured out the portion that is least demanding? How little can I do? Jesus calls us by name today. Perhaps saying it twice like "Martha, Martha" in order to get our attention. He fills our house with his presence and shares freely his Word of life. His desire is that we choose the better portion, not the one that is most appealing, or most lucrative, or least challenging or the one that smacks of tokenism. The better portion is Jesus. His desire is that we respond to his call ordering our days and our deeds feasting on his Word. He desires us to listen to him. With such listening comes a redirecting of our lives; our words and actions.

I was the recipient of many invitations to dinner at the Brown's. Those dinner parties rank among my most vivid memories. I remember, listening to the guest of honor, engaging in conversation, gleaning ideas that advanced parish ministry, enjoyed the assortment of cheese laid out on the board, the lid being lifted from the giant Le Crueset pot revealing the evenings' dinner selection, but mostly the sense of welcome, acceptance, generosity and love.

Today the table is set and the meal prepared. We receive an invitation to the Lord's Holy Supper. Here it is that our loving God, made known to us in Christ Jesus, welcomes us, accepts us, and generously gives himself for us in love so that we have the better portion, so that we have life. Amen.

FIRST READING: Genesis 18:1-10a

The LORD appeared to Abraham by the oaks of Mamre, as he sat at the entrance of his tent in the heat of the day. ²He looked up and saw three men standing near him. When he saw them, he ran from the tent entrance to meet them, and bowed down to the ground. ³He said, "My lord, if I find favor with you, do not pass by your servant. ⁴Let a little water be brought, and wash your feet, and rest yourselves under the tree. ⁵Let me bring a little bread, that you may refresh yourselves, and after that you may pass on-since you have come to your servant." So they said, "Do as you have said." 6And Abraham hastened into the tent to Sarah, and said, "Make ready quickly three measures of choice flour, knead it, and make cakes." ⁷Abraham ran to the herd, and took a calf, tender and good, and gave it to the servant, who hastened to prepare it. 8 Then he took curds and milk and the calf that he had prepared, and set it before them; and he stood by them under the tree while they ate.

²⁴I am now rejoicing in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I am completing what is lacking in Christ's afflictions for the sake of his body, that is, the church. ²⁵I became its servant according to God's commission that was given to me for you, to make the word of God fully known, ²⁶the mystery that has been hidden throughout the ages and generations but has now been revealed to his saints. ²⁷To them God chose to make known how great among the Gentiles are the riches of the glory of this mystery, which is Christ in you, the hope of glory. ²⁸It is he whom we proclaim, warning everyone and teaching everyone in all wisdom, so that we may present everyone mature in Christ.

Now as [Jesus and his disciples] went on their way, he entered a certain village, where a woman named Martha welcomed him into her home. ³⁹She had a sister named Mary, who sat at the Lord's feet and listened to what he was saying. ⁴⁰But Martha was distracted by her many tasks; so she came to him and asked, "Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me to do all the work by myself? Tell her then to help me." ⁴¹But the Lord answered her, "Martha, Martha, you are worried and distracted by many things; ⁴²there is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part, which will not be taken away from her."
