#### Guidelines for Worship during the time of COVID-19

#### **Entering and Leaving the Church:**

Wearing a mask while in worship is optional, recommended or required based on the local percentage of infection. 5% or lower/Optional, Between 5% &10%/Recommended, 10% or higher/Required. The instruction will be posted on the entry doors. Please be sure to bring a mask in the event of required/recommended masking. Disposable masks are available at the entrance to the church nave.

# Offerings:

Monetary offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances to the nave prior to the service or immediately following the service. You may also donate via our website at www.stpaulsyork.org

#### **Communion Procedure:**

- 1. Come to communion using the center aisle (about 10 adults per side).
- 2. Communion glasses are placed on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).
- 3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.
- 4. Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.
- 5. Extend your hands to receive the communion host.
- 6. Consume the communion host before you leave the chancel edge.
- 7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.
- 8. Consume the wine.
- 9. Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle.
- 10. Return to your pew using the side aisle.



# receive our prayer.



Proper 13, C, 2022 Ecclesiastes 1:2, 12-14; 2:18-23 Colossians 3:1-11 Luke 12:13-21 "Daddy," she would say. "Tell me a Comet and Amelia story."

When our daughter was very young, a toddler, highly verbal, part of her bed time ritual was hearing stories. Sometimes we read stories, books that are now well worn and that became staples at the conclusion of a day. And sometimes I made up stories for her about a beloved horse named Comet. Comet, the imaginary horse, lived in our stable, received hay from the barn, loved to eat crunch orange carrots from the garden, and sweet juicy red apples from the orchard.

But most of the stories involved a moon lit ride across fields and meadows, meandering through paths in woods, drinking cool refreshing water from the edge of the lake, the lake that mirrored the night sky's constellations and revealed the phases of the moon in reflective light. These stories I discovered relieved childhood anxiety and calmed fears. They brought solace and permitted entry into much needed rest for a toddler and for a parent. Most nights the stories of Comet the horse followed a familiar pattern, drawing from the day's events and engaging themes of peace, relaxation, cooperation, comfort, safety, trust, and rest.

"Teacher," a person interrupted. "Tell my brother to divide the family inheritance with me."

When someone in the crowd petitioned Jesus to intervene in a conflict over property inheritance Jesus draws from the moment and from earlier conversations in the day. Jesus tells a story. He doesn't draw from the well-worn books of the law. "The land of a rich man produced abundantly. And he thought to himself, 'what should I do, for I have no place to store my crops?' Then he said, 'I will do this: I will pull down my barns and build larger ones, and there I will store all my grain and my goods. And I will say to my soul, Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry.' But God said to him, 'You fool!' This very night your life is being demanded of you. And the things you have prepared, whose will they be?"

Needless to say, the person who interrupted Jesus, the teacher, didn't get what he asked for. He didn't get the arbitration. Instead he heard a story. The story certainly wasn't a Comet and Amelia story. This story drew from the day's events, engaged themes, but they weren't themes of peace, relaxation, cooperation, comfort, safety, trust, rest. This story confronted the person interrupting Jesus with **the folly of preoccupation with accumulated wealth**, with the self-centeredness of "my crops, my barns, my goods" and the lack of concern for the community and lack of concern for God. The rich man in the story is rich in every way except rich toward God. This is a story about a rich man being sent empty away. This is a theme that we hear throughout the gospel of Luke. We heard it first from Jesus' mother, Mary, as she sang about the child in her womb; the child that would change everything, the child that in adulthood speaks words to calm anxiety and fear, the child that desires lasting peace, comfort, safety, rest.

We often sing Mary's Song using the words "God has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty" (Luke 1:53). When the biblical narrative presents rich men and wealthy people, I quickly transfer my thoughts to the likes of Warren Buffet, Jeff Bezos, and Elon Musk. This is at least one time when I want to step out of the lime light and take a seat with the hungry, those filled with good things. Who among us wants to be sent away empty? So I quickly step aside knowing that my crops and barns and goods pale in comparison to the others who are far wealthier. We exist in a culture that equates self-worth, value, acceptance, and even friendship on the possessions we obtain; our address, occupation, clothing labels and vehicle. And yet this morning we are told a story. We are given important insight about being rich toward God.

Last week we heard about God's desire for us to be in prayer; ask, search, knock. This

morning we hear about God's desire for us to be in a relationship marked by the generous sharing of one's wealth with others in need. Stewardship appeals have historically been a way to move Christian people from selfish accumulation to generous giving. They keep us from hording and from building bigger barns to generosity and building bigger hearts. This fall we will be returning to our annual practice of a stewardship appeal during the month of October. It will be linked to our need for reform, reformation in our lives as we consider God's abundant generosity towards us in Christ Jesus, and the need to share our time, ability, and financial resources with others in need. At St. Paul's we recognize the ongoing needs of others; for the hungry in the community (Food Pantry), and the hungry in the world (Lutheran World Hunger Appeal), our Lenten appeal this year was for Domestic Disaster Relief providing assistance for those who experienced the devastating effects of a hurricane. There is an appeal to help with the construction costs associated with the expansion of Mpoguso Lutheran Church in Tanzania, our sister congregation, and we have an appeal for Ukraine to assist those in need because of the aggression and war brought upon them. We are helping orphans, widows, refugees, providing for resettlement, securing food, water, and health care, all of which is provided through the Church's ELCA Disaster Relief and Lutheran World Federation partnerships.

If one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions, then of what does it consist? Last Tuesday during the Christian Education Committee meeting we made plans to welcome everyone back for the opening of the education year on September 11. We are working to get the message out for all to return. Return to God. Return to community. Return to faith formation. Return, as we learned last week, to generous prayer and as we heard today a return to generous giving. Our lives consist of generosity toward God through prayer and generosity toward those in need through giving. This is the richness that Jesus was on about that day when he told a story about a man building bigger barns.

Each Sunday we hear the story of how God gives generously to us; in confession's words of absolution and communion's tangible word of grace, we hear that our sins are forgiven and that we are made whole. We hear the story of God's redeeming love in Christ Jesus, his suffering and death on the cross and the joy we anticipate celebrating with Easter's resurrection. The story keeps us wrapped in God's generosity. This morning we are invited into a story. The story is precipitated by an interruption by someone who has a personal desire to have Jesus do something for him. Jesus tells a story that changes things. His story implicitly asks the man to do something for others and by so doing is rich toward God.

Opportunities for us to tell stories abound, and not just at bed time for tired children. Jesus tells stories drawing us closer to God. Today we hear that life is not driven by desperate moves to acquire and accumulate, building bigger barns, but life is driven through generous sharing with others in need.

"Daddy," she would say. "Tell me a Comet and Amelia story."

Once upon a time there was a horse named Comet and a little girl who loved to go on moon light rides. She took baskets of crunch orange carrots from her garden and juicy red apples from the trees in her orchard and bundled them up in burlap sacks tied up tightly with twine. Then she carried the heavy bundles to the stable, saddled up Comet, filled the pack with the burlap bundles and off they would go, across fields and meadows in the moon light until they reached the edge of a village and the glowing street lamp of a town. There she would dismount from Comet and leave burlap bundles of carrots and apples at the door steps of people who didn't have a garden, or a fruit tree, or a barn with hay, or even a stable to keep a horse. Amen.

# FIRST READING: Ecclesiastes 1:2, 12-14; 2:18-23

Vanity of vanities, says the Teacher, vanity of vanities! All is vanity.

<sup>12</sup>I, the Teacher, when king over Israel in Jerusalem, <sup>13</sup>applied my mind to seek and to search out by wisdom all that is done under heaven; it is an unhappy business that God has given to human beings to be busy with. <sup>14</sup>I saw all the deeds that are done under the sun; and see, all is vanity and a chasing after wind.

2:18 I hated all my toil in which I had toiled under the sun, seeing that I must leave it to those who come after me 19-and who knows whether they will be wise or foolish? Yet they will be master of all for which I toiled and used my wisdom under the sun. This also is vanity. 20 So I turned and gave my heart up to despair concerning all the toil of my labors under the sun, 21 because sometimes one who has toiled with wisdom and knowledge and skill must leave all to be enjoyed by another who did not toil for it. This also is vanity and a great evil. 22 What do mortals get from all the toil and strain with which they toil under the sun? 23 For all their days are full of pain, and their work is a vexation; even at night their minds do not rest. This also is vanity.

# Psalm 49:1-12

# SECOND READING: Colossians 3:1-11

So if you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. <sup>2</sup>Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth, <sup>3</sup> for you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. <sup>4</sup>When Christ who is your life is revealed, then you also will be revealed with him in glory.

<sup>5</sup>Put to death, therefore, whatever in you is earthly: fornication, impurity, passion, evil desire, and greed (which is idolatry). 6On account of these the wrath of God is coming on those who are disobedient. 7These are the ways you also once followed, when you were living that life. 8But now you must get rid of all such things-anger, wrath, malice, slander, and abusive language from your mouth. 9Do not lie to one another, seeing that you have stripped off the old self with its practices 10 and have clothed yourselves with the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge according to the image of its creator. 11In that renewal there is no longer Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave and free; but Christ is all and in all!

# GOSPEL: Luke 12:13-21

Someone in the crowd said to [Jesus], "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the family inheritance with me." 14But he said to him, "Friend, who set me to be a judge or arbitrator over you?" 15And he said to them, "Take care! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; for one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions." <sup>16</sup>Then he told them a parable: "The land of a rich man produced abundantly. <sup>17</sup>And he thought to himself, 'What should I do, for I have no place to store my crops?' 18Then he said, 'I will do this: I will pull down my barns and build larger ones, and there I will store all my grain and my goods. 19 And I will say to my soul, Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry.' 20 But God said to him, 'You fool! This very night your life is being demanded of you. And the things you have prepared, whose will they be?' <sup>21</sup>So it is with those who store up treasures for themselves but are not rich toward God."
