Entering and Leaving the Church:

Please be sure to bring a mask in the event of required/recommended masking. Disposable masks are available at the entrance to the church nave.

Monetary offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances to the nave prior to the service. You may also donate via our website at www.stpaulsyork.org

Communion Procedure:

1. Come to communion using the center aisle (about 10 adults per side).

2. Communion glasses are placed on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).

3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.

4. Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.

5. Extend your hands to receive the communion host.

6. Consume the communion host before you leave the chancel edge.

7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.

8. Consume the wine before you leave the chancel edge.

9. Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle.

10.Return to your pew using the side aisle.

Sunday school classes - for all ages begin on September 18th at 9:15 AM. Primary, Confirmation and High School students meet on the upper level. An adult class will be held in Christ Hall on the main level.

Seating charts are always a challenge, especially for special occasions like weddings. Putting the right people together can make for a successful event. And of course putting the wrong people together can derail the desired goal. Through years of invitations to weddings, I have a pretty good idea how this sort of thing works. Often it seems that I am seated at the table with either the family religious fanatic or the troubling out of town relative. The perceived notion, I suppose, is that who better to defuse the philosophical beliefs of the family religious zealot or the perplexing attitudes of the cracked uncle visiting from out of state than the pastor! Sometimes I imagine the seating at a wedding to be determined by a quick game of musical chairs. Imagine what fun the band members would have watching the guests scramble for the best seats or at least a place at a table with a friend!

When Jesus noticed how folks were choosing the prime seats at a local event, he began to tell a parable. It's a parable after all; it's not a manual for party etiquette. And in the telling of the story Jesus highlights a few things for us to ponder. How is it that we select seats? With whom do we wish to be seated? Why is it that we lean chairs against tables and figure out how to reserve seats at fellowship events, congregation dinners, and church suppers? Mostly our desire is to sit with people we know, people we like, people with whom we share similar interests, or in some situations people with whom we are biologically related! Who really does want to sit with the religious zealot or the crazed uncle? Just how will this parable of Jesus be heard among us? Will the parable Jesus told that day when people were jockeying for seats of honor inform us, open us, allow us to depart from our old ways of interaction to new ones shared in the parable Jesus tells?

The gospel of Luke records mealtimes. Lots of meals are mentioned. Today's gospel reading is one of many recorded. They include a variety of hosts and guests; Pharisees, women, disciples, Samaritans, Apostles, and yes even friends.

Story #1 - A Pharisee invites Jesus to dinner – woman, sinner, alabaster jar of ointment, enters and pours the ointment on his feet and dries them with her hair. Accusation - "If he was a prophet He would have known what kind of woman she was."

Story #2- The disciples, after a long day of ministry training along the lake where the crowds had reached over 5,000, suggested to Jesus, "Send them away, so that they may go into the surrounding villages and countryside, to lodge and get provisions." Jesus said "You give them something to east." "We have only five loaves and two fish" bemoaned the disciples. Jesus collect the minuscule lunch, gathered, blessed broke and distributed the bread and fish. Twelve baskets of broken pieces were left over after 5,000 ate and were filled.

Story #3 - A Samaritan found a man beaten by robbers and left for dead along the road. The Samaritan bandaged him, took him to the inn, paid the innkeeper "Take care of him; and when I come back, I will repay you whatever more you spend." Feed him.

Story #4 - Another Pharisee invites Jesus to dinner. Jesus went in and took his place at the table. He did not wash before dinner. The Pharisee commented on his lack of ritual washing. Jesus responded "Now you clean the outside of the cup and of the dish, but inside you are full of greed and wickedness. Fools! Did not the one who made the outside make the inside also? So

give for alms those things that are within; and see, everything will be clean for you." He went on saying "you tithe mint and rue and herbs of all kinds, and neglect justice and the love of God; it is these you ought to have practiced!"

Story #5 - When the hour came, Jesus took his place at the table, and the apostles with him. He said to them "I have eagerly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer."

Story #6 - Walking long from Jerusalem to Emmaus, the risen Lord walked with Cleopas and his friend but they did not know that it was Jesus. As it was evening they urged their friend to stay with them. So he did. When they were at table he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him; and he vanished from their sight.

A seventh meal time story in the gospel of Luke is of course the one before us this morning. With it comes the question; who should we, ought we, invite? The easy response – stop giving banquets! This would certainly cut down on the work of the Fellowship Committee, and would end all the time and effort of planning and preparing benefit dinners like the one coming up in early October for the Food Pantry. I rather doubt that is the response Jesus is after from those who engage with the parable. He knows us after all. He knows that we need to eat, are going to eat, are going to throw parties, banquets, elaborate dinners, simple suppers, luncheons, picnics, and frequent inns featuring the delicacies of talented, creative, chefs.

What do we make of these mealtime stories?

Story #1; Woman with jar of ointment - don't judge.

Story #2; *Feeding of the 5,000* - stop talking about how little we have and start sharing generously.

Story #3; The helpful Samaritan - the least likely is often doing the work of God.

Story #4; Washing up before dinner - don't neglect the justice of God.

Story #5; Upper Room Meal - Jesus eagerly wants us to be in relationship with him.

Story #6; *Emmaus Walk* - remember the moment when your eyes were opened and you caught a glimpse of the risen Lord. It is what will keep you going.

Story #7; *Places of honor and guest lists* - Invite, invite, invite, - poor, crippled, lame, and blind; we are not talking only economically poor, there are plenty of financially rich people who are spiritually poor and there are people crippled with all sorts of things and situations, lame isn't limited to mobility, and blind isn't limited to sight.

The blessing of course is ours for the taking; whenever it is that we feed and care for those who cannot repay us. Oh how much richer our lives will be. How transforming such actions are. Think of it; the one who picked up the tab for all of us on Calvary's Cross, didn't scrutinize the list, but gave his life freely for all; Pharisees, women, disciples, Samaritans, sinners, Apostles, friends, the religious family zealot, the crazed uncle, you, me. Jesus prepares a banquet for us this morning. Invites each of us to take a higher seat, "join me" he says. The Planning, preparation, menu, table setting, seating configuration, decoration, and the host himself, Jesus, gives us everything in this meal. Amen.

On one occasion when Jesus was going to the house of a leader of the Pharisees to eat a meal on the sabbath, they were watching him closely.

⁷When he noticed how the guests chose the places of honor, he told them a parable. ⁸"When you are invited by someone to a wedding banquet, do not sit down at the place of honor, in case someone more distinguished than you has been invited by your host; 9and the host who invited both of you may come and say to you, 'Give this person your place,' and then in disgrace you would start to take the lowest place.¹⁰But when you are invited, go and sit down at the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he may say to you, 'Friend, move up higher'; then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at the table with you. ¹¹For all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted."

¹²He said also to the one who had invited him, "When you give a luncheon or a dinner, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your relatives or rich neighbors, in case they may invite you in return, and you would be repaid. ¹³But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind. ¹⁴And you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you, for you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."
