Guidelines for Worship during the time of COVID-19

Entering and Leaving the Church:

Wearing a mask while in worship is optional, recommended or required based on the CDC guidelines. Green/Optional, Yellow/Recommended, Red/Required. The instruction will be posted on the entry doors. Please be sure to bring a mask in the event of required/recommended masking. Disposable masks are available at the entrance to the church nave.

Offerings:

Monetary offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances to the nave prior to the service. You may also donate via our website at www.stpaulsyork.org

Communion Procedure:

1. Come to communion using the center aisle (about 10 adults per side).

2. Communion glasses are placed on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).

3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.

4. Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.

5. Extend your hands to receive the communion host.

6. Consume the communion host before you leave the chancel edge.

7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.

8. Consume the wine before you leave the chancel edge.

9. Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle.

10.Return to your pew using the side aisle.

Wednesday Scripture Study—Wednesdays, 10:30 AM—Christ Hall

God's Work Our Hands – TODAY from 9:15-10:15 AM we will be assembling health kits for Lutheran World Relief. This event is for all ages and will be held outdoors on the South Lawn.

St. Paul's Staff Recognition Brunch. The Second Sunday Brunch TODAY following the second service, is hosted by the Mutual Ministry committee in celebration and recognition of our St. Paul's Church Staff.

Bibles – will be presented next week to children and youth who are entering Kindergarten, Fourth Grade and Seventh Grade during the liturgy.

Confirmation ministry – will be held on Sunday mornings at 9:15 AM with the first session on the Lord's Prayer beginning on September 18.

Food Pantry Workers – will be recognized in conjunction with the 40th anniversary of St. Paul's Food Pantry ministry on Sunday September 25.

Sunday school classes - for all ages begin on next Sunday at 9:15 AM. Primary, Confirmation and High School students meet on the upper level. An adult class will be held in Christ Hall on the main level. Pre-school and Kindergarten through Grade 2 children will be learning about many important Old Testament people including Adam & Eve, Joseph, Moses and others. Grades 3-6 will study one of the lessons being heard in worship. This will help them tie the stories from the Bible with worship and everyday life.

CREATE Tuesday evenings, 6:00 – 7:15 PM First Session September 13

We read in Genesis how God created all of the creatures, birds of the air, fish of the sea, and all of the things that creep and crawl and walk and hop and gallop on land! We will explore Bible stories referencing animals and see how many of them connect to stories we know from salvation history. Miss Kelly has prepared crafts that will lead to the creation of a beautiful Jesse Tree for the children to use for devotion during the season of Advent. Miss Kelly will meet with students' grade 2 through 6 beginning at 6:00 pm and with children age 2 through grades 1 at 6:30 pm. In late fall we will begin to work on the Christmas play which is scheduled for inclusion during the 10:30 am liturgy on December 18.

Harvest Dinner and Auction October 8th– Tickets are \$100 and are available for purchase through the Church office. All proceeds benefit the Food Pantry at St. Paul's. We are offering two tracks in hope of widening participation; craft beers paired with the menu as well as select wines. This should make for elevated conversation around the table, who likes what and why! Twelve original paintings by Pastor Reep that are featured in the 2022 calendar showcasing southern York county farms, and scenes from New England and Colonial Williamsburg will be auctioned live providing a huge amount of enter-



tainment for the evening. And there are silent auction items donated to provide an additional source of funding for the food pantry. The American Heritage themed menu prepared by Chef Mummert features something that just about everyone will enjoy.

Eight AM is early for college age students. And yet there are dreaded 8:00 AM classes scheduled across the country at college and university campuses. A number of years ago three young men from York College claimed unoccupied pew real-estate here at St. Paul's at the 8:00 AM liturgy. The three men ran cross country together. The spring term of their freshman year, late January, the three men appeared at worship and shared openly with me their pact to abandon late night partying, partying that sunk their grade point averages and nearly put each of them on academic probation. They committed themselves to Sunday worship, 8:00 AM, and to enjoying coffee following the morning service. The three men acknowledged that the dining hall was not open early on Sunday morning. So this was a good place to be. None of them would have told you that they were lost. None of them would articulate that what they appreciated had anything to do with a loving God finding them, and making a way forward for them. In May when the academic year concluded, and in December at mid-year break, they would greet me at the George Street door; "see you next year Pastor!" And sure enough after Christmas holiday or summer break the three of them would be back in their pew. The pack made that freshman year sustained them through the remainder of their academic achievements.

I was not certain of how they heard or how they experienced God's gracious love made known through Christ Jesus. I was certain of what they heard proclaimed in scripture, liturgy and song, and what they received in the sacrament of Holy Communion; God's grace. God's grace is all about the lost being found, recovery, restoration, redemption, repentance, future. Stories about repentance and the rejoicing that accompanies such joy are told by Jesus. He tells of a lost sheep, a lost coin, and a lost son. This morning we hear the first two of the trilogy, the sheep and the coin. In the first story the Shepherd leaves the 99 sheep and goes in search of the one who is lost. When he finds it, he lays it on his shoulders and rejoices. He invites those in his neighborhood to rejoice with him. In the second story a woman lost one of her ten coins. She lights a lamp, sweeps the house and searches carefully until she finds it. When she finds it, she calls her friends and neighbors and invites them to rejoice with her.

Rejoicing punctuates these stories. But another theme present is repentance. It is more obvious in the third story, the familiar Prodigal Son story. But repentance is implicit in the parables. Repentance may be defined as our acceptance of being found. It is the work of grace among us. The three college men most likely wouldn't say that they were lost, or that they needed to repent. In fact it may seem that nothing out of the ordinary had taken place; simply three young men at worship early on a Sunday morning.

The same is true for us; repentance as our acceptance of being found. But that would mean that we would have to acknowledge that we were lost or are lost. If you didn't know that you were lost how would you know that you were found? And why on earth would you rejoice because it would seem that nothing out of the ordinary has taken place.

The Chief Priests and scribes I believe were in just such a category. Grumblers that they were, they couldn't dream of being in need of repentance. That was beyond their comprehension that they were lost. Repentance, that was something needed by others. They self-righteously had it all together. They were in the right place at the right time, and they were certain of their place. Repentance was something that sinners needed.

In each of us I believe there lurks a bit of the chief priest and scribal self-righteousness. Grumblers that we are, we can find fault with others, figure out what others ought to be doing, offer to tweeze out the splinter from a neighbors eye, or recline comfortably on the periphery critiquing the passionate efforts of others. All the while deluding ourselves into believing that repentance is something needed by "others," someone other than you or me? Perhaps that college student over there needs repentance! Repentance is our acceptance of the reality that God has found us in Christ Jesus. This means, of course, that we acknowledge our own, for lack of a better word, "lostness."

In the Brief Order of Confession and Forgiveness we acknowledge before God and one another that we are lost, that we are sinners, in thought, word and deed. And, that we are in need of God's forgiveness and mercy. The liturgy is a corrective lens in which to view our true identity. The confession is a cry of repentance that we are lost and need to hear again the voice, the voice of the loving Shepherd, the One who from the cross seeks us out and finds us. Years ago at a National Youth gathering held in San Antonio Texas, Peter Mayer and the Cruzando House Band performed a Jeromy Deibler song. The lyric and tune are still stuck in my mind.

You, you found me

You found me and you called me from the wilderness

From my cave of emptiness

You found me in the places of my loneliness

Told me there was more than this

Captured me with tenderness

Yeah, you found me.

Jesus does indeed find us. Like the shepherd who finds the lost sheep, and the woman who finds the lost coin, Jesus finds us. The sheep most likely doesn't know it is lost. And the coin has no idea that it is lurking in darkness. In the pit of despair, when we are all alone, when we think that we could never find our way, Christ Jesus comes and finds us. And when he finds us he throws a party because through him, with him, in him we are no longer lost but found. He throws a banquet and feeds us with his body and blood and promises us that this is a foretaste of the heavenly feast to come. Heaven, where Rejoicing punctuates the eternal celebration for all for whom Christ died. You are invited to share in just such a meal this morning in the Holy Communion, rejoicing in the knowledge that you are found.

Each Sunday morning we come to this place. We make a pack supporting one another in worship in order to keep us from being weighed down by things that draw us away, that draw us into darkness. We don't speak of being lost, because in this place God's grace abounds. We hear a new the voice of the One who seeks us out and finds us. "I have come to find those dead in sin" says the voice of Jesus. "I have come to find the lost, the grumblers, the self-righteous those who don't think that they need me. I have come to find you, just you!" God's heart overflows with joy when the lost are found. The Shepherd recovering the sheep and the woman recovering the coin can't help but call together neighbors and friends to rejoice, because what was lost is found.

Amen.

FIRST READING: Exodus 32:7-14

The LORD said to Moses, "Go down at once! Your people, whom you brought up out of the land of Egypt, have acted perversely; 8they have been quick to turn aside from the way that I commanded them; they have cast for themselves an image of a calf, and have worshiped it and sacrificed to it, and said, 'These are your gods, O Israel, who brought you up out of the land of Egypt!'" 9The LORD said to Moses, "I have seen this people, how stiff-necked they are. ¹⁰Now let me alone, so that my wrath may burn hot against them and I may consume them; and of you I will make a great nation."

¹¹But Moses implored the LORD his God, and said, "O LORD, why does your wrath burn hot against your people, whom you brought out of the land of Egypt with great power and with a mighty hand? ¹²Why should the Egyptians say, 'It was with evil intent that he brought them out to kill them in the mountains, and to consume them from the face of the earth'? Turn from your fierce wrath; change your mind and do not bring disaster on your people. ¹³Remember Abraham, Isaac, and Israel, your servants, how you swore to them by your own self, saying to them, 'I will multiply your descendants like the stars of heaven, and all this land that I have promised I will give to your descendants, and they shall inherit it forever." ¹⁴And the LORD changed his mind about the disaster that he planned to bring on his people.

I am grateful to Christ Jesus our Lord, who has strengthened me, because he judged me faithful and appointed me to his service, ¹³even though I was formerly a blasphemer, a persecutor, and a man of violence. But I received mercy

Now all the tax collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to [Jesus]. ²And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, "This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them."

³So he told them this parable: ⁴"Which one of you, having a hundred sheep and losing one of them, does not leave the ninety-nine in the wilderness and go after the one that is lost until he finds it? ⁵When he has found it, he lays it on his shoulders and rejoices. ⁶And when he comes home, he calls together his friends and neighbors, saying to them, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep that was lost.' 7 Just so, I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who need no repentance.
