Guidelines for Worship during the time of COVID-19

Entering and Leaving the Church:

Wearing a mask while in worship is optional, recommended or required based on the CDC guidelines. Green/Optional, Yellow/Recommended, Red/Required. The instruction will be posted on the entry doors. Please be sure to bring a mask in the event of required/recommended masking. Disposable masks are available at the entrance to the church nave.

Offerings:

Monetary offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances to the nave prior to the service. You may also donate via our website at www.stpaulsyork.org

Communion Procedure:

1. Come to communion using the center aisle (about 10 adults per side).

2. Communion glasses are placed on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).

3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.

4. Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.

5. Extend your hands to receive the communion host.

6. Consume the communion host before you leave the chancel edge.

7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.

8. Consume the wine before you leave the chancel edge.

9. Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle.

10.Return to your pew using the side aisle.

My brother Walt jokingly would say "if I had a son I would name him Amos Tucker. That was the kind of name where people would know right up front that you couldn't, or shouldn't' mess with him. A name that is tough as nails." (He has three daughters.)

Amos, the prophet, was one of those guys that you didn't want to mess with! He pruned trees. He was an outsider who brought the word of the Lord to people who were quite content with the way things were. He spoke God's Word and the people were offended by it. He pointed out their unfaithfulness, their taking advantage of the poor, their desire for the Sabbath to be over so that they could get on with whatever it was they though was more important. Needless to say Amos most likely didn't have many friends. The people who were most offended were the rich, the rich who thought because of their wealth, they had the final say on everything. Amos reminded them *"The Lord has sworn by the pride of Jacob: Surely I will never forget any of their deeds."*

Like Amos, an outsider who comes along and points out all of your faults, Jesus comes along and points out the faults of all who think that money alone will save them. That wealth itself will secure future. Jesus however focuses on the shrewdness; the prudence. The gospel writer Luke follows the pattern of Amos and Jesus, in that he is consistent in reminding the rich of the pitfalls of wealth. The rich are sent away empty – sings Mary. Woe to you who are rich – preaches Jesus. Then in a series of parables Jesus tells stories about; thorns that choke, and building bigger barns, and selling possessions, and giving alms, and being disciples. I rather doubt that we want to find ourselves; empty, inconsolable, choked, immature, greedy, robbed, or put on the outs with Jesus. These are difficult texts!

It is not the demonic effects of wealth, nor the right use of property, but the keen, sound judgment of the unrighteous manager that is praised this morning! He is smart because he knows what is coming, or could be coming, and adapts to it. The parable understands the present as the possibility of adapting to the future. (If there is one thing that we discovered through the most recent pandemic; those who adapted quickly were more likely to have a future.) This character, this scoundrel, this swindler, this unrighteous manager, is held up as a model for the children of light. He is being raised up as a model for our edification. The dishonest manager becomes a model for Christian disciples, for you and me. Not because of his dishonesty, but because of his prudence.

My brother Walt thought that naming a son Amos Tucker, was prudent so that as he grew up people wouldn't mess with him, give him a hard time, the name was synonymous with "tough as nails." Prudence. Lisa and Dave opened a 529 account for their infant daughter; they knew that she would need money for education in the future. Prudence. George and Donna loved their home of 38 years but decided while they were still in good health to down size to a one story ranch home, one that would accommodate them as they aged and their mobility waned. Prudence. Earl realized that his employer was planning to close up shop and move. He decided to pay off some debt and increase his home equity line of credit while he still had employment. Prudence. Rachael's new full time job was reflected in her first pay check. The difference between part time pay and full time pay was astonishing. She decided to keep her expenses low and try living on three fourths of her new found wealth. Prudence. These are some modern examples of individuals who have exhibited prudence. In each of their present situations they understood the need to adapt to the future; college or trade school, an accessible home, aware of changing work situation, living within or below one's means. Each of these examples has something to do with future and money. Money is a part of life. The parable today is about money too. It is not highlighting the demonic effects of wealth, or the right use of property, but keen sound judgement. So I say it again, Jesus praises the unrighteous manager or the dishonest manager for his keen sound judgment given the knowledge of what lay ahead, what was in the future. The parable understands the present as the possibility of adapting to the future. The dishonest manager is commended not because of his dishonesty, but because of his prudence.

What of our prudence? What of our present situation and our future need?

Doing nothing and praying that things will remain the same is not an option for us. We are through Holy Baptism, children of light – "Let your light so shine before others that they may see your good works and glorify your Father who is in heaven." "This little light of mine, I'm going to let it shine." Christian Disciples are, according to the parable of Jesus, to be on the lookout for how best to live into the future, adaptability, how best to journey from present to future, prudently providing for what is and what shall be.

This week we hosted the York Conference Rostered Leaders; pastors and deacons, on Tuesday morning. It was the first time for many of the group of 15 to enter into our church building post renovation and post pandemic. They were highly complementary of the work carried out in this place; changes, improvements, and modernization of the physical plant; everything from the capacious chancel that accommodated us all for morning prayer to the well-positioned meeting room in Christ Hall with kitchen and restrooms both close by. Their comments made me reflect on the cumulative work of our leadership and process; the appointment of a Focus Team to provide oversight, the work of committees identifying practical needs, Council and finance securing financing, generating pledges and financial commitments, and special ministry groups like the food pantry wrestling with what would make for the most hospitable environments. They labored together for over two years before construction would even begin. They were prudent in their planning on how to retool our aging building and systems so as to live into the future. It was as I look back on it all an exercise in adaptability for ministry and mission.

The question addressing each of us this morning is, that when all is said and done, will we be commended for the way we have lived our lives as baptized sons and daughters as children of light? Or will we find ourselves; sent away empty, choked by riches, worn and moth eaten, clutching treasures that do not give life? That of course is the story that history books will tell about us; collectively as a congregation and individually as members of the body of Christ at St. Paul's Lutheran Church, York, Pennsylvania. But what God promises to remember about us is his Son Christ Jesus, dying and rising, gathering together, sewing seeds, renewing and forgiving so that we have a present and a future secured through his grace and love. Amos prophesied, Mary sang, Jesus preached, the prudent one was commended. Amen.

GOSPEL: Luke 16:1-13

Then Jesus said to the disciples, "There was a rich man who had a manager, and charges were brought to him that this man was squandering his property. 2So he summoned him and said to him, 'What is this that I hear about you? Give me an accounting of your management, because you cannot be my manager any longer.' ³Then the manager said to himself, 'What will I do, now that my master is taking the position away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. 4I have decided what to do so that, when I am dismissed as manager, people may welcome me into their homes.' 5So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he asked the first, 'How much do you owe my master?' ⁶He answered, 'A hundred jugs of olive oil.' He said to him, 'Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it fifty.' 7Then he asked another, 'And how much do you owe?' He replied, 'A hundred containers of wheat.' He said to him, 'Take your bill and make it eighty.' 8And his master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. 9And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes.

¹⁰"Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much. ¹¹If then you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? ¹²And if you have not been faithful with what belongs to another, who will give you what is your own? ¹³No slave can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth."
