



During the singing of the hymn the people bring their Time and Ability forms and Commitment cards forward placing them in the offering basket.








PREFACE

Amen. Come, Holy Spirit.


Join our prayers with those of your servants of every time and every place, and unite them with the ceaseless petitions of our great high priest until he comes as victorious Lord of all.

COMMUNION OF THE FAITHFUL

Our Communion is "open" to all believers who trust that the Risen Christ is present for his people in the Holy Eucharist.

Communion Procedure:

1.Come to communion using the center aisle (about 10 adults per side). 2.Communion glasses are placed on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).

3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.

4. Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.

5. Extend your hands to receive the communion host.

6. Consume the communion host.

7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.

8. Consume the wine before you leave the chancel edge.

9.Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle. 10.Return to your pew using the side aisle.

Serving the Lord with Gladness

The windows were opened letting the cool fall air permeate the room. The crisp autumn air stirred the imagination of those working late in the painting studio. Students were painting later into the evening now that the semester's mid-term critiques were past and the December due date for submitting paintings was circled on the large wall calendar by the door. It was on a night like this when art students worked beyond fatigue pushing the creative process further and longer. These were the nights when crazy ideas, practical jokes, and humorous antic dote materialized. These were the nights when hunger would set in and someone would make a snack run. Luanne, Nadine and Victor all ventured out to the neighborhood pizza joint.

Luanne arrived back to the studio first. Hers really was a quick snack run. When she returned to her easel, a slip of paper was taped to her oversized canvas. Scrolled with fluid cursive penmanship it stated "*After revelation explanation becomes superfluous*." Luanne looked puzzled. A series of questions followed. The questions were asked to figure out who posted the piece of notebook paper on her painting. Whose hand writing matched the fluid pattern? Who among her peers knew of revelation? Who could spell superfluous? Of course no one saw any one near her easel. No one would remember any visitors. The note appeared seemingly out of the blue! Perhaps it was carried in on the crisp fall night air.

When Nadine and Victor returned to continue working on their paintings they also found messages at their work stations. Minuscule paper mats strategically placed on areas of their canvases with the message *"If the entire picture was painted like this."* They too were inquisitive about what had been posted and by whom.

Posting notes, making statements, pointing out things for clarification and debate have been around long before my art school classmates' crazy ideas, practical jokes, and humorous antic dotes during late nights in the art studio.

The crisp autumn air was infiltrating Wittenberg when Dr. Martin Luther posted his 95 points for discussion on the Castle Church door in 1517. What had been blowing around the region were ideas perpetuated by Rome that took advantage of God's people. Luther spent many a long night working beyond fatigue pushing the theological envelope where the church had deposited the revelation of priests as entrepreneurs, selling indulgences to spring the souls of the dearly departed from the horror and uncertainty of purgatory.

An indulgence was an officially sanctioned piece of paper declaring a particular benefit to the purchaser. In Luther's time the church sold them as a way to bring solace to the sinner and to bring money into the church's treasury. On the surface it appeared to be a win for both. With the purchase of an indulgence you could have the certainty of mind that you or your departed loved one was securely safe on heaven's side. "*When the coin in the coffer rings, the soul from purgatory springs,*" went the jingle and sales pitch of the 16th century. Clergy were given a revised job description, sales and marketing mattered. It mattered more than just about anything else at that time to Pope Leo. The Pope needed money to pay for his sumptuous life style at the Vatican and for the construction of what we know as St. Peter's Basilica, the cathedral in Rome. Luther's posting of 95 points for debate, theological reflection and clarification caused quite a stir. That wasn't necessarily his objective. Luther wanted some honest to goodness conversation about the things that mattered in the daily lives of the people with whom he lived and worked and worshiped. Little did Luther know that the revelation in Rome, that the church could extract large sums from the local parishioners, didn't need any explanation and certainly not from one of its own professors and priests? Luther stood in the way of the church moving in a direction that, at least from Luther's theological perspective, was moving away from what was revealed in the pages of sacred scripture; what ran contrary to what he read from the prophets, the gospels and especially from the letters of St. Paul.

And so, not unlike Luanne, Nadine and Victor enquiring around the art building, pressing classmates as to the author of the masking taped note and the tiny mats attached to their paintings, the Pope in Rome began to enquire about the author of the points posted on the Castle Church door on All Hollow's Eve. The Pope wanted to find the one responsible for critiquing the selling of indulgences. He wanted to find the one responsible for constricting the cash flow!

The rest, you might say is history. And like the masking taped note placed on Luanne's easel "*After revelation explanation becomes superfluous*," after revelation on the part of Dr. Martin Luther, and all of those who grasp the theological tenants of God's grace made known through Christ Jesus, revelation bore reformation. And reformation bore change.

Clergy would marry. Mass would be celebrated in the language of the people. The chalice on the altar would be returned to the communicants. The sacramental life of the community would center on Holy Baptism and Holy Communion. Justification was not earned through works of merit or purchased through the sale of an indulgence but was bestowed as gift to be received (God's grace). The laity was every bit as important to the life of the church as were the clergy. And the list ballooned. But it didn't balloon randomly, it ballooned as more and more people searched the scriptures and discovered the good news of God's love made known through Christ Jesus. God's Son, Christ Jesus, sets you free. Through him you are forgiven. In him you have life now and for eternity.

This Reformation Sunday morning the crisp autumn air blows across south central Pennsylvania. We gather as God's people. Again we hear of God's great love shown us through his Son. It was through such love that Luther and other great reformers of the church were moved into action bringing about change. It is God's love that continues to reform the life of the church and the lives of all of her members. As children of the reformation, people who identify with posting notes, and having honest conversations, and struggling with the issues of everyday life, reformation asks us; what needs to change for the sake of the Gospel of Christ Jesus? What needs to change in my life for the sake of the Gospel? What needs to change in the life of our congregation for the sake of the Gospel? These questions are asked in the great tradition of our reformation heritage. They are posed to engage us in scripture and theology, to get us to enquire more deeply about the depth of God's grace (unconditional love freely given), to observe the importance of the law, to reflect on the relationship God has established with us and to ultimately move us to faithful living, action, action bringing about change for the sake of God's gracious love.

The crisp autumn air stirs our imagination. Willing to work together, pushing beyond fatigue, the creative process spawns ideas, ideas given the gospel that seem at times to be crazy, impractical, and to some even humorous. But then "*after revelation explanation becomes superfluous*." Amen.

FIRST READING: Jeremiah 31:31-34

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. ³²It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt-a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the LORD. 33But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. ³⁴ No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, "Know the LORD," for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the LORD; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

Psalm 46

SECOND READING: Romans 3:19-28

Now we know that whatever the law says, it speaks to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be silenced, and the whole world may be held accountable to God. 20For "no human being will be justified in his sight" by deeds prescribed by the law, for through the law comes the knowledge of sin.

²¹But now, apart from law, the righteousness of God has been disclosed, and is attested by the law and the prophets, ²²the righteousness

of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction, ²³since all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God; ²⁴they are now justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, ²⁵ whom God put forward as a sacrifice of atonement by his blood, effective through faith. He did this to show his righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over the sins previously committed; ²⁶it was to prove at the present time that he himself is righteous and that he justifies the one who has faith in Jesus.

²⁷Then what becomes of boasting? It is excluded. By what law? By that of works? No, but by the law of faith. ²⁸For we hold that a person is justified by faith apart from works prescribed by the law.

GOSPEL: John 8:31-36

Jesus said to the Jews who had believed in him, "If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; 32 and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free." 33 They answered him, "We are descendants of Abraham and have never been slaves to anyone. What do you mean by saying, 'You will be made free'?"

³⁴Jesus answered them, "Very truly, I tell you, everyone who commits sin is a slave to sin. ³⁵The slave does not have a permanent place in the household; the son has a place there forever. ³⁶So if the Son makes you free, you will be free indeed."
