We are a Christian church within the Lutheran tradition (Evangelical Lutheran Church of America) and we welcome people of all Christian traditions as well as people of other faiths and people of little or no faith. Guidelines for Worship during the time of COVID-19

Entering and Leaving the Church:

Wearing a mask while in worship is optional, recommended or required based on the CDC guidelines. Green/Optional, Yellow/Recommended, Red/Required. The instruction will be posted on the entry doors. Please be sure to bring a mask in the event of required/recommended masking. Disposable masks are available at the entrance to the church nave.

Offerings:

Monetary offerings may be placed in the basins provided at the entrances to the nave prior to the service. You may also donate via our website at www.stpaulsyork.org

Communion Procedure:

- 1. Come to communion using the center aisle (about 10 adults per side).
- 2. Communion glasses are placed on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).
- 3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.
- 4. Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.
- 5. Extend your hands to receive the communion host.
- 6. Consume the communion host before you leave the chancel edge.
- 7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.
- 8. Consume the wine before you leave the chancel edge.
- 9.Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle.
- 10.Return to your pew using the side aisle.



With grateful hearts we commend our spoken and silent prayers to you, O God; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. **Amen.**



Noted church music composer Thomas Keesecker will be presenting a choral workshop/piano performance in the sanctuary featuring many of his sacred piano compositions and choral anthems. Sunday school classes were held in the basement of the church. It was there that Mrs. Schmidt presented her weekly lesson. She presented most lessons integrating current trends in technology. In that time period she relied heavily on a flannel graph. It was the Tick Tock of the early nineteen sixties! There was no power point, no YouTube, no DVD video, Mrs. Schmidt simply relied on a board covered with flannel, positioned on an easel, with the half a dozen little chairs all pulled around close. She had an array of figures and accessories and used them to present the weekly Bible story. Each week someone was on a quest. There was always someone seeking something, searching, trying to find or figure out, someone with need, great need. And Mrs. Schmidt would lead us on the quest with her array of felt characters, animals, and natural habitat (we had a burning bush and a sycamore tree). She had a donkey that was used in the Old Testament story of Balaam when the angel of the Lord tells him to go another way. That same donkey would carry Mary to Bethlehem, be positioned at the Christmas manger, it would carry Mary and baby Jesus to Egypt escaping King Harrods's murderous decree, and it would carry Jesus into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday. That was a busy donkey!

Two childhood favorites were; Naaman the leper from the Old Testament reading and the Leper from the gospel. I remember them because she used the same figure, the same man who played the role of Naaman the leper was the Samaritan who returned to give thanks in the gospel story. She changed out their outfits a bit, but the base figure was the one and the same. Mrs. Schmidt was tricky; the blue horizontal piece of felt was deemed the Jordan River. And the leader of the army, Naaman, was covered with boils, and blotches to signify the dreaded skin disease leprosy. But tucked away under that blue band of river water was the other Naaman, the one whose skin was disease free, pure and unblemished. So down under the Jordan River that leper Naaman would go, seven times. Mrs. Schmidt would have us count to make sure that we remembered what the prophet Elisha had said. One, two, three... and then on the seventh go, out came Naaman completely healed of his dreaded skin disease.

The story of the ten lepers who are cleansed was embedded in my memory because Mrs. Schmidt had taken the figure used to portray Naaman and traced him out nine times, and then clipped them out with her pinking shears. They all had zig-zagged edges. She drew on them with markers to make them look like they had leprosy. Secretly we knew they were the nine who didn't return, didn't come back to give thanks. And it was that same character Naaman that came up out of the Jordan River when our voices shouted out the number SEVEN that was used in the gospel story portraying, the foreigner, the Samaritan who returned to give thanks.

Mrs. Schmidt taught about being; thankful, grateful, appreciative. She stressed the importance of healing in our lives. As kids we didn't spend much time thinking about healing; we thought we would always be young and healthy. At the time my classmates and I didn't know that our Sunday school teacher had cancer. Sunday after Sunday she arrived prepared to teach. Heaven knows that my classmates and I weren't the easiest bunch to teach nor were we the most appreciative. But that woman could tell a story. And somehow she could make it stick. Just like those felt images to the flannel covered board.

We are just beginning our fall stewardship emphasis *A Month of Reformation*. Today we were asked to complete a Time and Ability Form committing to work needed as we carry out our shared mission and ministry. We may not have the gift and skill of a teacher like Mrs.

Schmidt, but each of us contributes to the whole of the story; daily we encounter people on a quest: healing, acceptance, restoration to community life, and in some sense, to be made free. In Christ Jesus we are made free. This morning I don't have a flannel graph to portray the stories for you. You have heard them read. You maybe have your own recollections of these healing stories, of these stories of thanks, gratitude, appreciation. I am draw to the words of Jesus; Jesus tells the Samaritan who returns and gives thanks, "get up and go your way faith has made you well." To go on his way, this time not to show himself to the priests at the temple, but to simply go. In Christ Jesus, in the word proclaimed to him, he is made free, set free to go. No strings attached. No particular task to perform (Leviticus 14:1-32). No seven of anything. He is addressed simply in the word of Christ Jesus to "go."

I don't have a wide blue felt strip to depict the Jordan River, but we do have the baptismal font present and in our midst. We didn't go down into the water seven times, but three times the water with the word commanded by Christ was washed over us to take away sin, what separates us from God. For some of us it has been a few years or several decades since we felt that water and heard those words for the first time. Gathering in worship we remember that we are on a quest for some type of healing: physical, emotional, spiritual; in our lives, for our families, for the community, for the nation, and for the world. We come to communion as people who God welcomes; accepts and forgives, embraces and loves. The simple gifts of bread and wine may not seem grandiose. But they are the gifts given to us so that we are made free to go. Naaman expected great incantations. The 10 lepers sought mercy. The power at work today is God's power made known through his Son, Christ Jesus. The biblical narrative reveals the remarkable power of Jesus to heal and restore. The examples this morning are of oppressed and excluded people coming to God: a centurion is commended for great faith; a Samaritan is commended for giving praise; and later in the gospel of Luke we will hear of a dying thief on a cross beside our Lord Jesus, receiving the gift of eternal life. Jesus acts. Jesus speaks. And lives are transformed, changed, healed, and turned around. With each one something new becomes possible as they "go." Something new is possible for you too through the generosity of God's love made known through Christ Jesus.

We don't often use the language of quest to refer to our journey through life. The fact that we have gathered together this morning bears witness to our belief that Christ Jesus has something to do with our quest. Jesus has a word for us as he did for those who encountered him on the way to Jerusalem. "Come to me," Jesus says, 'whoever you are, whatever your background, however excluded you may have felt in your life. Bring me your aches of body, mind and heart. Come to me. I have a word for you. I heal the sick. I welcome the outcast. I give eternal life to people who may be breathing their last earthly breath. I will turn your life around so that you can go. To all who believe in me I have these simple words: 'Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well' says Jesus.

Those where the words spoken by Mrs. Schmidt at the end of the Sunday school lesson "Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well." Then she would pray that all would be made well. She would carefully take down the felted figures from the flannel covered board and pack them away for another Sunday, another quest, another story about being set free to "go." Amen.

FIRST READING: 2 Kings 5:1-3, 7-15c

Naaman, commander of the army of the king of Aram, was a great man and in high favor with his master, because by him the Lord had given victory to Aram. The man, though a mighty warrior, suffered from leprosy. ²Now the Arameans on one of their raids had taken a young girl captive from the land of Israel, and she served Naaman's wife. ³She said to her mistress, "If only my lord were with the prophet who is in Samaria! He would cure him of his leprosy."

⁷When the king of Israel read the letter, he tore his clothes and said, "Am I God, to give death or life, that this man sends word to me to cure a man of his leprosy? Just look and see how he is trying to pick a quarrel with me."

⁸But when Elisha the man of God heard that the king of Israel had torn his clothes, he sent a message to the king, "Why have you torn your clothes? Let him come to me, that he may learn that there is a prophet in Israel." 9So Naaman came with his horses and chariots, and halted at the entrance of Elisha's house. 10 Elisha sent a messenger to him, saying, "Go, wash in the Jordan seven times, and your flesh shall be restored and you shall be clean." ¹¹But Naaman became angry and went away, saying, "I thought that for me he would surely come out, and stand and call on the name of the LORD his God, and would wave his hand over the spot, and cure the leprosy! 12 Are not Abana and Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus, better than all the waters of Israel? Could I not wash in them, and be clean?" He turned and went away in a rage. 13But his servants approached and said to him, "Father, if the prophet had commanded you to do something difficult, would you not have done it? How much more, when all he said to you was, 'Wash, and be clean'?" 14So he went down and immersed himself seven times in the Jordan, according to the word of the man of God; his flesh was restored like the flesh of a young boy, and he was clean.

¹⁵Then he returned to the man of God, he and all his company; he came and stood before him and said, "Now I know that there is no God in all the earth except in Israel."

Psalm 111

SECOND READING: 2 Timothy 2:8-15

Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David—that is my gospel, ⁹for which I suffer hardship, even to the point of being chained like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. ¹⁰Therefore I endure everything for the sake of the elect, so that they may also obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. ¹¹The saying is sure:

If we have died with him, we will also live with him; ¹²if we endure, we will also reign with him; if we deny him, he will also deny us;

¹³if we are faithless, he remains faithful for he cannot deny himself.

¹⁴Remind them of this, and warn them before God that they are to avoid wrangling over words, which does no good but only ruins those who are listening. ¹⁵Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved by him, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly explaining the word of truth.

GOSPEL: Luke 17:11-19

On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going through the region between Samaria and Galilee. 12As he entered a village, ten lepers approached him. Keeping their distance, 13they called out, saying, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!" 14When he saw them, he said to them, "Go and show yourselves to the priests." And as they went, they were made clean. ¹⁵Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice. 16He prostrated himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him. And he was a Samaritan. 17Then Jesus asked, "Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, where are they? 18 Was none of them found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?" 19 Then he said to him, "Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well."
