We rejoice that he is King of the Universe and that he uses his power and authority to rule in equity and peace. Equity and peace are what we begin to anticipate in the season of Advent and in our preparation for Christmas. In the past we have assisted them by purchasing motor cycles so that evangelists could travel out into the outlying areas to preach and baptize. During the 500th anniversary of the Lutheran Reformation we provided tuition so that two men from the congregation could attend Bible training and prepare to be Evangelists. Mpuguso Lutheran Church continues to thrive because they continue to explore new avenues to proclaim the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus. Congregation Council Highlights

St. Paul's church council met on Monday, October 10th at 7 PM.

President's Report: Tristan Ericson noted that with the changeover in our council's structure and leadership St. Paul's is moving into the next phase of our church with a focus on continuity.



Finance: The budget will be presented to the annual congregational meeting on November 20th. Financial audit is still in progress.

Staffing: Future staffing considerations for the 2024 budget will include discussions for the acquisition of additional clergy (possible deacon? assistant pastor?) due to St. Paul's growth. Possible sabbatical for Pastor Reep for the 2024 year.

Directory: The Witness Committee will address considerations to updating the directory.

Mpuguso Request: Mpuguso has requested a fundraiser on Nov 6th. This day would include a service, a meal, and a performance by African choir to benefit roof project for Mpuguso congregation. The fundraising goal is \$5,000 through donations during the month of November.

Nominating Committee: There are still openings on Mutual Ministry and Synod Reps.

SERRV International Sale: Global items made by artisans in developing nations will be for sale on November 13-14. All proceeds made by St. Paul's will be donated to Lutheran World Relief.

God's Barnyard Fundraiser: Sunday school children, from November to January, will collect quarters that will fund the purchase of animals, that the children will choose, for farmers around the world.

World Relief Health Kits: A concern was expressed about quality of the items that were used. May need to consider a vendor change to provide higher quality items, and/or lowering the number of kits to increase the quality of the items.

Food Pantry: The pantry served 238 families and 1005 individuals in September. Donations of milk, potatoes and pasta are needed.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Reep is excited about the current new hires and their commitment to St. Paul's; is pleased with the success of the Harvest Dinner; the Children's Nativity play is being prepared; and the Preschool Chapel is an exciting component of the church life/ministry.

Food Pantry—Fall



Items needed: Beans, corn, juice, jelly, macaroni, Rice (1 or 2 lb bags), dehydrated Pantry potatoes, powdered milk, canned tuna, tomato sauce and soup. We also need paper grocery bags with handles and plastic bags.
