


PREFACE



COMMUNION OF THE FAITHFUL

Our Communion is "open" to all believers who trust that the Risen Christ is present for his people in the Holy Eucharist.

- 1. Come to communion using the center aisle (about 10 adults per side).
- 2. Communion glasses are placed on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).
- 3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.
- 4. Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.
- 5. Extend your hands to receive the communion host.
- 6. Consume the communion host.
- 7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.
- 8. Consume the wine before you leave the chancel edge.
- 9. Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle.
- 10.Return to your pew using the side aisle.



"Do to others as you would have them do to you." We know it as the Golden Rule. It doesn't seem to circulate in the greater community much these days. And with Election Day on Tuesday, it seems to be far removed from candidates seeking election. The Golden Rule has fallen by the wayside much like the Commandments within the fiber of society. A number of years ago a news reporter randomly stopped people and asked them if they could name one of the commandments. It was during the Lenten season. I was driving along in the van and I remember turning up the radio so that I wouldn't miss the things that folks identified as commandments. The responses were limited at best. One person knew that they were from the Bible. Another was sure that a "penny saved is a penny earned" was one of them. And one person recalled the Golden Rule even if it was paraphrased "do nice things so that nice things will come to you." Perhaps I was generous in considering that to be the Golden Rule but I thought the person was at least trying to remember the "do to others as you would have them do to you." The Golden Rule isn't about nice things coming your way. It's about living in a particular way. It's about viewing others without suspicion. It's about doing and acting and treating others differently from the way of the world. There is a difference between God's way and the way of the world. Saints of God act and live and interact differently with others. What shape us are Christ Jesus and his cross taken up precisely for others.

During his earthly ministry Jesus taught the disciples about loving their enemies. He under scored the fact that those who follow him do not reciprocate, do not retaliate, and do not draw their behavior patterns from those who would victimize them. In the last verses of the Gospel reading Jesus gives numerous examples of forms of mistreatment: hating, cursing, abusing, striking, stealing, and begging. What Jesus is teaching his followers assumes that those who are listening, his disciples, are victims, not victimizers. Jesus offered no instruction on what to do after striking, or stealing, or hating, or cursing, or abusing another person. Such behavior, it is assumed is foreign to those who live under the reign of God. We may find ourselves in the position of being victims but we are not to regard ourselves as such. We are not to be shaped and determined by the hostilities and abuses unleashed on us. Rather, we are to take the initiative, not responding in kind, or by playing dead, or whining. We are to act according to the kingdom principles of love, forgiveness and generosity. Those things taught and modeled for us by Christ Jesus.

Philip Gully, author and theologian, shares a story about his friend's two sons bickering and fighting. Parents of small children will understand this situation completely. The two sons were driving their father crazy with all of their arguing and fighting and tattling on each other. Finally, his youngest son, Michael, came complaining that his older brother, Daniel, had hit him. Fed up with it all (this often happens to parents with young children, becoming fed up has a particular threshold over which no one wants to be pushed) the Dad called Daniel the older brother into the room. He then told Michael that he had permission to hit Daniel. Michael remembering all the times his parents had said, "we don't hit," hesitated. "Go a head" said the Dad to his youngest son Michael, "Hit him back." So Michael hauled off and walloped Daniel. Daniel began to cry. Then to the Dad's surprise Michael began to cry too. Now there were two wailing children needing consoling! Later the Dad revealed, "I suddenly realized I'd failed my boys. Michael had come seeking my help in healing the breach between his brother and him. He wanted

them to be able to play together peacefully. He wanted reconciliation, and all I gave him was revenge."

On this All Saints' Sunday we recall the saints of the Church; men and women who lived their lives differently from the world. Those who for the sake of Christ lived differently, thought differently, and acted differently; St. Francis and St. Clare, St. Bernard of Clairvaux, St. Gregory, Martin Luther and Mother Teresa in a list that marches on through chronological time. In their spiritual journey they followed Christ and the way of the cross. They witnessed to the faith we share in Christ Jesus centering their lives on kingdom principles: love, forgiveness and generosity. These are the marks of those who live the Golden Rule.

In our life together there are those who witness to faith in Christ Jesus in ways both subtle and bold. It is one of the things that contribute to the rich fiber of congregational life. Together our witness is stronger, more vital. When membership changes through the addition of new individuals and families and through those who take their leave moving away or who die, it always takes a while for the congregation (the faith community) to regroup and settle in discovering gifts that are shared to make God's kingdom known. Sometimes that is discovered in subtle ways (recorded on a Time and Ability form). Sometimes that is discovered in ways that are bold (someone simply does something that you had no idea that they were capable of doing and it takes you by surprise).

In the course of this past year, seven of our members died. They entered into the Church Triumphant and are numbered with God's saints of all times and all places. They contributed to this faith community by living kingdom principles. The Golden Rule may not have been stated explicitly every time you encountered them, but over the course of their lives what was manifest was love, forgiveness and generosity. Each one reflected those kingdom principles in ways that were unique to them. Love, forgiveness and generosity; those things that they knew and experienced in Christ Jesus, were mirrored in their daily lives to others. I'm sure that, like saints of old, there were times when they were discouraged, frustrated, or disappointed. And I think that there were times when they for some reason or other couldn't love or forgive or give to their fullest capacity. But the Golden Rule still managed to guide and anchor their lives. The biblical witness bears out the priority of love, forgiveness and generosity, for community life. They make relationships flourish and troubling times bearable. Today as we remember and give thanks to God for their lives and witness, we remember God's love and forgiveness poured out on them and on us. We remember God's generosity: taking on human form, suffering and dieing so that we would have life abundantly now, and eternally with him.

Jesus concludes his lesson to the disciples with the Golden Rule. It is not a complex formula. It is part of what our Lord taught us. It is a simple rule to help keep God's kingdom principles before us: Love, forgiveness and generosity. They keep life refreshing, renewing, and vital. The world needs what God gives to us through his Son Christ Jesus. The Golden Rule helps us live into such love, forgiveness and generosity each day. Amen.

FIRST READING: Daniel 7:1-3, 15-18

In the first year of King Belshazzar of Babylon, Daniel had a dream and visions of his head as he lay in bed. Then he wrote down the dream: ²I, Daniel, saw in my vision by night the four winds of heaven stirring up the great sea, ³and four great beasts came up out of the sea, different from one another.

¹⁵As for me, Daniel, my spirit was troubled within me, and the visions of my head terrified me. ¹⁶I approached one of the attendants to ask him the truth concerning all this. So he said that he would disclose to me the interpretation of the matter: ¹⁷"As for these four great beasts, four kings shall arise out of the earth. ¹⁸But the holy ones of the Most High shall receive the kingdom and possess the kingdom forever—forever and ever."

SECOND READING: Ephesians 1:11-23

In Christ we have also obtained an inheritance, having been destined according to the purpose of him who accomplishes all things according to his counsel and will, ¹²so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory. ¹³In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; ¹⁴this is the pledge of our inheritance toward redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory.

¹⁵I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love toward all the saints, and for this reason ¹⁶I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers. ¹⁷I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, ¹⁸so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, ¹⁹and what is the immeasurable greatness

of his power for us who believe, according to the working of his great power. ²⁰God put this power to work in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, ²¹far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the age to come. ²²And he has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, ²³which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all.

GOSPEL: Luke 6:20-31

Then [Jesus] looked up at his disciples and said:

"Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God.

²¹"Blessed are you who are hungry now, for you will be filled.

"Blessed are you who weep now, for you will laugh.

²²"Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude you, revile you, and defame you on account of the Son of Man. ²³Rejoice in that day and leap for joy, for surely your reward is great in heaven; for that is what their ancestors did to the prophets.

²⁴"But woe to you who are rich, for you have received your consolation.

25"Woe to you who are full now, for you will be hungry."Woe to you who are laughing now,

for you will mourn and weep.

²⁶"Woe to you when all speak well of you, for that is what their ancestors did to the false prophets.

²⁷"But I say to you that listen, Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, ²⁸bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you. ²⁹If anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also; and from anyone who takes away your coat do not withhold even your shirt. ³⁰Give to everyone who begs from you; and if anyone takes away your goods, do not ask for them again. ³¹Do to others as you would have them do to you."
