#### COMMUNION OF THE FAITHFUL

Our Communion is "open" to all believers who trust that the Risen Christ is present for his people in the Holy Eucharist.

- 1. Come to communion using the center aisle (about 10 adults per side).
- 2. Communion glasses are placed on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).
- 3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.
- 4. Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.
- 5. Extend your hands to receive the communion host.
- 6. Consume the communion host.
- 7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.
- 8. Consume the wine before you leave the chancel edge.
- 9.Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle.
- 10. Return to your pew using the side aisle.



With Thanksgiving for Holy Baptism

There are a lot of images recorded in the pages of scripture. Some are painful and grue-some, while others are life-giving and beautiful. This morning we have an array of images from the beauty of Isaiah's restorative vision; for vitality and health, peace and wellness for plants and animals and people complete with joy and singing, to the imprisonment of John the Baptist and his looming demise, head on a platter.

Following scripture study this week I took note of the blossoming crocus and the leaping deer recorded in Isaiah chapter 35. At our house the deer eat all of the spring crocus blooms and then don't leap away fast enough! They meander along grazing on any other early blooms and blossoms that might be springing up as a sign of hope after a long dreary time we call winter. But even so the painterly side of my being is still enamored with the images put forth from the prophet. Images that do in fact bring joy because deep within each one there is hope.

If the deer don't chomp off the flowers and foliage, then I might get a crack at gathering them in a vase and using them for a still life water color painting. Leaf through the 2023 calendar and take note of the image for September. A better title might have been "the roses that the dear didn't eat!" Last season it was a bit of a struggle; the deer seemed to eat the greatest blooms and flowers leaving me with the least, the less desirable ones to paint.

Greatest and least are categories that present themselves this morning too. The scriptures report Jesus using them frequently during his earthly ministry, especially when he is teaching his followers. This morning "greatest" and "least" are heard in the context of the kingdom of heaven. Heaven language seems a rather odd choice against a back drop of John the Baptist's incarceration.

John is now in prison. King Herod has obviously had enough of his preaching and enough of his proclaiming the power and might and authority of the one who is coming. But the word quickly spread (even to John while he is in jail) of what Jesus is doing. John sends a message to clarify the person of Jesus. "Are you the One?" asks John. "Or should we keep on waiting?" And what John receives back from his followers is an activity report:

The blind receive sight.

The lame are now able to walk.

The lepers are cleansed.

The deaf are able to hear.

The dead are raised.

The poor receive a message that is good news.

After John's followers take the activity report back to the prison to share it with John, Jesus begins speaking to the crowds.

A series of rhetorical questions guides the listener in the direction Jesus wants them to follow. "What did you go out into the wilderness to look at; a reed shaking by the wind?" John spoke with boldness and conviction. "What did you go out to see; someone dressed in soft robes?" John wore camel's hair and a leather belt. "Did you go out to see a prophet?" Well, Jesus says, as a matter of fact yes. And we hear again of the messenger who prepares the way.

Jesus elevates the prophetic messenger John, elevating his stature even while he is weighed down with imprisonment by King Herod. Jesus proclaims his status "Truly I tell you, among those born of women no one has arisen greater than John the Baptist; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he." For those listening, for those following, for those who trust; something astounding is being made known through Jesus.

Greatest and least are categories not limited to Bible use and religious conversation. In the art world it seems that there have always been some who are considered to be greatest and some who are considered to be least. Among the impressionists of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, Vincent Van Gogh didn't rank well. He was often over looked and over shadowed by his peers. You might even say that in the late 19<sup>th</sup> century he was least among artists "born of women." During his lifetime he sold only one of his paintings. And it was sold to a curator of a local gallery for what is reported to be a very modest sum. At this point in time I would be honored to have even the "least" of one of his paintings.

At an art auction this November, last month, a Van Gogh landscape depicting a blossoming orchard in springtime appeared in the catalog of paintings up for bid. It is one of those pictures that radiate vibrant spring color and its joyful movement across the canvas. It is the kind of picture that makes you smile especially if you have been through a wintery season of life, something a kin to winter; cold, bleak, lonely, closed off and withdrawn. It was part of a series of paintings he did inspired by Japanese cherry blossoms. The starting bid for the blossoming orchard in springtime painting was set at \$80 million. Mind you this was for a picture painted by the least of the impressionists; not a Cezanne, Monet, or Seurat. The Van Gogh fetched \$117.2 million. The least is greatest when viewed and valued by one who appreciates, loves, and can pay the price for such art work.

Jesus is the one who views, values, appreciates, loves and pays the price for us. We are not always the image of a blossoming orchard stretching out ready to bear fruit for for the kingdom. But somehow Jesus sees beyond the wintriness of our lives. Jesus recognizes your worth and mine. He is not put off by the seasons that stretch us thin and wear us down and draw us away from him. This morning he announces to us, his followers, our worth and value through the sacrament of Holy Baptism. Here God's Word coupled with earthly water claimed you, made you an heir of the kingdom and promised you the forgiveness of sins and a place eternally with God; elevating you from the least to the greatest. Through Christ Jesus taking up the cross and its suffering and pain and giving himself fully to redeem the human condition, we are given a value that is beyond human understanding. He did not calculate the cost but willing bore the weight of sin and death for us.

The joyful image for us to ponder is the priceless treasure made known to us in Christ Jesus; envisioned by Isaiah, born of the Virgin Mary, announced by John, and proclaimed through Apostles, saints and martyrs. Christ is the one who sustains us when life is painful and gruesome and when it is beautiful and life-giving. For with him the least become greatest in the kingdom of heaven. Amen.

#### SECOND READING: James 5:7-10

<sup>7</sup>As they went away, Jesus began to speak to the crowds about John: "What did you go out into the wilderness to look at? A reed shaken by the wind? <sup>8</sup>What then did you go out to see? Someone dressed in soft robes? Look, those who wear soft robes are in royal palaces. <sup>9</sup>What then did you go out to see? A prophet? Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet. <sup>10</sup>This is the one about whom it is written,

'See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way before you.'
