


PREFACE

Lord, remember us in your kingdom and teach us to pray.



COMMUNION OF THE FAITHFUL

Our Communion is "open" to all believers who trust that the Risen Christ is present for his people in the Holy Eucharist.

- 1. Come to communion using the center aisle (about 10 adults per side).
- 2. Communion glasses are placed on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).
- 3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.
- 4. Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.
- 5. Extend your hands to receive the communion host.
- 6. Consume the communion host.
- 7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.
- 8. Consume the wine before you leave the chancel edge.
- 9. Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle.
- 10.Return to your pew using the side aisle.

In those days Esther ironed and the kids played Monopoly. The fire was going in the basement fireplace. Esther positioned the ironing board in such a way with the warmth at her back and a good view of the mammoth console television set airing her favorite day time drama, Days of Our Lives. Esther was a good neighbor. During winter school holidays neighborhood children would hang out with her kids in the warmth of their large basement rec room. They played endless games of Monopoly while Esther ironed shirts and table clothes and napkins and watched Days of Our Lives. As the kids played the board game they couldn't help but over hear the dialogue radiating from the TV set. Conflict and angst were experienced by most every character. The rich didn't associate with the poor, or when they did it was fraught with tragedy. Love was always complicated. Jealousy was prevalent. Medical conditions were always life threating if not terminal. Incarcerations allowed characters to be locked away for years without parole. The children weighed in reminding Esther that playing Monopoly was the better option, because there was "Free Parking" and it was possible to "get out of jail free." Those were the days of Esther ironing and neighborhood children playing board games; those were the days of our lives. This morning we hear about other days, days when John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judea. John's message could be perceived as scorching hot, like an iron, depending upon who heard it. He proclaimed a message. "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near."

In those days, the days leading up to John's appearance, wise men from the east brought gifts to the new born King; gold, frank incense, myrrh. In those days the wise men left for their home country by another road so as to avoid Jerusalem and King Herod. In those days, King Herod's insecurity and jealousy would stop at nothing in order to secure his future. The sheer thought of someone else rivaling his authority, word of a new born king, threatened him beyond reason. In those days an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream telling him to take the child Jesus and his mother, and flee to Egypt, and stay there until he heard otherwise; because Herod was about to search for the child, to destroy him. In those days the infuriated King Herod sent out a decree and an entourage of soldiers to accomplish it, killing all the children in and around Bethlehem who were two years of age or younger. In those days after King Herod died, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in Egypt and told him to take the child and his mother, and go to the land of Israel, because those who were seeking the child's life were dead. In those days Joseph remained fearful of Herod's son who was ruling over Judea. So he went north, further north, to the district of Galilee to a town called Nazareth. It was in Nazareth where Joseph would establish a home for his beloved Mary and their son Jesus.

Now it was in those days that John, son of Zachariah and Elizabeth, appeared in the wilderness of Judea, preaching repentance and reiterating the words of the prophet Isaiah. "The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight." These were not good days. These were days of an insecure tyrannical ruler. These were days of educated folks fearing the political establishment. These were days of uncertainty when the ruler of the nation thought so little of human life that extermination of infants and children seemed quite all right if it secured his future. No, these were not good days. These were days when the Word of the Lord needed to be proclaimed in order for people to live in hope. These were days when the Word of the Lord needed to be proclaimed in order to live another day; for without the Word of the Lord, they had nothing but more of, "those days."

Now in the days of John, people went out to hear him, to see him, to find out what on earth he was preaching about. Some were curious. Some were fearful. Some sought new beginnings. Some yearned for forgiveness. Some wanted to be made right with God and with one another. You might say they were looking for "free parking" and an opportunity to "get out of jail free." To experience the days of their lives refreshed, renewed, forgiven was why they traveled out into the Judean countryside. And there it was that they were baptized by John in the river Jordan.

We live in days of uncertainty. We live in days of tyrannical rulers. We live in days where the educational community and the political community are often at odds. We live in days when leaders of nations have little concern for the sanctity of human life. We live in days when securing our own future is tantamount to just about everything else. And into these days, the Word of the Lord comes. It is easy to think that the Word of the Lord has all but dried up in the land. But that is not so. In our days, the days of our lives, the Word of the Lord is coming to us.

Hopefully crowds will once again make their way to church for the celebration of Christmas. Among them there are bound to be; some who are curious, some who are fearful given the demise of national and international affairs, some seeking new beginnings, some yearning for forgiveness, some longing for restored relationships with God and with neighbor, spouse, coworker, friend, or classmate. Through the liturgy, scripture and preaching, through beloved carols and anthems, through the bread and wine of Holy Communion the Word, Christ Jesus, is experienced. Through Christ we are given forgiveness of our sins and brought into a way of life leading to repentance, a life of fruit bearing, of generosity, of giving, and forgiving, and actively contributing in kingdom life.

"Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." Turn around. Straighten out the path. Get on the road, the highway of God. The Lord comes, and with him comes a new way to live, a new way to view the world, and a new way to view our neighbor. The Word of the Lord brings hope into what appears to be hopeless. The Word of the Lord makes a way when it seems that there isn't any way forward. And this Word, this Incarnate Word, this Christ Child, this Jesus, is the Word that John heralded. There is one who is more powerful says John. There is one whom I am not worthy to carry his sandals. This one comes baptizing with the Holy Spirit and fire. The One about whom John preached is; in our midst, bestowing the Holy Spirit, making a way when it seems that there is no way. Jesus is the one sent from heaven to a virgin's womb, the one born in Bethlehem, threatening rulers, and the self-absorbed. John heralded Jesus, the one coming into the world forgiving you and loving you and longing to have you on the right path bearing fruit fit for the kingdom.

In those days the Word of the Lord was proclaimed bringing renewal and hope. These days, the days of our lives, the Word of the Lord is proclaimed bringing us joy and hope. What Christ brings is greater than "free parking" and a "get out of jail free card." We are promised life with him now and for eternity. We are released from all that binds us and holds us captive. The Word of the Lord, Christ Jesus, brings hope, for with him there is forgiveness of sins, and where there is forgiveness of sins there is life and salvation; hope for all the days of your lives. Amen.

In those days John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judea, proclaiming, ²"Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." ³This is the one of whom the prophet Isaiah spoke when he said,

"The voice of one crying out in the wilderness:

'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.'"

⁴ Now John wore clothing of camel's hair with a leather belt around his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. ⁵Then the people of Jerusalem and all Judea were going out to him, and all the region along the Jordan, ⁶and they were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins.

⁷But when he saw many Pharisees and Sadducees coming for baptism, he said to them, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? ⁸Bear fruit worthy of repentance. ⁹Do not presume to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our ancestor'; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. ¹⁰Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire.

¹¹"I baptize you with water for repentance, but one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to carry his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. ¹²His winnowing fork is in his hand, and he will clear his threshing floor and will gather his wheat into the granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."
